



Critical self-assessment puts AFGSC on right path

With the Air Force conducting operations on multiple fronts across the globe and facing shrinking resources, Air Force Global Strike Command is focusing on finding smarter ways to accomplish the mission.

“(The Analyses, Assessments and Lessons Learned Directorate) is the entity that is aimed at helping the command — at all levels — to not have to relearn anything,” said Lt. Col. Dwayne Hall, Lessons Learned division chief. “If people keep walking into the same wall, we’re going to keep experiencing the same pain each time.”

The directorate, known as A9, helps the commander, headquarters staff and commanders at the Command’s six wings improve efficiency and effectiveness.

One of the biggest advantages A9 has, according to Colonel Hall, is the ability to send staff members out to the wings to talk face to face with the people facing a problem or trying to resolve an issue.

“Where we really make our money in A9 is when we sit down with people and interview them,” he said.

Colonel Hall said once an issue is identified, the staff calls in expertise from across the command.

“We take issues that the wings are struggling with on a daily basis and bring them back to the staff. Then we can help create opportunities for change and help them focus their efforts,” Colonel Hall said. “We can focus on any issue that someone feels is important.”

“We can’t afford to stay fat, dumb and happy,” he said. “We should all be concerned with capturing the experiences of Airmen and incorporating the best ideas at all levels. Our focus is to help produce a lean, effective combat capability.”

One way the directorate

Barksdale utilizes energy conservation on and off duty

Managing energy consumption and conserving natural resources continues to be a priority for the U.S. Air Force.

Currently, Barksdale uses approximately \$5 million in electric energy and \$2 million in natural gas energy annually.

According to John McLaughlin, 2nd Civil Engineer Squadron base energy manager, Barksdale’s energy intensity is currently the lowest in Air Force Global Strike Command.

“Our intensity is the lowest in the command, but we aren’t saving as much as everyone else because our energy intensity is already so low, we don’t have much to save on,” he said.

The money Barksdale saves on energy conservation is routinely funneled back into the base to enable the mission and improve the quality of the facilities.

“Energy conservation is an easy and smart way to conserve costs, so we can spend it in other areas where we really need it,” said Larry Stevens, 2 CES resource efficiency manager.

Barksdale’s energy conservation plan is a three-tiered system aimed at long-term energy saving goals. The tiers involve im-

proving infrastructures the base already has and energy saving measures to implement in future infrastructures and current construction.

“We are trying to replace our older technology in our historic buildings with newer technology that is more energy efficient,” Stevens said. “We are working on installing more energy efficient hot water heaters, boilers and lighting. We have projects in commercial buildings, dorms, hangars and maintenance buildings all across the base to reduce the energy intensity further.”

Further examples of these updates include installing occupancy sensors in bathrooms so the lights will automatically turn off when the room is empty. The 2 CES is also in the process of hooking buildings up to the Energy Management Control System, which regulates temperature in offices from a central control point.

According to David Sanders, 2 CES asset optimization executive chief, these improvements can only go so far in conserving energy.

“We’ve utilized technology just about as far as we can here,” he added. “I think our biggest stride for energy conservation can be made by changing the culture of the people. There are a lot more

opportunities there than you think, when you get someone to turn a light off, I think that can really go a long way.”

McLaughlin said when it comes to changing a culture and changing the way people conserve energy, Airmen who advocate for the cause may feel alone when they attempt to change the culture in their offices and even in their own homes.

“My advice to those individuals is to keep talking about it, keep doing what you are doing to conserve energy. If they make the information available at every angle people are eventually going to turn off that light when they leave the room. They do it because they want to or they’ll do it because they don’t want to hear about it anymore. They shouldn’t feel like they are alone — it is the right thing to do and hopefully they can find one or two more people to help them with it,” McLaughlin said.

McLaughlin hopes that 2 CES can utilize social media to help change the culture.

“My pet project right now is trying to get an energy awareness program started,” he said. “There are so many outlets for all this information that it is so easily accessible that Airmen and civilians will have the information at their

fingertips — there is no way that someone can’t help but stumble across it.”

Some of the information one might find on such resources might include energy-saving tips to practice in their home. Airmen would be encouraged to turn off and unplug lights and electronics when they are not in use. Set air-conditioning units at a higher temperature while out of the house in the middle of the day. Purchase energy efficient appliances and compact fluorescent light bulbs. Set water heaters lower while out of town and make energy-efficient home improvements.

McLaughlin encourages home owners to be conservative despite energy-saving purchases.

“You can buy the most energy efficient air conditioner in the world, but if you leave it on full-blast, it’s still using energy,” he explained. “You can save much more energy just by turning off a light switch when you leave a room than by buying energy-saving lighting. It’s all about having the presence of mind to not be wasteful.”

Betty Thomas, The Landings at Barksdale maintenance supervisor, agrees. The Landings at Barksdale help residents “go green” by making the homes more energy efficient; however, Thomas said

For more than six decades, survivors of the Holocaust educated the world about systematic persecution and annihilation of more than 6 million people based on their racial, ethnical and political differences by speaking about this historical event.

Their desire is to create awareness and to carry on the memory of those who did not survive the Holocaust. However, as time passes there are fewer and fewer left to tell their story. In observance, Barksdale's Days of Remembrance Committee will host a variety of events meant to educate and enlighten.

The United States Congress established the weeklong event as our nation's annual commemoration to the destruction of human life during the Holocaust. The 2011 Days of Remembrance observance will begin May 1 and end May 8, with a theme of "Justice and Accountability in the Face of Genocide: What Have We Learned?"

does this is by focusing on areas important to the command.

"We attempt to marry up with the efforts that are consuming time and effort at the headquarters, Numbered Air Forces and wings," Colonel Hall said.

In keeping with the Command's value of "critical self assessment," the Analyses and Assessments division looks at everything from current and future weapons systems to force structure within the Command, to ensure that leaders have the best information possible when making decisions, the colonel said.

"Our Analyses and Assessments folks can help tell a more detailed story and help staff action officers convey a more detailed solution/problem set," he said. "In essence, our guys take us beyond the anecdotal answer to the scientific analytical answer."

Those detailed analyses and recommendations from Lessons Learned have led to a number of successes since the standup of the Command, including recommending a Bomber Generation training course to educate individuals about the aircraft generation process. This training course clarified the role played by Task Force 204 for squadron commanders and their planning personnel.

Another Lessons Learned success was the current development of more comprehensive and telling metrics to improve ICBM maintenance processes to better predict system sustainment and health of force concerns.

"The basis for our existence is to focus critical resources, people and missions on the right path," Colonel Hall said.

Residents can certainly do more to conserve energy.

"We use energy saver fluorescent light bulbs, dual pane windows, programmable digital thermostats and Energy Star appliances in many of the homes," she said. "A lot of energy conservation is really in the hands of the residents, to use CLF bulbs, program their thermostats and turn-off and unplug their electronics."

McLaughlin stresses the use of these energy-saving techniques not only at home, but in base work centers as well.

"Taking care of energy at your home is a very personal thing, because it comes down to saving money — it's a little less personal to take care of energy here on base," he said. "If you have the habit of conserving energy at home, it'll carry over to work. If you just take the time to think, 'I can

save energy to save money."

In the end, it is up to each individual to find their own motivation to conserve. Stevens knows without a doubt what his motivation is.

"We are running out of re-


sources," he concluded. "If we don't conserve some of our resources it's just going to be extraordinarily hard for our children and our grandchildren to live. To me, that is an incentive not to be wasteful."

Barksdale Airmen acknowledge Alcohol Awareness Month

Airmen at Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, are acknowledging April as Alcohol Awareness Month and the Department of Defense is encouraging servicemembers and their families to rethink their alcohol consumption.

"Nearly 14 million Americans, one in every 13 adults, abuse alcohol or have an alcohol problem,"

said Staff Sgt. Brandon Woods, noncommissioned officer-in-charge of Barksdale's Alcohol Drug Abuse Prevention Treatment program. "Fewer than 25 percent of those who need treatment get help. We have to ensure that we know what constitutes an alcohol problem and how to get help."

Alcohol Awareness Month began in 1987 in an effort to educate the American public about

the disease of alcoholism — that it is treatable, that it is not a moral weakness and that alcoholics are capable of recovery. ADAPT personnel are posting fliers around base in an effort to promote responsible drinking.

"We have passed out information at the gates and there is also a booth located in the atrium inside the Medical Group with facts and information about alcohol," Sergeant Woods said. "We will also

have a booth set up at the 5K this month to pass out water bottles and alcohol information."

The ADAPT office wants Barksdale Airmen to understand that the decision to drink alcohol is theirs and if they choose to drink alcohol it has to be done responsibly, as Sergeant Woods said, "irresponsible drinking could lead to significant problems in your life."

1st Lieutenant Carrie Lucas,

ADAPT program manager, also urges Airmen to seek help if they need it, Military Pathways a DoD funded program, is offering anonymous alcohol use self-assessments online at www.DrinkingIQ.org or over the phone at (877) 877-3547.


Sergeant Woods reminds Airmen that, "Although April is dedicated Alcohol Awareness Month, we should always be responsible when it comes to alcohol use."







Military retirement: should I stay or go?

2nd Bomb Wing Public Affairs Retired Chief Master Sgt. Larry Gonzales visited Barksdale to educate Airmen about the benefits of military retirement April 6. Breaking down civilian and military retirement plans side by side is beneficial to Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen stationed here who are undecided about their military future.

Gonzales spent 30 years in the Air Force and served as the financial management career field manager. His briefing highlighted the benefits of military retirement, although he insists that it is not meant to persuade anyone to retire.

"I am not trying to convince anyone that military retirement is the right choice for them," Gonzales said. "I simply want people to be able to make an informed decision."

Gonzales' briefing went into detail about aspects of retirement most people do not consider when making a choice about their future, a mistake Gonzales said

can cost military members money in the long run.

"People have to take everything into account and consider more than the initial dollar amount," he said.

One major benefit of military retirement is the retiree cost of living adjustment. Similar to military base pay, retiree pay is adjusted annually to offset inflation. This continued growth after retirement is one benefit that this type of plan has over most corporate retirement plans.

Airman 1st Class Joseph Senteno, 2nd Comptroller Squadron budget technician, knows the importance of planning for the future and was on hand to


learn from Gonzales.


Airman Senteno, like most junior enlisted service members, has a long time before he has to make a decision about retirement, but it is never too early to start planning.

Good Order and Discipline

From 2nd Bomb Wing Office of the Staff Judge Advocate

"Discipline is the soul of an army. It makes small numbers formidable; procures success to the weak, and esteem to all." — George Washington.

Nonjudicial punishment is a tool that provides commanders with an essential and swift means of maintaining good order and discipline. It also promotes behavior changes in service members without the stigma of a court-martial conviction. Article 15 punishment is ordinarily offered for less serious violations of the UCMJ. A commander can impose nonjudicial punishment of correctional custody, forfeiture of pay, reduction in grade, extra duties, reprimand, and restriction. Certain punishments may also be suspended up to six months. If the member commits any subsequent misconduct during a period of suspension, the suspended punishment may be vacated and implemented.

The following Airmen received nonjudicial punishment in March:

Nonjudicial Punishment

2nd Aerospace Medical Squadron

A senior airman received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 11I, driving while intoxicated. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman first class.

2nd Aircraft Maintenance Squadron

A senior airman received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, failure to obey an order. Punishment imposed consisted of a suspended reduction to the rank of airman first class and 15 days of extra duty,

suspended.

A staff sergeant received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, dereliction of duty, Article 93, cruelty and maltreatment, and Article 134, indecent language. Punishment imposed consisted of a suspended reduction to the rank of senior airman, suspended forfeitures of \$475 pay per month for two months and 14 days of extra duty.

A senior airman received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 134, dishonorably failing to pay a debt. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman first class, suspended forfeitures of \$975 pay per month for two months, 45 days of extra duty, in which 20 days were suspended, and a reprimand.

An airman first class received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 86, failure to go, and Article 92, dereliction of duty. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman, with an additional reduction to the rank of airman basic suspended, and 30 days extra duty, suspended.

2nd Civil Engineer Squadron

An airman first class received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, failure to obey a lawful general regulation, by wrongfully using an intoxicating substance commonly referred to as spice. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman basic. The member is currently being processed for administrative discharge.

2nd Communications Squadron

A staff sergeant received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, dereliction of duty. Punishment imposed con-

sisted of a reduction to the rank of senior airman, suspended forfeitures of \$500 pay per month for two months, and 14 days of extra duty.

2nd Comptroller Squadron

An airman first class received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, failure to obey a lawful general regulation, by wrongfully using an intoxicating substance commonly referred to as spice. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman. The member was then administratively separated from the Air Force with a general discharge.

2nd Maintenance Squadron

A senior airman received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, failure to obey an order, by not following a technical order, and Article 107, false official statement. Punishment imposed consisted of a suspended reduction to the rank of airman first class, forfeitures of \$100 pay per month for two months, 45 days of extra duty, and a reprimand.

2nd Operations Support Squadron

An airman first class received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 134, incapacitation for duty due to excessive alcohol use. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman, 15 days of extra duty, and a reprimand.


2nd Security Forces Squadron

An airman first class received nonjudicial punishment for violation of Article 92, failure to obey a regulation. Punishment imposed consisted of a reduction to the rank of airman, forfeitures of \$822 pay per month for two months, and 20 days extra duty, suspended.

Spice, bath salt testing

Military drug testing laboratories now

possess the capability to test urine specimens for synthetic cannabinoids as well as MDPV, mephedrone and other known chemicals commonly found in bath salts. Spice and products sold as "bath salts," in their many forms, are increasingly known to be very dangerous drugs. Airmen should be aware the ingestion of any substance, other than alcohol or tobacco, for the purpose of altering mood or function is a violation of AFI 44-121 and punishable under Article 92, Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Education grant program

Concerned about the soaring cost of higher education for your children? Maybe the Air Force Aid Society (AFAS) can help. Under its General Henry H. Arnold Education Grant Program, the society awards \$2,000 each to selected applicants. The program continues to be offered to dependent sons and daughters of active duty, Title 10 AGR/reservists on extended active duty, Title 32 AGR performing full-time active duty, retired, retired reservists with 20-plus qualifying years of service, and deceased Air Force members. Spouses (residing state-side) of active duty and Title 10 AGR/reservists on extended active duty; and surviving spouses of deceased members are also eligible candidates.

Last year, 23 children and eight spouses from Barksdale were awarded education grants from the Air Force Aid Society through the General Henry H. Arnold Education Grant Program. For questions, contact an Air Force Aid representative at the Airman & Family Readiness Center at (318) 456-8400.

AFI 44-121 guidance

The Air Force recently published an Air Force Guidance Memorandum revising AFI 44-121, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Treatment program. The revised language makes punitive the prohibition in the current AFI regarding the ingestion of any substance (other than alcohol or tobacco) for the purpose of altering mood or function. The possession of any intoxicating substance described in this paragraph, if done with the intent to use in a manner that would alter mood or function, is also prohibited. As the new AFI provisions are punitive, violations of the expanded prohibitions will be punishable as violations of a lawful general regulation under Article 92, UCMJ. This revision is an addition to the already existing tools used by commanders to address the abuse of otherwise lawful substances such as spice, salvia, inhalants, propellants, solvents, household chemicals,

others substances used for "huffing," prescription or over-the-counter medications when used in a manner contrary to their intended medical purpose or in excess of the prescribed dosage.
