

Global Strike commander: ‘Together as a team’

Just one day after taking command of Air Force Global Strike Command, Lt. Gen. Jim Kowalski met with Airmen of the 2nd Bomb Wing to discuss the way ahead for the command.

The new commander assured the audience of more than 1,500 at Hoban Hall that as the command moves forward into the next year, “there will be no big vector changes, and the changes that are made will be made thoughtfully and together as a team.”

Global Strike Command’s “deadly serious” mission is to develop and provide combat-ready forces for nuclear deter-

rence and global strike operations in a manner that is safe, secure and effective, General Kowalski said.

He took the opportunity to explain what is unique about the Air Force’s newest major command. The general said that in the nuclear and global strike business, how of the way a task is accomplished is as important as what is accomplished.

Offering his vision of the role of the major command, headquartered here at Barksdale, the new commander said the only measure of success for a headquarters is how well the units below it perform, and the 2nd Bomb Wing has done a fantastic job, he said.

General Kowalski said he sees three challenges for the command.

“I want to consolidate our gains and mature our headquarters — complete the restoration of a culture that embraces the special trust and responsibility of nuclear weapons,” he said.

“Additionally, I want to achieve enduring cultural change while also aggressively

supporting the current fight,” he said.

“Lastly, I’d like us to sustain and enhance the current force while preparing to meet challenges of the future. Let’s be productive and innovative.”

General Kowalski closed his remarks by sharing his three fundamental beliefs with the Airmen: the Air Force Core Values, the importance of discipline, and what it means to be a good leader.

“Core values are the foundation of air and ground discipline. They aren’t just what we say or put on slides, coins and signs, but they are behaviors. How we choose to act, or not act,” he said.

Knowledge, education keys to success

 COLUMBUS AIR FORCE BASE, Miss. — Have you ever stopped to think about the price of learning? Technical training in the civilian world can be expensive.

Civilian trade schools can cost in upward of \$35,000. In the Air Force, learning is your job, so your education is free.

Men and women who enlist in the Air Force today immediately begin receiving a paycheck, with benefits, to the tune of about \$2,400 a month. It is the essential framework of our success in the Air Force.

We are afforded a variety of unique and specialized programs geared to help each Airman meet their targeted educational goals and reach their true potential. From exclusive colleges and universities to technical training and first-hand experiences, you'll be able to enhance your education throughout your military career.

Please permit me to share with you just a few "in case you didn't know" data points on enlisted education that could benefit you or someone desiring to enter our Air Force in the future.

In case you didn't know,

the Community College of the Air Force is America's largest community college.

You are automatically enrolled once you join the Air Force. Not only is it America's largest community college, but it is also the only degree-granting institution in the world dedicated entirely to Airmen. In addition, the Air Force now expects all master sergeants to have a CCAF degree in order to be considered for senior rater endorsement on enlisted performance reports. This is critical to the furtherance of promotion to the rank of senior master sergeant and chief master sergeant. So, CCAF can be considered one source of meeting your targeted educational goals.

In case you didn't know, enlisted commissioned programs are alive and well in the Air Force too.

Here are a few I'd like to highlight for you. The Airman Education & Commissioning Program allows members to remain on active duty and be subsequently reassigned to an Air Force ROTC detachment. There, you go to school "full time" as your job and receive tuition and scholarship fees for up to \$15,000 per year. Additionally, you may attend for up to three years.

There is also the Airman

Scholarship & Commissioning Program, which almost mirrors AECF, with a couple of exceptions. You are released from active duty and placed in the Air Force Reserve, with scholarships available for two and four years. Airmen with some or no college credits may apply, and you can use your Montgomery GI Bill benefits as well.

Leaders Encouraging Airman Development is another great program that allows commanders to seek out outstanding and deserving qualified Airmen for appointment to the Air Force Academy and Air Force ROTC scholarship programs.

There is also the Academy Preparatory School. It is designed to academically, physically and mentally prepare qualified young men and women to enter the Academy. One of our very own enlisted members was selected and recently graduated from the prep school.

There are several other ECPs. Our education office can provide you with information, including whether or not you qualify. Enlisted commissioning programs can be considered another source of meeting your targeted educational goals.

In case you didn't know, the Air Force has money

designated to assist you in attaining higher learning as well.

The Air Force tuition assistance program is a great way to go to school for literally no out-of-pocket cost, minus books at some institutions. TA officials pay 100 percent (up to \$250 per semester hour or equivalent) of the cost of college tuition, with a \$4,500 cap per fiscal year. Courses and degrees may be academic or technical.

The Post-9/11 and Montgomery GI Bill are pretty common programs, but have you ever heard of the college loan repayment program? It is designed for all nonprior-service persons considering enlistment in the Air Force. If they have taken college courses and accumulated debt along the way, this program may be beneficial to them. The member can sign up when signing his enlistment contract.

What a great tool to use as a recruiting talking point. We are all recruiters, you know.

As you can see, there are several programs designed and tailored to meet your targeted educational goals.

Whether it is enrolling in and completing your CCAF degree, pursuing higher learning through the various enlisted commissioning programs, us-

ing the various "pots of money" you have earned by raising your hand to support and defend this great country, or finally, using educational tools to recruit our country's most important treasure — "her sons and daughters" — through avenues like the college loan repayment program.

We have a duty and responsibility to strive for excellence in everything we do. Education is no exception. It is definitely to your advantage to complete it early in your career. As job responsibilities increase, you take on a family, or your current family grows and time just becomes less available, getting it knocked out early pays huge dividends.

I leave you with one of the challenges all Airmen have been given by Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James A. Roy:

"It is our duty to deliberately develop ourselves and our Airmen through the channels of experience, education and training."

Education is power! Continue to pursue it whenever and wherever you can.

This biblical scripture holds true for all: "... people perish for lack of knowledge."

The general defined discipline as the single characteristic most common to success in any endeavor.

"We are the compliance command," he said. "We follow the rules, but that means we have to work to ensure the rules make sense."

Central to any unit's success is leadership, the general said. A hallmark of the Air Force is high-performing leaders, he said, noting

every Airman is a leader to others — formally or informally.

"The No. 1 job of any leader is to make more leaders," General Kowalski said as he encouraged the audience to accept that challenge.

"Stay optimistic, enthusiastic and reject cynicism," he said.

"And I pledge to give you the leadership and guidance you deserve."



Airmen donate blood, help relieve critical demand

Blood supply in the local area is at a critical low and Barksdale Airmen are stepping up to offset the demand.

"I try to donate at least quarterly because it is important to keep our blood banks full," said Staff Sgt. Travis Tewes, 2nd Civil Engineer Squadron. "It gives me a sense of gratification to know I'm helping the cause."

Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, regularly hosts LifeShare Blood Center staff on base to administer blood donations. All the blood that is collected by LifeShare Blood Center stays in the local community, which provides for 139 medical facilities.

"The base overall does an outstanding job donating blood," said Gwen Herndon, Shreveport LifeShare Blood Center donor recruiter. "My hope is that Airmen will continue to strive to improve their donor base and donate when they are eligible, which is every 56 days for Whole Blood Donors and every 112 days for Red Cell Donors."

"The lives of local patients depend on the donations," she said. "Heart patients, cancer patients, sickle cell patients — we need to make sure there is enough. Types O and B are in the greatest demand."

Statistics show 65 percent of the gener-

al population is eligible to donate, yet only 5 percent do. With the current supply of available blood, Herndon hopes even more Airmen will take the time to donate.

"Donating is very important due to the fact there is always the potential the blood we give could save a life," Sergeant Tewes said. "A minor pinch to the arm is a small price to pay to give someone out there a second chance. I only wish I had O-type blood — Lifeshare is in high need of O-type donors."

LifeShare Blood Center staff said there are several misconceptions deterring individuals from donating; however individuals may still donate if they are taking high blood-pressure medication, have diabetes, have rheumatoid arthritis, cancer (one year after end of treatment), three weeks after tattoos and body piercings performed in a licensed establishment, or have a sickle cell trait.

"I challenge all military members and dependents that qualify to donate," Sergeant Tewes said. "Nothing is better than giving your blood to an organization that is in the business of saving lives."





Air traffic controllers: eyes in the night

Class Courtney Johns watches diligently from the control tower to ensure the safe execution of the night's flying missions.

Airman Johns, an air

traffic controller with the 2nd Operations Support Squadron, is part of an elite team of Airmen entrusted with multi-million dollar aircraft and the lives of the crew onboard.

As part of Air Force Global Strike Command, Airman Johns is responsible for controlling aircraft capable of transporting America's most powerful deterrent, it's nuclear arsenal.

"They are flying the plane, and we are their eyes," Airman Johns said, referring to the aircrew.

Air traffic controllers control the movement of aircraft into and out of military airfields by tracking multiple aircraft simultaneously using radar and radio communication. Such a high level of responsibility requires intense preparation, and the training standards

for ATCs are exceedingly high.

"The most stressful part is going through training," Airman Johns said. "You are held to an expectation that is hard to attain as a trainee."

Following basic training, ATC candidates attend the 72-day Air Traffic Control operator course at Keesler Air Force Base, Miss. During this training, candidates learn the basic flight characteristics of different aircraft as well as the use of aeronautical charts, maps, ATC radar, communications systems and navigational aids.

The rigorous training tempo and demanding curriculum requires potential ATCs to possess an unparalleled level of motivation and stress management.

Once certified, ATCs

are entrusted with the immense responsibility of controlling expensive aircraft along with protecting the Air Force's most valuable asset: it's Airmen.

"[The cost] is not something we think about," Airman Johns said. "We only think about safety. We think about the lives we have on board."

Due to the nature of the job and the lives that depend on it, Airmen, non-commissioned officers and civilians alike are held at the highest standard. No matter what the pay grade, the safety and success of the mission de-

pends on the ATC flawlessly executing their piece of the mission.

"It takes a particular type of person with the confidence to implement a plan," said Tracy Brittan, watch supervisor. "Working here requires a high level of responsibility and a high level of awareness. A person must be able to multi-task in order to appropriately sequence and separate aircraft."

The air traffic control mission requires the highest level of attention to detail and accountability, and the ATC team here at Barksdale exemplifies these attributes.

The Area Defense Counsel office located on Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, provides various free legal services to all active-duty members in proceedings under the Uniform Code of Military Justice and adverse administrative actions.

The ADC is not attached to any wing, numbered Air Force or major command. They fall under a separate defense command, so they are able to represent all Airmen.

Capt. Thomas Greenwood, an ADC attorney, and Staff Sgt. Breihan Fetz, a defense paralegal, assist active-duty Airmen, regardless of their rank, with military administrative and criminal matters. The ADC occasionally assists Air Force Reservists depending on their status and the reason they seek legal guidance. The ADC typically does not provide assistance to retirees and do not represent civilian clients.

The key difference between ADC and Judge Advocates is the clients they serve. The ADC represents ordinary Airmen, while JA represents the United States Air Force. The ADC provides defense counsel to Airmen charged with crimes, and JA is responsible for prosecuting alleged criminals. JA provides a wide variety of legal advice and assistance regarding civil matters.

"Our goal is to represent individual clients with competence, tenacity and loyalty, limited only by the bounds of law, ethics and good judgment," Captain Greenwood said.

The ADC is an advocate that works on behalf of Airmen to ensure their le-

gal rights are respected and the process remains fair.

When an Airman is questioned and read his or her rights by an Air Force Office of Special Investigations agent, security forces members or another military member, the Airman has the absolute right under the Constitution and the UCMJ to remain silent and request assistance of an attorney.

Waiving one's rights is not an absolute choice; an Airman may decide to reassert his or her rights at any time.

The ADC can provide confidential legal consultation, advise an Airman of their rights, assist an Airman in crafting a response to an action and act as an agent on their behalf in negotiations with his or her commander.

"An Airman coming to the ADC can usually expect a nonjudgmental and fairness assessment of their situation," Sergeant Fetz said. "Airman can look to the ADC as a safe place to discuss pending administrative or criminal matters."

"We cannot help Airmen who fail to seek us out in a timely fashion, who do not provide us with all of the information we require or who do not cooperate with our instructions," Captain Greenwood said.

Barksdale sergeant begins new recycling program

When the Barksdale community is fishing at Harman and Flag lakes on the East Reservation, they will now have a place to dispose of their old fishing line.

Senior Master Sgt. Everett Spells, Air Force Global Strike Command Lead LCAP inspector, recently started a monofilament recycling program.

The avid fisherman got the idea to start the program after fishing in the Red River. He saw a white crane stuck in fishing line and was unable to help save the animal. He also came across similar programs at other bases. "My goal is keep monofilament fishing line out of the waterways and to protect the wildlife from getting entangled and dying," Sergeant Spells said. "If I get one spool of line out of the water, it has served its purpose."

Since most monofilament is clear or light in color, wildlife cannot see it and often become entangled in the fiber.

They then become trapped and starve or become strangled and die. By fishermen putting their old line in the containers, it will cut down on the amount of monofilament that is in the waterways for the wildlife to get caught in.

Sergeant Spells will collect the line put into the recycling containers then send it off to be recycled. The line is melted down into such things as tackle boxes, spools for line and toys.

"I would just encourage people to actually use the containers. Even if you are not fishing that day, use the containers to recycle your fishing line so

that it is not just thrown away and sitting in a landfill," he said. "If you cannot make it out to a recycling container, bring your line to me and I will take care of it."

Monofilament fishing line is made of a single fiber of plastic. The nonbiodegradable product cannot be recycled from household recycling and can remain in the marine environment for up to 600 years.

A winter wonderland

Due to the intense heat of northwest Louisiana summers, many Barksdale Airmen may find it hard to believe the area is capable of producing freezing rain and even on a rare occasion, snow.

In fact, Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, experienced 15 winter weather events, such as freezing rain or snow, in the past five years. Staff Sgt. Larry Woodson, 2nd Operations Support Squadron weather forecaster, discussed what causes winter precipitation.

"For freezing rain, all you need are cold temperatures," he said. "There will be a warm layer of air in the lower part of the atmosphere; as the snow begins to pass through the warmer layer of air it turns to liquid, then the freezing temperatures on the ground cause it to freeze when it meets a surface.

"Snow, on the other hand, requires 32 (degrees) F or less throughout all layers in the atmosphere," he continued.

During winter weather events, 2 OSS weather helps the base prepare for the imminent weather conditions.

"We collaborate with the 26th Operational Weather Squadron on a freezing rain warning an hour-and-a-half prior to the event," Sergeant Woodson said. "When snow is forecasted, the criterion is 2 inches within 12 hours, although we don't issue those warnings too often because it rarely snows here.

"We also participate in briefs and mission planning for all the B-52 and A-10 aircraft that are flying so they know ahead of time. We also try to give the commanders a heads up and let them know we are looking at a possibility of winter precipitation," he continued.

Air Force bases that receive an average of 6 inches of snow yearly are required to have a snow and ice control plan on file.

"We don't have a snow and ice plan on file here because we don't get 6 inches per year," said Tech. Sgt. Michael Stout, 2nd Civil Engineer Squadron assistant non-commissioned officer-in-charge of the pavement section. "However, we do maintain specific equipment to augment that plan with sand for bridges and other high-ice areas that can cause hazardous conditions for drivers."

Sergeant Stout said adding sand to high-ice areas does not necessarily make roads safe; roads are only as safe as the drivers are careful.

"It's important to keep in mind ice is out there, and they need to be safe drivers because we can only increase the safety of the roads with abrasive material to help with vehicle traction. It's up to drivers to be cautious," he said.

Motorists should keep the following safety tips in mind when contemplating driving during a winter weather event:

- Stay home, avoid roads if possible. If not possible, wait until roads have been sanded.

- Vehicles should be ready for winter weather and have clear headlights and good wiper blades.

- Turn on lights to be more visible to other drivers.

- Motorists should keep three times the distance between them and the vehicle in front of them as they would on a clear day.

- When motorists find themselves in a rear-wheel skid, they should ease off the accelerator and turn the steering wheel in the same direction of the rear wheel skid.


