New breezeway a family affair

Airmen and their families no longer have to brave sub-zero temperatures when walking between the Base Exchange and Commissary, after a new breezeway connecting the two buildings officially opened here on a cold and windy day Dec. 13.

The new, climate-controlled walkway is intended to protect people from the harsh weather conditions common to the area, said Lt. Gen. Frank Klotz, Air Force Global Strike Command commander who flew in from the command headquarters at Barksdale AFB, La., to officiate the ceremony.

"On a day like today in North Dakota, it's abundantly clear why this walkway is needed," said the general, who thanked the organizations involved in the \$743,000 project during a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The walkway was a joint effort among the Army Air Force Exchange Service, the Defense Commissary Agency and the Air Force, with design and construction support provided by contractors ALSC Architects and Rolac Contracting, Inc.

The outdoor temperature read 9 degrees at the time of the ceremony. Mrs. Katie Becker, wife of deployed Staff Sgt. Dustin Becker, 5th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron weapons loader, helped the general cut the ribbon. The 5th Bomb Wing commander, Col. Doug Cox,

and the 91st Missile Wing commander, Col. Fred Stoss, assisted as well. Mrs. Becker then walked down the 180-foot corridor with her twin children in a stroller along with General Klotz, the wing commanders and most of the nearly 100 people who witnessed the ceremony.

"As a mother of four kids, it's the most dreadful part of the winter," said Mrs. Becker. "As a mom, I see the breezeway as a vast improvement to our overall quality of life."

A typical year in the area includes more than 200 days of freezing temperatures, snow, ice and high winds-weather conditions General Klotz knows well from personal experience. Having served seven years at North Dakota bases, he said he remembers bundling up his two small children in order to walk between the BX and Commissary.

The positive impact of the breezeway will be significant

because these are the most visited facilities on base, officials said.

The breezeway is part of a series of construction projects aimed to make life better for Airmen and their families, the general said. Renovation and construction of new base housing, a world-class fitness center with an elevated indoor track and indoor swimming pool, one newly constructed dormitory with two more on the way, the new Exchange, the new Shoppette, and new facilities for indoor storage of vehicles are all improvements over the past dozen years, he said.

The breezeway project also replaced the Commissary's aging doors and will increase energy efficiency by providing a tighter building envelope and reducing heat loss in the winter and cooling loss in the summer, according to officials.

Global Strike Commander: Minot's Airmen are what make the difference

While at Minot Monday and Tuesday, the commander of Air Force Global Strike Command and his Command Chief took the time to meet with Minot Airmen to thank them for their service and seek their input about the mission here.

As the only base with both ICBM and nuclear-capable bomber missions, Minot is unique, said Lt. Gen. Frank Klotz, the command's top officer. The general and Chief Master Sgt. Jack Johnson met over breakfast at the Dakota Inn dining facility's Red Room with about 20 Airmen and NCOs from both the 5th Bomb Wing and the 91st Missile Wing.

General Klotz expressed pride in the Command's Airmen, saying he comes away from each encounter with them "charged up, motivated and full of pride."

"Our Airmen are so smart, enthusiastic and devoted to doing their jobs," the general said. "At the end of the day, what makes us the greatest Air Force in the world is our great Airmen."

Airmen asked questions and heard a candid assessment of the state of the command and the base from the Command's most senior lead-

ers, covering everything from fitness tests to the outlook for Air Force careers.

The success of both bomber and ICBM missions is

made possible because of the tremendous support provided by the surrounding communities, the general said in an interview after the breakfast.

The local communities are extraordinarily important to the success of both the base and the mission," he said. "They are full-fledged partners of Team Minot."

With both bomber and missile wings under the same Command since last December, the wings can more readily integrate and share best practices, making for a stronger team, a stronger base and a stronger Command, said the general.

The teamwork at Minot was recognized during the Command's first-ever Global Strike Challenge missile, bomber and security forces competition, where Minot's bomb and missile wing teams jointly were awarded the coveted "Spirit Bell" award for team spirit and camaraderie.

The teamwork and esprit de corps demonstrated during the competition was what impressed the hundreds gathered there, said the general, who once served as the 91st Missile Wing commander here.

He told the Airmen at the breakfast that he understands what it means to serve at Minot, while working alongside another wing with an equally important mission.

AFGSC assists Navy in powering mission

WHITEMAN AIR FORCE BASE, Mo. - Members of the 509th and 131st Logistic Readiness Squadrons loaded more than \$30 million of Los Angeles class submarine batteries on DC-8 cargo aircraft here, Dec. 4 and 6 in support of Naval operations in the Pacific.

Air Force Global Strike Command officials received a call requesting batteries for the fast attack boats Dec. 3.

"I was impressed with the initiative and dedication demonstrated by the LRS team who promptly coordinated this \$30 million shipment of

Navy submarine batteries on such short notice," said Lt. Col. Trace Steyaert, 509th LRS commander. "Our team worked around the clock to build these airworthy pallets of critical Navy submarine assets and ensured safe loading aboard two transport aircraft to meet their departure times ... job well done!"

The 509th LRS small air terminal, logistics planners and vehicle operators worked together to honor the request.

"From the go, this was a joint operation," said 1st Lt. Stefan Hafner, 509th LRS deployment and distribution flight deputy commander.

"We were contacted by mission validators from the Navy asking if we could make it happen - obviously the an-

swer was 'yes!'"

Lieutenant Hafner said they pulled together squadron resources and gathered the needed manpower to get the ball rolling. Vehicle operators moved the batteries from a local business in Warrensburg, Mo., one of the sole companies with a naval submarine battery contract, to Whiteman Air Force Base. The small air terminal palletized and loaded the aircraft while the logistics plans office oversaw the operation to ensure everything went smoothly.

"It was great to see an operation pulled off so smoothly in such a short time," Lieutenant Hafner added. "Everyone involved noticed the significance of this effort and

came together to get it done."

"We support the bomber mission everyday, and now we had the chance to help out our sister service," Lieutenant Hafner said. "We no

longer live in an Air Force where we're cut off from our sister services. We support each other and we're focused on delivering joint solutions for our nation."

Tis the season for toy safety**

There are hundreds of toys on the market today, which are produced from all over the world.

However, not all of them are made with quality. While shopping, you may not be thinking of safety, but this is something often overlooked.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission more than 120,000 children are treated in the hospital emergency room for toy related injuries. When selecting a toy, the following things need to be



struction. Avoid items that have sharp points, glass, exposed metal edges and small attachments. This will help reduce the chance of accidental hazards, like choking and cuts. And three, read the label! We often neglect to read the warnings and precautions listed. This notice can be the deciding factor if the toy will be a good idea as a gift.

Remember, a toy for sale does not mean the product is safe. If you encounter

**Overseas assignment...
Can my family members come?**

The overseas clearance process is complex and may be more in-depth than many realize.

When an Air Force Global Strike Command and Team Minot active duty member receives notice of an assignment, possibly accompanied by an out-processing checklist, it is of the utmost importance for the member to come to the overseas clearance office immediately.

Members will receive an AF Form 1466 (Request for Family Member's Medical and Education Clearance for Travel) that must be signed off by medical group personnel. However, this is not automatic and involves a timely process; therefore, it is crucial

for the member to speak with someone from our office as soon as possible.

It is important to keep in mind that although the servicemember may have been selected for an accompanied tour, clearances are not automatic and the member's family will need to be cleared by medical professionals prior to receiving orders. This will allow family members to relocate with the Airman.

Each family member the active-duty servicemember is requesting relocation to the overseas assignment for must be medically cleared, to include any special needs that must be addressed. There may be a need for additional medical or educational appointments.

After all appointments have been

completed, the 1466, along with the required health documents, will be forwarded to the gaining base's medical treatment facility, where the decision to accept any family member with health issues will be made.

Please allow ample time for the completion of this phase of the process. If the servicemember or their family members' needs cannot be met at that location, assignments may be cancelled or changed from an accompanied to an unaccompanied tour.

Please keep in mind, this process in its entirety may take several months, allowing for medical appointments, record reviews and whatever additional information that may be needed.

Application deadline approaching for Warrior Games

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The application deadline for the 2011 Warrior Games is Jan. 11. With the holidays approaching, Air Force officials encourage qualifying Airmen to submit applications as soon as possible.

Warrior Games is an Olympic-style competition open to wounded, ill and injured military members and veterans

"The application process can take some time, so don't wait until the last minute," said Capt. Courtnee Cruz, the Air Force Warrior and Survivor Care policy chief. "We encourage those interested in the games to apply now."

Air Force officials participants are seeking 25 wounded warriors to compete in next year's games that will feature seven events: archery, cycling, basketball, shooting, swimming, track and field, and volleyball.

Approximately 200 warriors from all services will compete in the event that takes place May 16 through 21 in Colorado Springs, Colo., with training camps scheduled in February and May, Captain Cruz said.

Warrior Games chal-

lenges wounded warriors to prove to themselves that they have abilities within them that they can carry over into everyday life, said Captain Cruz.

"The goal of these games isn't necessarily to determine the best athletes or to win medals," Capt Cruz said. "The goal is to maximize our wounded, ill and injured veteran's abilities, and to contribute to their rehabilitation and recover through competitive sports."

The Warrior Games is developed through the partnership between the United States Olympic Committee and the Defense Department.



Prairie Adventures

Ladies, there's still time to go Beyond BOW.

The 8th annual Winter Beyond BOW (Becoming an Outdoors-Woman) program still has room for any woman 18 years of age and older to participate in snowshoeing and animal tracking, winter survival, cross-country skiing, and darkhouse spearfishing.

However, those who had their heart set on dogsledding missed their ride in 2011. The class filled in five days, described N.D. Game and Fish Department Becoming an Outdoors-Woman coordinator Nancy Boldt. "People are waiting for it, they're calling me in October," she added.

Lake Metigoshe hosts the winter event Feb. 26 and 27. Darkhouse spearfishing will be held Jan. 8 on Ward County's South Carlson Lake.

Each class is limited to 12 to 15 participants. Lake Metigoshe participants can take one activity for a day or two classes over two days.

The \$50 fee includes lunch and equipment. Fees for two days are \$90. "We try to have hot soup and sandwiches when they (participants) come back from their activity," Boldt said. The relaxing indoor time also provides opportunities to visit with instructors in a warmer setting.

Participants must pay for their lodging if they want to stay overnight, which is available near Lake Metigoshe at Twin Oaks or Quilt Inn motels.

The dogsled class has a waiting list because of its popularity, Boldt said. Winter survival participants will learn how to build a snow shelter, make emergency candles, and other winter survival tips.

Snowshoeing is growing in popularity, Boldt said. "That seems to be a fast-growing sport...with all of the snow we've had in recent years, people just want to get out and do something."

South Carlson Lake was selected to host darkhouse spearfishing because of its central location in the state. In addition, 2010 marks the first year the lake is open to northern pike darkhouse spearing. Water clarity plays a large role in spearing success, so Boldt is optimistic the lake froze so it has good water visibility.

With North Dakota's fickle winter weather, Boldt is pleased at the ongoing success the winter workshops enjoy. "We've never had to cancel the big winter BOW. I think one time it was 9 below and we were out there," she described. The Turtle Mountains offer a sheltered setting among its hills and trees, she said.

If snowshoeing, winter survival skills, cross-country skiing or darkhouse spearfishing isn't on a "must do" list, women might want to stay tuned for upcoming BOW classes: The annual fly-fishing and fly-casting one-day class takes place in early 2011 in Bismarck.

New in 2011 will be a mini-BOW workshop with five classes offered at Turtle River State Park west of Grand Forks. The June workshop will be an opportunity to fly-fish in more traditional river fly-fishing conditions when participants pursue trout in the Turtle River.

More details will be available in 2011.

But for now, it's the heart of winter.

Let's face it; it's going to last awhile so we might as well make the most of it.

The Jan. 8 darkhouse spearfishing class at South Carlson Lake and the Feb. 26 and 27 workshops at Lake Metigoshe near Bottineau are as good of way to do it as any.

Another deer from 3F2 tests positive for CWD

A mule deer taken in November during the deer gun season from unit 3F2 is the second deer in North Dakota to test positive for chronic wasting disease. The first was a mule deer taken during the hunting season in 2009, also from unit 3F2.

Dr. Dan Grove, North Dakota Game and Fish Department wildlife veterinarian, said a hunter shot a doe in western Grant County and submitted the head for testing as part of the hunter-harvested surveillance program.

"As a collaborative effort with South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks, and the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe Game and Fish Department, a total of 633 samples were collected from unit 3F2 this fall, and all but one tested negative for CWD," Grove said. "Although we hoped the one positive from 2009 was an isolated incident, it was not unexpected that another one surfaced."

The two deer testing positive for CWD were taken 10 miles from each other, which

Grove said is not surprising because of the same general area. "Hunter cooperation was tremendous," Grove said. "We can't thank them enough, and we look forward to their continued support with this important issue in the future."

The hunter-harvested surveillance program annually collects samples taken from hunter-harvested deer in specific regions of the state. In addition to unit 3F2, samples during the 2010 deer gun season were collected from units in the eastern third of the state. The entire state has already been sampled twice.

"Michigan State University will be testing approximately 3,600 samples over

the next several weeks from deer taken in the eastern third of the state," Grove said. "Those results should be available by spring."

In addition to hunter-harvested deer, the Game and Fish Department has a targeted surveillance program that is an ongoing, year-round effort that tests animals found dead or sick.

Since the department's sampling efforts began in 2002, more than 16,000 deer, elk and moose have tested negative for CWD.

CWD affects the nervous system of members of the deer family and is always fatal. Scientists have found no evidence that CWD can be transmitted naturally to humans or livestock.

Hunter education class schedule online

Individuals interested in taking a hunter education class in 2011 should access the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website for class schedules.

Jon Hanson, hunter education coordinator for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, said a majority of classes are taught through May. "Most of the classes are added over the next several weeks, so students should watch the website so they can choose the class that fits their schedule," Hanson said. "Other classes will be added throughout the year as they are finalized."

Classes held early in the year fill up quickly because of the deer application deadline. "There is a major demand for classes held before June because they will qualify students for submitting a deer application," Hanson said.

Hunters with an apprentice hunting license in 2010

are reminded they will need to take a hunter education class to continue hunting in 2011. The apprentice license provides individuals age 16 and older with a one-year hunter education exemption for small game and deer.

To register for a class, or to view the study guide or tree stand safety course, access gf.nd.gov and click on the education/outreach link and "hunter education." Classes are listed by city, and can also be sorted by start date. Click on "enroll" next to

the specific class, and follow the simple instructions. Personal information is required.


Those who do not have access to the Internet and want to sign up for a class can call the hunter education program in Bismarck at (701) 328-6615. State law requires anyone born after December 31, 1961 to pass a certified hunter education course to hunt in the state. Hunter education is mandatory for youth who are turning 12 years old, and children can take the class at age 11.

Antlerless Elk in Jan. for E3, E4 Hunters

Elk hunters with unfilled any-elk licenses in units E3 and E4 are reminded that their license is restricted to antlerless elk only from Jan. 1-21.

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department amended the 2010 bighorn sheep,

elk and moose proclamation by extending the elk season to Jan. 21 for units immediately adjacent to Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The closing date coincides with the National Park Service's management action for reducing the park's elk population.
