



## Barksdale celebrates Earth Day

"It's imperative to take time to talk about the planet on Earth Day so we can educate individuals on the importance of issues dealing with the environment," said Brian Larrimer, 2nd Civil Engineer Squadron, base hazardous materials manager.

The Barksdale Child Development Center is utilizing this educational opportunity with the children of Barksdale.

"We are celebrating Earth Day as part of the Month of the Military Child," said Gloria Hampton, 2nd Force Support Squadron, child development center training and curriculum specialist. "We give all the children plastic gloves. We have to show some of them how to use them, and then we go out to the playground and clean up. We have the children throw their trash in the bins and bags, and we have them take the sticks they find out there and make birdhouses and things of that nature for them to take home."

Not all organizations host events today due to the Easter holiday weekend, but the 2 CES environmental flight used Wednesday to educate individuals on the importance of issues dealing with the environment.

"Our office is responsible for environmental compliance throughout the base," Larrimer said. "We make sure the base stays within compliance on air, water, hazardous and solid waste standards. We run programs such as recycling and pollution prevention, but we also take this time to educate children about these issues."

Each year, area youths are given the opportunity to come on base and learn from the environmental flight about various conservation and preservation issues.

## Barksdale Airmen provide dental care during humanitarian mission

SAN VICENTE, El Salvador — Hector Flores was simply going for an afternoon walk, nothing more.

But as the 35-year-old farmer passed the Salvadoran Army's 5th Infantry Brigade Headquarters in San Vicente, his friend relayed him a useful message.

"Remember that toothache you had, Hector?" his friend asked. "You can get it fixed at infantry headquarters."

As Flores walked into the military training facility, U.S. Airmen from Barksdale Air Force Base were there ready to give dental care to anyone willing to ask for it. The humanitarian dental service, set to last two weeks, began Monday. It is part of Beyond the Horizon 2011, a four-month-long, joint-service training exercise to provide humanitarian and civic assistance for the Salvadoran region most affected by Hurricane Ida in 2009.

Landslides that damaged large portions of San Vicente's infrastructure further burdened a dental system struggling to aid a growing population. Primary dental care is free in El Salvador, but the price of care isn't the problem. Salvadoran water lacks fluoride to help combat sugars that create cavities. The nation also only has one dentist for every 30,000 people, said Jose Ismail Alvarado, San Vicente's orthodontics supervisor.

"This is a big problem here," Alvarado said. "This program is great for this city because it really is going to help a large portion of people get care they wouldn't have gotten otherwise."

Twenty-eight Airmen from around the United States volunteered for the effort: 12

dentists, 15 assistants, one laboratory technician and one bio-medical equipment technician. The personnel will assist Salvadoran citizens with cleanings, fillings, extractions, fluoride treatment, root canals and dental prosthetics.

"This exercise gives Airmen a great chance to work with a host nation and experience what goes in to a short-term deployment," said Lt. Col. Mike Webb, the Air Force commander for the exercise.

More than 200 first and second grade students of Centro Escolar Victoriano Rodriguez were the initial patients for the exercise Monday.

"This is something I really wanted to do," said Senior Airman Misty Harris, of Aerospace Medical School at Beale Air Force Base, Calif.

Harris received news about the exercise last year through an e-mail seeking volunteers.

"I jumped on the opportunity right away," Airmen Harris said. "To come here and have the chance to help people of a different culture really interested me."

For San Vicente, the town most devastated by Hurricane Ida because of its position near hurricane-induced landslides, the help couldn't have come at a better time. El Salvador only has 14 orthodontics departments to treat more than 6 million citizens.

Health care, especially dental care, is often neglected because of their inability to get care, Alvarado said.

The Airmen deployed here for the exercise set a goal of treating 200 people per day for two weeks. On the first day here they served more than 300 people with dental care, which has them well on their way to exceeding the goal of 2,500 patients in two weeks.

The Airmen will also provide training for Salvadoran soldiers so they can apply knowledge gained in the future.

"The people who have heard about the exercise are very excited to get the care," Alvarado said. "This will really help out our city."

**KUNSAN AIR BASE, Republic of Korea** — The day we move away from home for the first time is a big stepping stone for most of us. It is the first time we are truly on our own, no longer dependent on our family to provide us with shelter and food.

While most of us are excited to move out, there are small considerations that should come to mind during that time, one of them being personal safety at our new locations.

I personally never made it a point to think about my safety. I did the normal things like always locking my doors and windows. I lived in an apartment complex on my college campus with several neighbors around, so I never thought I could be at risk with regard to the horror stories seen on TV.

Then, my friend told me her story. My friend, whom I will call Jaclyn,

was home alone when she heard a knock on her door. Not expecting danger, because she lived on campus and surely nothing would happen in her own dorm room with fellow students around, she opened the door. In the doorway stood a nice-looking young man who was holding a brochure for magazines. He quickly explained he was competing for a scholarship and if he was the first person to sell the most magazines he could win the money, which he desperately needed to help pay for his tuition. Jaclyn, being a kind-hearted person, decided to contribute to his cause. She told him she just needed to grab her wallet.

The minute Jaclyn turned around, the man shoved her to the ground and attempted to sexually assault her. Fortunately for Jaclyn, her instincts quickly kicked in and she fought back hard, eventually fighting off the assailant.

Unfortunately, the man who committed the crime was never found, leaving students feeling unsafe in their own homes. After the incident, my friends and I took steps to protect ourselves and one another from becoming victims of sexual assault.

It was not until I joined the Air Force that I really learned that not only is it important to defend myself, but it is also important to defend others. For me, that included wanting to get involved in a way that would support victims of sexual assault and to stop others from becoming victims. Knowing how my friends and I had been impacted after one of our own almost fell victim to this crime, I felt it was important for me to do something.

Through my personal experience in dealing with the sexual assault prevention and response program, I have witnessed first-hand that sexual as-

sault is an existing problem in today's military. Sadly, most cases are never reported and approximately 75 percent involve someone the victim knows. Within the Air Force, the predator is often a fellow Airman.

The military has taken great strides to better educate Airmen on how to prevent this crime. They've implemented bystander intervention training, which provides Airmen with the tools necessary to combat sexual assault in their daily lives. In addition, the Air Force participates in Sexual Assault Awareness Month using a Department of Defense-driven campaign designed to further educate military members about the existing problem, show what individuals can do to stop it, and reinforce the military's zero tolerance policy.

Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley, Air Force Chief of Staff

Gen. Norton Schwartz and Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James Roy stated in a message to Airmen, "Unfortunately, sexual assault continues to burden our Airmen and degrade our mission effectiveness. Sexual assault is a crime, and there is no place for this behavior in our Air Force. We demand better of ourselves."

This year's theme for SAAM is "Hurts one, Affects all," a motto I think is very fitting as I was personally affected by a friend's potential sexual assault. Sexual assault is an issue that does not just affect the victim, but it directly affects friends, family and co-workers. As Airmen in the United States Air Force, we are held to a higher caliber; our duty is to take care of one another and prevent issues such as sexual assault from affecting our peers, so together we can carry out our daily mission without interruption.

"One year, we took the kids out to see our recycling program for Earth Day," Larrimer said. "However, our recycling program has changed a bit since then, and we don't have the processing center anymore. That year, we showed them how we compact things, prepare recyclables for shipment and things of that nature. But we still teach them recycling through an informative video."

This year's off-base school will be a fourth-grade class from Shreve Island Elementary School in Shreveport.

"We will take them out to the natural resources office and show them the movie, then afterwards split them into two groups. Half the group will attend a presentation by the water program manager — she teaches the kids the importance of conserving water. The other group goes with our wildlife biologist — he will talk to them about different animals, explain

specifics about each animal, and answer any questions they may have," he continued.

Hampton said she hopes the children understand how they can help improve the environment.

"It is important to teach our children the importance of keeping our planet clean and safe. There is so much to see in nature; it's so beautiful out there, they need to understand to keep it that way, they need to throw their trash away responsibly. And we always remind them to wash their hands after they've picked up trash and put it in the proper bin," Hampton concluded.

The day, founded by U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson, was originally designed as a teach-in to remind people about Earth's natural environment and to help promote environmental awareness. However, since the first Earth Day in 1970, other nations around the world have adopted the day as well. Today more than 140 nations celebrate Earth Day annually on April 22.

## Changing the culture: Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Program members alert Airmen

Airmen at Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, are raising awareness and informing the public about what individuals can do to change the culture, as April is National Sexual Assault Awareness Month.

The Sexual Assault Awareness Month campaign explores common, everyday behaviors and offers individuals responsible ways to intervene.

"This is an important month in our nation for talking about and taking action against sexual assault," said Capt. Dallas Webb, Barksdale's Sexual Assault Response coordinator. "This month's events are specifically designed to be in line with the National, Department of Defense and Air Force objective to enhance awareness to the crime of sexual assault and to address bystanders' role in preventing sexual assault in our communities."

According to statistics, sexual assaults are the least reported violent crime with only a small percentage of victims stepping forward to report their assault. Advocates and volunteers are asked to unite with those individuals who step forward, and join the movement to end sexual violence.

Over the course of the month, several events are set up in support of this campaign as well as a proclamation signing. A sexual assault prevention team has also distributed pamphlets and information at the base gates and the 5K run as well as establishing an awareness table in the lobby of the 2nd Medical Group clinic.

"Our main goal, as stated in President Obama's address, is to 'continue to support new approaches that show promise in changing cultural attitudes toward sexual violence and preventing these crimes,'" said Francie Lockhart, Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Program facilitator for the 2 MDG.

"This prevention approach helps to create environments where people feel safe in their relationships, work places and communities."

# Russian Air Force chief visits Global Strike Command

A delegation of Russian Air Force members got an up-close look at the inside of a B-52 bomber on the flightline here April 4, while also meeting with senior Air Force Global Strike Command officials.

The Russian delegation was led by the commander of the Russian Federation Air Force, General-Colonel Alexander Nikolayevich Zelin. General-Colonel Zelin and his Russian staff also attended lunch at the Global Strike Command commander's residence. The visit was meant to strengthen relationships and nation-to-nation cooperation concerning strategic issues as part of the U.S. Air Force Chief of Staff Counterpart Visit Program.

The Russian Air Chief met with Lt. Gen. Jim Kowalski, Global Strike commander, and other command leaders to discuss training, safety and other areas of common interest.

While at Barksdale, General-Colonel Zelin and his team participated in two briefings. The first, given by 2nd Bomb Wing officials, focused on the capabilities of the B-52 Stratofortress. Another briefing attended by General Kowalski led to a wide-ranging discussion about the challenges of the strategic deterrence mission. According to officials several issues were discussed, from the stand-up of Air Force Global Strike Command to the merits of Global Strike Challenge, the command's annual bomb and missile competition.

The Counterpart Visit Program is designed to facilitate bilateral relations, and provide visiting nations' Air Force leaders with a firsthand view of the U.S. Air Force, while illustrating programs of mutual interest.

# Security forces members, DEA dispose of prescription drugs

Members of the 2nd Security Forces Squadron from Barksdale, home of Air Force Global Strike Command, will be taking back unwanted prescription drugs from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. April 30 at the Base Exchange.

The 2 SFS and the Drug Enforcement Administration will give the public another opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs.

"Bring your medications for disposal to Barksdale's BX at 455 Curtiss Road," said Staff Sgt. Matthew Jones, 2 SFS police services. "The service is free and anonymous,

no questions asked." Last September, Americans turned in 242,000 pounds — 121 tons — of prescription drugs at nearly 4,100 sites operated by the DEA and more than 3,000 state and local law enforcement partners, including 2 SFS.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse.

Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines — flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash — both pose potential safety and health hazards.

Four days after last fall's event, Congress passed the Secure and Responsible Drug Disposal Act of 2010, which amends the Controlled Substances Act to allow an "ultimate user" of controlled substance medications to dispose of them by delivering them to entities authorized by the Attorney General to accept them.

The Act also allows the Attorney General to authorize long-term care facilities to dispose of their residents' controlled substances in certain instances. DEA has begun drafting regulations to implement the act.

# Chief Roy: We must pay attention to nuclear careers

The nuclear weapons career field was recently the focus of the first-ever Air Force enlisted development team, a newly-implemented program designed to help guide the careers of senior enlisted Airmen across the Air Force.

Air Force Global Strike Command senior enlisted Airmen will benefit from the program, which focuses on careers of enlisted members by Air Force Specialty Code the same way that traditional development teams have focused on officer and civilian career development, training and education.

During the March 31 event, Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force James A. Roy said vectoring senior noncommissioned officers from the 2W2 nuclear weapons

career field is "critical to helping the Air Force accomplish its top priority of strengthening the nuclear enterprise."



"We felt it was appropriate to start with the 2W2s to handle the unique challenges associated with the nuclear enterprise," Chief Roy said.

"The purpose of deliberate development is to grow our senior Editor's Nor NCOs and grow the next generation of senior enlisted leaders to meet the highly technical and very complex leadership challenges the Department of Defense and the United States Air Force face in the future," Chief Roy said.

"This is important to a com-

mand like this one," said Chief Master Sgt. Paul Grady, chief enlisted manager for Air Force Global Strike Command's manpower and personnel directorate. "It is imperative that we have the right Airmen in the positions when entrusting them with the most powerful weapons in our Nation's arsenal."

Chief Grady said experience and range of perspectives are critical in senior noncommissioned officers and believes "the enlisted development team will help to develop these in our Airmen, building an elite, highly-disciplined team for our command."

The enlisted development team program evaluates targeted ranks within select Air Force specialty codes and will aid in assigning senior noncommissioned officers who have the right training, education and experience to fill crit-

ical positions within their career fields.

The initiative originated with the Air Force's Enlisted Force Development Panel and will enable the enlisted force to move forward in deliberately developing senior enlisted leaders.

As Chief Roy completed his remarks to the nuclear weapons enlisted development team panel, he reiterated his overarching goal for it and how the Air Force

develops the enlisted force for the future.

"The emphasis is on deliberate development as a whole," he said. "We need to ensure that our enlisted Airmen are developed deliberately for future DOD and Air Force needs."

The event, "Ruck March to Remember," involves service members from 18 Air Force installations and four major commands, including Air Force Global Strike Command, trekking from Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, to "Ground Zero" at the site of the World Trade Center attack in New York City.

Barksdale Airmen plan to ruck 148 miles from LaGrange to Livingston, Texas.

"We currently have 24 volunteers," said Master Sgt. Geoff Dunkelberger, 2nd Bomb Wing Inspector General, and Barksdale's point of contact for the march. "Each Airman will ruck 6.17 miles carrying a 30- to 40-pound ruck sack, giving us a total of 148 miles."

Tech. Sgt. Paul Stacey, 2 SFS unit deployment manager, said he was honored to be a part of this event.

"It makes me feel good to be able to show the family members and friends of those who were lost that there are still people out there that honor them and the legacy they left behind," he said.

"Every security forces member Air Force-wide felt the ramifications of what happened from increased deployments to the loss of security forces members down range."

When the Sept. 11 events occurred, security forces members here were on the flight line securing a 36-plane generation and Air Force One, Sergeant

Stacey explained.

"It's good we have the opportunity to get involved in something like this. 9/11 is an historic event — for everyone here and all over the world," he said.

Together with other Air Force personnel, Barksdale Airmen intend to make a statement.

"We are part of a thin blue line of Airmen who are security forces by trade, American patriots by blood, and connected to our brothers and sisters across the nation," said Lt. Col. Jonpaul Mickle, 2 SFS commander. "I think it is important to make this march and share a little physical sacrifice to remind service members why 4,680 of us have been killed in action."

The end of the march will be the most difficult part of the event, Sergeant Dunkelberger said.

"There are times when you are a part of something special and the hair stands up on the back of your neck, because you're doing something worthwhile. When that last person walks up carrying the Defender of Fortis flag, it's going to be hard — it will remind me of other endings like the people who didn't make it back," he said.







# President's plan likely to affect 2013 defense budget

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama's effort to seek additional savings within the Defense Department likely will affect the department's fiscal 2013 budget, Pentagon Press Secretary Geoff Morrell said April 13.

The president announced that he plans to work with Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates and Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, to find more savings within the Defense Department to help in reducing the federal deficit.

"Secretary Gates believes that the Department of Defense cannot be exempt from efforts to bring federal deficit spending under control," Morrell said. "How-

ever, it is important that any reduction in funding be shaped by strategy and policy choices, and not by a budget math exercise."

The department already has cut back spending by more than \$400 billion over the past two years. The president said he believes the department is capable of

matching that effort again to help in realizing \$2 trillion in savings as part of an effort to reduce federal borrowing by \$4 trillion over the next 12 years.

"The president acknowledged that the Department of Defense has been at the forefront in tearing back unneeded, duplicative and ob-

solete programs and administrative overhead," Morrell said. "(He) wants us to continue this effort with the goal of significant additional savings over the coming decade.

"By the same token, the secretary has been clear that further significant defense cuts cannot be accomplished without reducing forces structure and military capabilities," Morrell continued. "The comprehensive review of missions, capabilities and America's role in the world will identify alternatives for the president's consideration."

Accomplishing the president's goal, Morrell added, will "must be about managing risks associated with future threats and national security challenges and identifying missions that the country is willing to forego."


