Base impact tops half billion dollars

Minot Air Force Base's economic impact was briefed to the military affairs committee during the monthly MAC luncheon here Feb. 17.

According to Lt. Col. Barry Eddins, 5th Comptroller Squadron commander, the fiscal year total annual economic impact is estimated at a grand total of \$513, 673,022.

"We are proud to be economic members of North Dakota, and social members of the community," Col. Julian Tolbert, 5th Bomb Wing vice commander said. "We certainly feel at home here."

The city of Minot and surrounding communities have seen an 18

percent growth in economic impact since 2008. Part of that growth can directly be attributed to the reactivation of the 69th Bomb Squadron on Sept. 3, 2009.

The base offers a total of 12,865 personnel comprised of Active Duty and their military dependants, reservists, appropriated fund civilians, and non-appropriated fund contract civilians and private business.

The expenditures for construction, services and procurement of materials equipment and supplies for the base ran at a total of \$146,174,379. The breakout of the construction, which included military construction, military family housing, operations and maintenance and other miscellaneous categories, totaled more than

\$107M.

Services contracts accounted for more than \$3.4M.

Materials, equipment and supplies procurement for the commissary, Base Exchange, health, education, TDY, and other miscellaneous items not included elsewhere, totaled well over \$35M.

Additionally Colonel Eddins contended approximately 2,156 additional indirect jobs were created in Minot with and estimated annual dollar value of more than \$72M for fiscal year 2010.

"Minot Air Force Base will continue to have a positive impact on the city of Minot and the surrounding communities," Colonel Eddins said.

Celebrating African American/ Black History Month

Americans have recognized black history annually since 1926, first as Negro History Week and later as Black History Month.

What many might not know is that black history had barely begun to be studied, or even documented, when the tradition originated. Although blacks have been in America as far back as colonial times, it was not until the 20th century that they gained a respectable presence in the history books.

Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen owe the celebration of black/African American History Month, and more importantly, the study of black history, to Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Mr. Woodson first established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, now called the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History, in 1915. A year later, the widely respected Journal of Negro History was founded. In 1926, he launched Negro History Week as an initiative to bring national attention to the contributions of black people throughout American history.

Mr. Woodson chose the second week of February for Negro History Week because it marks the birthdays of two men who greatly influenced the black American population, Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln. However, February has much more than Mr. Douglass and the late President Lincoln to show for its significance in black American history. Feb. 3, 1870 also marks a significant time in history as the 15th Amendment was passed, which granted blacks the right to vote.

I've often been asked about the purpose of the special observance program and if, at this point in history, these observances are still necessary. As a friend recently exclaimed, "America just elected its first black president! It's obvious that

America isn't racist anymore. I think we can move on now."

I know many people echo my friend's sentiments and think that we have outgrown the need for these observances. We are more diverse now than at any other time in our nation. More and more women and minorities are running for, and winning, local, state and national elections. I agree that we should continue to move forward and grow as a country.

However, I believe it's equally important to recognize the contributions of those who helped make America the greatest country in the world. Although America has made great strides in its quest for equality for all citizens, we are not all the way there yet. But I believe this country is headed in the right direction.

A first term Airman recently asked, "Why isn't there a White History Month?" The simple answer is that historically, the contributions of minorities and women have been glossed over or totally erased from the history books. We received lessons on white history all through elementary, high school and college. But that isn't the complete answer.

The truth is there are presidential proclamations establishing German-American, Irish-American, European American Heritage Months and many others. Although these months, and many others are celebrated throughout the U.S., are not mandated by the Department of Defense like the special observances that have become the norm.

I've heard people say, "It's our month now", referring to their cultural group. Special observances aren't for the group being recognized. They're for everyone. The purpose of a cultural observance is to recognize the achievements of all Americans to American culture and to increase awareness, mutual respect and understanding.

They are designed to enhance cross-cultural and cross-gender awareness and

promote harmony among the Air Force family. I encourage you to get out and learn something about different cultures. It's guaranteed that you'll find out something you didn't know, even about your own cultural group.

Diversity Day Celebration on Aug. 19. On this day, the base will recognize the contributions of all cultural groups to American society.

Air Force has new weapon in fight against Spice

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Air Force officials began drug testing Airmen Feb. 22 to determine whether they are using Spice - the street term for a range of designer synthetic-cannabinoid products.

With the implementation of testing, officials intend to send a very clear message: use Spice, and you may lose your career, end up in jail or both, officials said. Spice, also commonly referred to as herbal incense, is mistakenly perceived by some Airmen as a legal or safe alternative to marijuana," said Dr. Aaron Jacobs, the Air Force Drug Testing program manager. Side effects can include panic attacks, hallucinations, delusions, vomiting, increased agitation and dilated pupils, he said.

"Additional harmful effects are still unknown, so individuals are tak-

ing significant risks to their health when they use Spice," he said.

Drug Enforcement Administration officials recently took steps toward listing five chemicals used to make Spice as schedule I controlled substances, meaning they will be illegal to possess, distribute or manufacture in the U.S. According to the DEA website, this action was taken as an emergency measure due to an increasing number of reports from poison control centers, hospitals and law enforcement agencies regarding these products. Use of these substances is strictly prohibited for Airmen. The prohibition is contained both in AFI 44-120, Military Drug Demand Reduction Program and the AFGM to AFI 44-121, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Treatment Program.

Airmen who use Spice are subject

to prosecution under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Air Force officials have taken disciplinary action against Airmen identified as using Spice and continue to aggressively enforce the prohibition through courts-martial and nonjudicial punishment.

In 2010, 177 Airmen received non-judicial punishment for using Spice and another 83 Airmen faced Spice charges at courts-martial.

Air Force Drug Testing Lab technicians will utilize the expertise of the Armed Forces Medical Examiners Systems to conduct the specialized testing.

Dr. Jacobs added that the Air Force is also mounting a robust education and awareness campaign to ensure all Airmen understand the risks of possessing and/or consuming these dangerous products.

Black ice: The stealth road hazard

Black ice is an age-old winter phenomenon that has sent many drivers skidding and sliding down what looked like a dry road. Black ice can appear to be a spot of moisture on a road, or may have a slight glisten on black asphalt. Do not be mistaken, this thin ice is very slick, and a car can skid rapidly on it.

Team Minot Airmen should drive carefully on roads where snow banks have melted throughout the day, and exercise caution when driving under bridges and overpasses. If the car starts to skid, do not slam on the brakes unless the vehicle is equipped with an anti-lock braking system.

What can a person do to prepare for black ice?

Look for signs of ice other than on the roadway. This means looking for ice on windshield wipers, side view mirrors, on road signs, trees or on fences along the highway. If ice is forming on any of those things, it's possible that it may be on the road as well.

Then again, ice may not have formed on anything but the road. For example, it may have been a warm day during which the snow melted and then froze after the temperature dropped at night. In other cases, there will be ice in shaded areas, such as cuts through hills and along the banks, before there will be ice on the open roads.

If black ice has possibly formed, one may want to test for it by gently wiggling the car a little bit or by applying the brakes lightly to see if there's any change in the feel of the road. Another good tip for winter driving is to listen to the radio for

reports on the temperature outside. When the roads have been wet and the temperature drops below freezing, ice can form quickly. If driving frequently in the winter weather, it is a good idea to install an outdoor thermometer in the car, allowing one

to monitor the outside temperature.

This is also the type of weather when it is especially important to watch for those signs reminding drivers that bridges freeze before roads do. These signs tell drivers that there is a bridge ahead, giving driver's

ample time to slow down.

If living in an area where frost occurs, black ice is always a possibility. Use extreme caution when driving on cold mornings where there is evidence of frozen moisture on the roadway.

Ice fishing, thin ice can be a recipe for disaster

The old saying, "You're on thin ice" usually means a person is speaking of a subject matter best left alone. The reason behind the saying is obvious - those attempting to walk on thin ice are quite likely to be swimming in short order.

Every year, many Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen and Team Minot Airman head out onto frozen lakes in search of that one good fishing hole. Unfortunately, many people end up at the bottom of the lake, trapped in their vehicle. There always seems to be that one guy who is oblivious to the rapidly approaching spring weather, and while trying to get in just one more weekend out on the lake, ends up falling through the ice.

There is no set amount of solid ice guaranteed to be safe enough to

walk on; however, there are general guidelines that will provide a good approximation.

Rivers and river outlets flowing into lakes are dangerous areas throughout the winter months. Currents can erode ice, even when there's no indication of weakening on the surface. The only sure way to know how thick the ice is would be to drill test holes along the intended path.

North Dakota regulations require ice fishing houses and shelters to be removed from lakes no later than the Mar. 15. This does not however, guarantee safe ice until that last weekend. If it is an unusually warm winter, that weekend would be too late for vehicles or recreational equipment to go out on the ice.

Those wanting to ice fish can't count on some government agency to

protect them while venturing out on the ice. It's ultimately that person's responsibility to verify the ice conditions and be constantly aware of their surroundings.

Those fishing out on Lake Audubon and Sakakawea Lake often drag a canoe or small row boat with them. Like these fisherman, carrying a minimum amount of gear would provide a way to load up and return to safety with minimum loss.

In closing, here are a few tips if you must venture out onto the ice during the spring thaw.

- Use caution near bridges and trestles, as the structures conduct heat in the water, causing ice near these areas to be more dangerous. This is also true for areas where there is a current running through the water.


- Be watchful when traveling on the ice at night or in fog. Reduced visibility increases your chances of driving into open water or onto weak ice. This is a frequent cause of ATV and snowmobile related crashes.

- Use the buddy system. A friend may be able to help in case of emergency or go for help if you get into difficulty. Before leaving home, tell someone about the destination and what the expected returning time.

- Always wear a float suit or a life-jacket. Wearing a personal flotation device increases chances of survival.

- Take safety equipment with you. Ice picks, a rope and a cell phone can make a big difference.

- Avoid alcohol. Alcohol impairs one's judgment, coordination and reaction time and also speeds up hypothermia.

Cheyenne civic leader earns Distinguished Public Service Award

F. E. WARREN AIR FORCE BASE, WYO - Retired Col. Tucker Fagan received the Air Force Distinguished Public Service Award during a ceremony Feb. 4 at Joint Base Anacostia-Bolling.

The award is the highest honorary civilian award the Secretary of the Air Force may grant to a private citizen, and was earned for his advocacy of Air Force issues and for his dedicated support of Airmen and their families while serving as a member of the Air Force Chief of Staff Civic Leader Program.

"This has been an amazing experience to be asked and selected to be a part of this program for the last six years..." Colonel Fagan stated. "...and to receive this award, is such an honor. I was blown away."

As an Air Force Civic Leader, Mr. Fagan served as an unpaid advisor, key communicator and advocate for Air Force issues. He provided ideas and feedback to the SecAF, Chief of Staff, and other Air Force senior leaders about how missions can best be accomplished in his respective area and about public attitudes toward the Air Force and Air Force activities.

"I was the guy who brought the missile perspective to this group of people," Mr. Fagan stated. "F. E. Warren Air Force Base was my first assignment. I pulled crew here for five years. I have lived and breathed this mission since my first day on the job."

"A few years ago, the CSAF brought AF senior leadership and the Civic Leader Group out to F. E. Warren to help them understand the 20th AF mission. Most of them never knew what goes on here and at Minot and Malmstrom.

"I remember it was a windy day, like most here, and a little chilly," he continued. "Some individuals didn't even want to get off the bus. I reminded them that our cops, our crews, our maintenance teams travel these roads every day. Our cops stand top-side in this kind of weather securing our weapons. Our crews drive this every day, and our maintenance teams work outside in these conditions."

Current 90th Missile Wing commander, Col. Greg Tims, admits he is a big fan of Mr. Fagan, who was also a former wing commander and vice commander of 20th AF here.

"This man and his understanding of our mission have been essential to fostering strong support within our local community and as a liaison to senior, military leadership," said Colonel Tims. "Colonel Fagan has proven to be a mentor to every wing commander and 20th AF commander since his retirement. His continued support is truly invaluable."

Mr. Fagan was the interface between the Air Force and the civilian community near F. E. Warren Air Force Base, Wyo. In this role, he explained and interpreted Air Force programs, positions, and problems to other key communicators through his personal contacts and correspondence, and to the general

public through statements, appearances and speeches.

"The job as a missile crew member was absolutely the hardest job I have ever had," Mr. Fagan confirmed. "The constant evaluations, the constant need to study... codes, security checklists... I never made less than a 100 on every test I ever took on crew. I took it then, and still take this mission now, that seriously."

"That job while pulling crew prepared me for every other job, and made every other job look easy in comparison," he said.

Colonel Fagan is now an Emeritus member of the program but continues to serve as an advocate and ardent supporter of Airmen and their families.

"The Air Force and Wyoming has been so great to my

family and me," he said. "It is my turn to give it back."

The Air Force Chief of Staff Civic Leader Program is comprised of two represen-

tatives from nearly every major command, National Guard Bureau and Headquarters Air Force. Its members serve for a three-year term.

Tricare enrollment process streamlined

Prairie Adventures

Let's see, February is winding down.

Here in North Dakota, ice fishing never really got going in large part because of Mother Nature's unrelenting grip on snow, wind, cold, and more snow, wind, and cold. It was compounded by fact that anglers could only get on a few lakes where access was attained through the benevolence of local ingenuity.

Despite limited ice fishing, a few outdoor-related things are still going on: aerial deer surveys, for example. Snowshoeing and snowmobiling. Finalizing details so 2011 bighorn sheep, elk, and moose applications can be available in March.

Looking around at our neighbors, things are happening in the outdoor arena in places like Montana, Minnesota, South Dakota, and Wyoming, as well.

For example:

In South Dakota, the legislature is also tackling a multitude of hunting legislation. One bill, House Bill 1065, transfers S. D. Game, Fish, and Parks Department money to South Dakota State University to fund part of the university's wildlife and fisheries instruction. The South Dakota legislature's Appropriations Committee gave it a do-pass recommendation. If you want to check results from the 2010 South Dakota mountain lion season, that's now available on their Web site.

Over in Montana, the Fish, Wildlife, and Parks Commission is taking comments on a proposal revising deer, elk, and pronghorn regulations pertaining to acceptable muzzleloader and shotgun ammunition used in Weapons Restriction Areas, which are located near developed areas. The proposal would limit sabots and ammunition with enhanced range and is being considered due to safety issues in populated areas.

Down in Wyoming, nonresident hunters are gearing up for that state's March 15 pronghorn and deer application deadline. Nonresident elk and spring turkey applicants can now go online to the Wyoming Game and Fish Department Web site to find out if they received a license.

And like North Dakota, wind energy is a topic of discussion in Wyoming. The Web site also includes several wildlife-related stories on the issue.

Over in Minnesota, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is making headlines but this time not in captive herds where it's been identified in the past. A wild deer in southeastern Minnesota tested positive for CWD, marking the first confirmed case of the fatal disease in the state's wild deer population. As if that news isn't depressing enough, northeastern Minnesota also has bad news regarding its moose population: Minnesota Department of Natural Resources aerial surveys indicated record low calf-to-ratios of 24 calves for every 100 cows. The overall moose population in northeastern Minnesota is estimated to be down by about 600 animals.

On top of that, anglers participating in recent major ice fishing tournament in Minnesota failed to land a fish.

Zero. Yup, not one fish was caught among 2,200 anglers at the Alexandria Ice Fishing Challenge on Lake Agnes. The top prize would've been \$10,000. According to the Associated Press, tournament organizers opted to roll the money into next year's event because they couldn't draw names to give prizes away. That would have made it a raffle and they didn't have a raffle permit.

And we thought North Dakota's ice fishing season was one to forget about.

Remaining deer samples negative for CWD

The remaining 3,600 North Dakota deer samples that were tested for chronic wasting disease are negative, according to Dr. Dan Grove, wildlife veterinarian for the State Game and Fish Department.

In all, more than 4,200 targeted and hunter-harvested samples from 2010 were sent to a lab at Michigan State University. One mule deer taken last fall in unit 3F2 in western Grant County tested positive for CWD, the second positive sample taken from a North Dakota animal. The first was taken during the deer gun season in 2009, also from a mule deer in unit 3F2.

The hunter-harvested surveillance program annually collects samples from hunter-harvested deer in specific regions of the state. In addition to unit 3F2, samples during the 2010 deer gun season were collected from units in the eastern third of the state.

In addition to hunter-harvested deer, the Game and Fish Department has a targeted surveillance program that is an ongoing, year-round effort that tests animals found dead or sick.


CWD affects the nervous system of members of the deer family and is always fatal. Scientists have found no evidence that CWD can be transmitted naturally to humans or livestock.

Comments accepted on public access, habitat program

The grant, Voluntary Public Access-Habitat Program, was authorized by the 2008 farm bill.

Hunter education classes filling up
Adults and children looking to take a hunter education class in 2011 are reminded to enroll now as the majority of all classes are held by the end of May.

Jon Hanson, hunter education coordinator for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, said classes held early in the year fill up quickly because of the deer application deadline. "There is a major demand for classes held before June because they will qualify students for submitting a deer application," Hanson said.

Hunters who had an apprentice hunting license in 2010 are also reminded they will need to take a hunter

education class to continue hunting in 2011. The apprentice license provides individuals age 16 and older with a one-year hunter education exemption for small game and deer.

To register for a class, students should access the Game and Fish Department website at gf.nd.gov and click on the education/outreach link and "hunter education." Classes are listed by city, and can also be sorted by start date. Click on "enroll" next to the specific class, and follow the simple instructions. Personal information is required.

Those who do not have access to the Internet and want to sign up for a class can call the hunter education program in Bismarck at (701) 328-6615.

The Game and Fish website also provides a free hunter education study guide and a tree stand safety course.

State law requires anyone born after Dec. 31, 1961 to pass a certified hunter education course to hunt in the state. Hunter education is mandatory for youth who are turning 12 years old, and children can take the class at age 11.

They wanted to leave a piece of their past with the station, so during the tour they passed on a plaque with all their names on it.

"Over the years, my thoughts drifted back in time to the friends of Malmstrom," said Mr. Howard Schnieder, a previous Malmstrom firefighter and attendee of the reunion. "The best friends I have ever known."

After their stop at Malmstrom, the two-day reunion was highlighted with a formal ceremony. At the ceremony, their former commander, Col. Duane Knutson, handed out the Warrior's Medal of Valor to each of them.

Simple Frittata

- 1 (16-ounce) package frozen pierogies
- 6 asparagus spears, each cut into 1-inch pieces
- 6 large eggs
- 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup shredded Gruyere or Swiss cheese
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon butter

Boil pierogies as package directs. Drain. Heat asparagus in small saucepan in enough water to cover to boiling over high heat. Reduce heat to low; simmer 2 to 3 minutes or until asparagus are tender. Drain well and pat dry.
 Beat eggs, milk, parsley, salt and pepper in medium-size bowl; stir in shredded cheese. Set aside.
 Preheat oven to 400°F. Melt butter in 10-inch oven-proof skillet over medium heat. Add half of egg mixture; top with pierogies, asparagus and remaining egg mixture. Cook until frittata is just set around edges, about 5 minutes. Place skillet in oven; cook until frittata is set, 5 to 8 minutes. Serve immediately.



Governor Jack Dalrymple has proclaimed March 4, 2011, as 'Dress in Blue Day' in North Dakota. On Dress in Blue Day, people across the nation wear blue to promote awareness about colorectal cancer and encourage people to get screened.

"Colorectal Cancer is the second most diagnosed cancer for men and women in North Dakota," said Joyce Saylor, Comprehensive Cancer Prevention and Control Program director for the North Dakota Department of Health. "Increasing awareness of the importance of colorectal cancer screening is essential in reducing the number of North Dakotans diagnosed with and dying from this disease."

The Department of Health offers these important points about colorectal cancer:

- If you're 50 or older, see your doctor to get screened. For those with a family history of the disease, screening should begin earlier.
 - Colorectal cancer and precancerous polyps don't always cause symptoms.
 - Colorectal cancer affects both women and men and all races and ethnicities.
 - When cancer is found early, colorectal cancer treatment can be very effective and save lives.
 - Many insurance plans help pay for screenings that can detect colorectal cancer.
- "Colorectal cancer is preventable and curable. Remov-

ing precancerous polyps can prevent cancer in the earliest stage, when over 90 percent of colorectal cancers can be cured," said Dr. John Leitch, chair of the North Dakota Cancer Coalition. "Every North Dakotan 50 and older needs colorectal cancer screening."

Dress in Blue Day is an opportunity for worksites, organizations and communities to take a stand against colorectal cancer by wearing blue and spreading the important message of colorectal cancer screening.
