Little hearts give big

Air Force Global Strike Command's North Plains Elementary school sponsored its second annual Penny War, a one-week event aimed at raising money to go towards the fight against cancer, here April 11 - 15.

This year's Relay for Life fundraising event, led by Relay for Life champion and cancer survivor Michelle Betz, 5th Medical Group pharmacy technician, raised more than \$1,400.

Relay for Life is the world's largest cancer awareness event. Every year, millions of people gather together to remember those they have lost, celebrate those who have survived and

raise money towards finding a cure.

Last year's event went a long way in supporting the Susan G. Komen three-day walk for the cure, and this year proved no different.

This year, the fundraising battle took place in small classrooms filled with big hearts and loads of pennies. In the penny war scenario, the objective was to collect as many points as possible.

This is achieved when participants place their copper coins, valued at one point a piece, into their classroom war chest with the hopes of accumulating the highest total points by week's end. Counter attacks are made by enemy forces placing silver coins and/or dollars into competing jars, thereby subtracting the rivals' penny point

gain.

The competitive and giving spirit of North Plain Elementary students left piggy banks abandoned of their copper quarry and local banks depleted of their own penny supplies. At midweek, the students were placing dollar bills into their own war chests with tiny notes attached asking that their greenbacks be counted as pennies. By that Friday, the local banks' penny supplies were so low, they kindly asked their pennies be returned as soon as possible.

The class with the highest point value raised would be declared the winner and receive a pizza party. In keeping with last year's tradition of recognition, the class with the highest dollar amount raised, a second place honor, was also invited to participate in the pizza bounty.

North Plains Elementary surpassed last year's effort in half the

time. The 2011 Penny War victory went to Marybeth Popham's second grade class. The award for the highest dollar amount raised belongs to Debra Reinke's first grade students. It was a team effort.

"When I completed my count, I was blown away," said Ms. Betz. "I couldn't believe we raised that much money in just one week. At a time when pinching pennies deems necessary, the children, parents and teachers opened their hearts, dug deep and helped continue the fight against cancer. Their generosity literally brought tears to my eyes."

Ms. Betz gave special thanks to her co-workers, North Plain Elementary's principle Wayne Strand and his staff, members of the Wells Fargo Bank, Stacey Bucholtz, and Master Sgt. Tracy Buechler for their time, commitment and dedication to this very worthy cause.

Spice testing is not a rumor

For the past two years, the synthetic marijuana commonly known as spice, has become more prevalent in the military. In February, the military began testing for spice. And in that same month, the Air Force Office of Special Investigation, Detachment 228, began investigating a narcotics ring on Air Force Global Strike Command's Minot Air Force Base.

In April, AFOSI received positive results from urinalysis for the synthetics JWC-018 and JWC-073. These are synthetics outlined by the Drug Enforcement Administration as illegal schedule one narcotics, the same synthetics used in spice. Schedule one narcotics are described by the DEA as narcotics possessing no medicinal value, and they often carry heftier penalties, including at least one year in prison.

There are many reasons why spice has become attractive to young military members. Spice over the last two years was more accessible than alcohol, and it still is for underage Airmen. Addi-

tionally, before spice testing was available, it was harder to detect because of the potpourri like odor it produces and the lack of law enforcement officers being knowledgeable on the new drug.

Today, Airmen are ordering, buying, and smoking spice everyday because dealers, head shops, and the internet are telling them it produces the same effects as marijuana and that it is untraceable. However, we know it is very traceable. And while it may be mind-altering, we simply don't know what the long-term effects of spice may be on the human body.

The Department of Defense and the Air Force have a zero tolerance policy on mind-altering products, including spice. Using spice can lead to discharge from the military without benefits, which includes losing your Montgomery G.I. Bill.

Despite popular belief, the Air Force can test for synthetic marijuana and synthetic cannabis. Many Airmen falsely believe they can only be convicted if they are caught carrying the drug. They are wrong. The military can and does test for these drugs, and a positive test is proof enough to cause an Airman to lose a career.

Global Strike Airman recounts disaster ops

After a 9.0 magnitude earthquake struck Japan on March 11, with a tsunami that quickly followed, U.S. military servicemembers were quick to help our allies in the relief mission. By March 16, my own bags were packed and I had orders in hand to Yokota Air Base, Japan.

As a young Airman deploying for the first time, being eager and anxious is what was to be expected. From only seeing what outside media outlets show us on TV, I was unsure of what I would really encounter. While heading towards Japan, I knew that the operations tempo would be higher than I was accustomed to, but what I didn't know is how bad the country had actually been affected.

My mission was simple, to augment U.S. Pacific Air Forces during Operation Tomodachi. However, my view of how simple my part would be was quickly overturned.

With 24-hour operations, the local Yokota AB PA office was busy documenting the after-effects of the disaster. From maintaining the aircrafts, to camping out at the Sendai Airport where relief supplies were delivered, there was always a PA Airman be-

hind the scenes.

From the day I arrived, I hit the ground running. Whether it was taking photos or writing articles, documenting the natural disaster was on the forefront of my mind. Yet the reality of how important it was to be there didn't hit me until I saw the first few images taken from a fellow photographer on the ground at Sendai Airport.

The coastline that was once peaceful seemed reminiscent of a plagued wasteland. Homes were destroyed, leaving behind keepsakes and mementos of the lives that once lived in the villages. It was at that point I knew the mission Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors and Marines were part of, was bigger than what some had ever experienced.

Witnessing past disasters on TV and hearing stories about people's past experiences, didn't quite prepare me for the mission. I learned it takes firsthand experience to know the full breadth of what it takes to deploy. Working long hours without days to relax was just a glimpse of what I experienced.

Overall, having the chance to

meet Japanese people, who thanked me personally for the assistance we provided was one of the most rewarding experiences ever. Knowing our contributions helped so many gave me a feeling of solace.

As time has gone by since my return, I realize my small part helped keep the mission moving forward and it gave people the opportunity to see what we were doing to aid our allies. Even though I worked longer than I ever expected in a single day for weeks, I would never change it for the world.

Many Airmen here go through the daily grind of our home mission; yet, we all must take a moment to realize the importance of our part in the overall picture. Our commanders always tell us we make the mission the success it is and even though we don't see it here at Minot, our contribution matters. It took me a deployment to see how awe-inspiring our nation's air power can really be.

Tick awareness

With the weather starting to get warmer, all the creepy crawlers have started coming out, including ticks. To ensure all Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen remain healthy to perform the mission, proper education is necessary to prevent any possible complications resulting from tick exposure.

Ticks are tiny insects that attach to plant leaves and tall grass areas. They on plant leaves and wait for a host to come by, which include animals like dogs and cats, as well as humans. Once they attach, they feed on the blood of the host.

Ticks can spread disease such as Lyme disease, Western Encephalitis, Rock Mountain Spotted Fever and tick-borne relapsing fever. The symptoms for all these diseases begin with a fever and include chills, aches and pains. A rash may also develop around the bite.

If you demonstrate any of these symptoms, please see your doctor immediately. Treating these diseases early may stop complications.

To avoid ticks, stay away from brushy areas with no trails, and when walking, biking, and hiking on trails, walk down the center. When hunting, stay fully clothed to prevent tick contact with the skin. Perform full body checks, including all pets, as they can also bring ticks into the house. While outdoors, make sure to use DEET, a powerful bug repellent.

If a tick is on the skin, remove using fine-tipped tweezers and protect fingers with gloves or tissue. Grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull upward with pressure. Try not to leave mouthparts behind, but if any are left behind, try to pull them out or just let the skin heal over it.

After removing the tick, disinfect the bite mark as well as the hands and tweezers. Avoid other methods of removal such as burning, squeezing or using alcohol to repel the tick. The last ride

I handed a coin to the driver saying, "You are taking my brother-in-law on his last ride. I don't want you to forget this."

No one who knew Maj. Philip Ambard will ever forget him. He was born in Venezuela, but loved his adopted country passionately. He joined the U.S. Air Force, quickly moving up the ranks and being selected for senior master sergeant before being commissioned. Phil had five kids, four of who are now serving in the active duty military.

Phil was a foreign language professor at the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs. He deployed to Afghanistan four months ago to help train the Afghan Air Force. His life came to an end in Kabul after a lone gunman opened fire, killing nine Airmen.

I suppose I had gotten used to deployments. We are a military family with many deployments to the area of responsibility. None of us ever thought we would have to pay such a high price to defend freedom.

I have officiated dozens of funerals as a military chaplain, but I have never seen anything as profound as what took place during the days that followed Phil's death. His body came into Peterson Air Force Base on a Wednesday. Our family was met by the senior leadership of several surrounding military communities. They knew our names and embraced

us with tears. I won't forget the two chaplains who stood beside us as we

received his body. Their steadfast presence was calm amidst the storm.

We followed his car in a bus down the 2-mile long corridor of Peterson AFB and out the front gate. It was lined with hundreds of U.S. and allied military, civilians and Patriot Guard riders. A rolling salute followed his remains. I remember distinctly the elderly woman with an oxygen tank standing in the cold, hand over heart, giving honor to Phil as he passed by.

The cadets led his remains through an arch of sabers into the hallowed steel cathedral. His five children, my sister and Brig. Gen. Dana Born (the Academy's dean of the faculty) spoke eloquently of his life. The hundreds of mourners and I shared that moment. We felt a connection to his life and to his sacrifice as only military families can in the face of our fallen.

When I led my family out to the

hearse, I remember thinking only of the gravesite, but I was not ready for the drive. The driver, still holding tightly to his coin, looked at me and said, "We are taking a non-standard route to the cemetery. I hope you don't mind."

We pulled out onto the sun-draped Terrazzo where students march and travel to and from class. But today was not a day of coming and going. Today they lined his route. A silent field of blue with proud, slow salutes walked beside us as they said goodbye to their beloved professor. His life and his death would not be forgotten. His lessons will continue.

When anyone dies in combat, we all have suffered profoundly. It is in tragedy that I look for hope in knowing that, like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, Jesus stands beside me even when I don't know that he is there.

More than a pilot: mother and fighter

SHAW AIR FORCE BASE, S.C. (AFNS) - Many children have dreams of what they want to do or become. Some dream of becoming professional athletes, some doctors, teachers or firefighters.

For three women here their dreams of becoming fighter pilots came true. Today, they are three of the 58 female active duty fighter pilots in the Air Force.

Currently, there are 2,689 Air Force active duty fighter pilots.

Up until 1993, women were excluded from flying combat aircraft. In 1991, Congress lifted the combat ban on women in the services. They gave the final call on the roles of women to Department of Defense officials. Then, with the 1992 and 1993 Defense Authorization acts, the combat aircraft exclusion laws were repealed.

Maj. Jaime Nordin, an F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot in the 79th Fighter Squadron and one of the three here, recalled her interest in flying being sparked the first time she saw an airshow as a child.

"I was mesmerized by fighters, the idea of going fast and flying upside down," she said.

The role of Air Force fighter pilots is to maintain superiority in the air and to support the ground fight.

However, Major Nordin's mission goes beyond being just a fighter pilot; she is also the mother of 2-year-old

Caleigh.

"Being a mom and a fighter pilot are both equally demanding, which makes having only 24 hours in a day hard," she said. "But, more and more I'm becoming a mom, and a fighter pilot is my trade."

She was about five to six weeks along when she found out she was pregnant.

"Because of that, I joke with my daughter that she has flown in an F-16," said the major.

Major Nordin had to take some time off from flying after that discovery.

"Between pulling high Gs and the ejection seat, flying while pregnant is a no go," she said.

"Finding out was a shock," Major Nordin continued. "I went through an identity crisis because I had to stop flying. I had to become something other than a fighter pilot. But, after a while my motherly instincts took over."

So during that time she worked in the operations support squadron at Hill Air Force Base, Utah. After the time off from the pregnancy and recovery, Major Nordin's qualifications for flying were out of date, so she had to take a regulatory class at Luke AFB, Ariz.

"During the time off I really missed flying," Major Nordin said. "It's kind of a need. I missed being in the air and the camaraderie of the squadron."

Major Nordin's husband, Maj. Cameron Nordin, the 20th Fighter Wing plans and inspections officer, is also an F-16 pilot, which presents unique challenges to the cou-

ple for raising a 2-year-old.

Major Nordin said she sometimes worries about what will happen while she's flying or in the middle of something else and can't pick Caleigh up.

"Fortunately, we have friends who are willing to step in and help us out at the drop of a hat," said the mother. "Several times we've had to cash in on them for help because of mission requirements."

There have been times where the two pilot parents have been gone for a temporary deployment at the same time and couldn't bring Caleigh. For those times, they have a family care plan in place to ensure their daughter is taken care of. Often times she will stay with her grandmother.

"Caleigh is always out there to greet us when we get back," she said. "It's always nice to see how excited she is to see us when we get back."

The two fighter pilots have not had any issues balancing their lives to take care of their daughter.

While away, they will chat with their daughter over web cam to stay involved with her.

"We've (Cameron and I) been making adjustments in our lives to make things work since day one," she said. "The busy lifestyle is the only life we know, meaning to work with these schedules, Caleigh is another piece of the puzzle. We've always had to adjust and readjust. She's always known this life."

One of the nice exceptions to their life is that have not had to miss out on any key moments in their daughter's

life yet, said the mother.

"I know there are a ton of families where that is not the case, so we've been blessed in that way," she explained. "You have to learn to celebrate the ordinary."


The mom and fighter pilot said she can tell that her daughter understands what it means for her parents to be pilots.

"She can tell you what an F-16 is," said Major Nordin. "She is thrilled by them.

She'll see one fly and say that's mom or dad. She enjoys sitting and watching the planes taxi down the runway. She's engulfed in it."

She has no worries for the future of her daughter, she said. She is strong headed and will succeed in life.

When it's all said and done, Major Jaime Nordin said her greatest source of pride is being able to be both a mommy and a fighter pilot.

Thunderbirds to perform first demo with alternative fuel

ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE, Md. (AFNS) - The Thunderbirds will use alternative fuel, unprecedented for any Department of Defense aerial team, at the Joint Services Open House here May 20 and 21, officials said May 18.

The team will fly with Camelina-based hydrotreated renewable jet fuel as part of the nation's overall strategy to reduce reliance on foreign energy and establish greater energy security through conservation and use of "home grown" alternative energy sources, said Terry Yonkers, the assistant secretary of the Air Force for installations, environment and logistics.

The economic impact to the Air Force resulting from these types of energy efficiency initiatives could be savings in the "hundreds of millions

of dollars on an annual basis," Mr. Yonkers said.

"We are changing the culture of the Air Force, from our operators to every Airman that's out there turning lights off and being conscious about energy," Mr. Yonkers said. "This is going to be another marker for aviation history as these precision teams come out here and do the wonderful things that they do on JP-8 and biofuels

and we're not going to see any difference when they're sitting in the stands."

Mr. Yonkers explained the Air Force has, to date, tested and certified biofuel as a 50-percent blend with regular jet fuel in the A-10 Thunderbolt II, the F-15 Eagle, the C-17 Globemaster III, and the F-22 Raptor, adding that fleetwide certification is on track for completion in 2013.

The service continues to

test and evaluate biomass fuels derived from camelina, or plant seed oil, beef tallow, or animal fat, and various waste oils and greases.

Members of the demonstration team said the use of "green" fuel fits into the overall Thunderbirds mission and will be transparent to both users and spectators.

"The mission is to represent the pride, precision and professionalism of the nearly

700,000 Airmen of our Air Force ... at the same time we are showing the Air Force's dedication to alternative fuel, so it's a great opportunity," said Lt. Col. Case Cunningham, the lead pilot and Thunderbirds commander.

AF officials release E-7 promotion list

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) - The master sergeant promotion list is now available on the Air Force Personnel Center's website and Air Force personnel services website under "Active Duty: MSgt Promotion Release." Airmen can also access their Weighted Airman Promotion System score notices at the same time on the Virtual Military Personnel Flight application and Air Force Portal.

Air Force officials selected 6,618 of 19,538 eligible technical sergeants for promotion to master sergeant for a selection rate of 33.87 percent.

The average score for those selected was 335.21, with an average time in grade of 4.58 years and an average time in service of 15.91 years. The average score was

based on the following point averages: 134.13 for enlisted performance reports, 11.24 for decorations, 72.46 for the promotion fitness examination and 60.45 for the specialty knowledge test.

Those people selected for master sergeant will be promoted according to their promotion sequence number beginning in August 2011. As a reminder, selections are tentative until the data verification process is complete, which is no later than 10 days after the promotion release date.



Safe boating week emphasizes the need to wear life jackets

A public awareness campaign held annually in May emphasizes the need for boaters to wear life jackets.

Nancy Boldt, boat and water safety coordinator for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department, said this year's National Safe Boating Week is May 21-27. "This annual week-long event reinforces the importance of personal flotation devices," Boldt said. "Facts prove there is no safety substitute for wearing a life jacket while recreating on public waters."

Failure to wear a PFD is the main reason people lose their lives in boating accidents. Boldt said each year, about 700 people nationwide die in boating-related accidents. Nearly 70 percent are caused by drowning, and eight of 10 victims were not wearing a life jacket.

North Dakota law requires Coast Guard approved PFDs in the following circumstances:

- On watercraft less than 16 feet in length, one wearable PFD must be on board for each person.
- Anyone being towed on water-skis, surfboard, or a



similar device must wear a PFD.

- No person may operate or permit the operation of a personal watercraft without each person on board wearing a PFD.
- Watercraft of 16 feet or longer must have one wearable PFD for each person on board, and one throwable flotation device.

- On any vessel less than 27 feet in length, all persons 10 years of age or younger must wear a properly fastened, Coast Guard approved PFD.

Boaters are reminded to test life jackets for serviceability and fit. All straps and buckles must be intact and there should be no rips or tears in the fabric.

Boats need 2011-13 registration

Boat owners are reminded that 2011 is the first year of the new three-year registration period. All boat registrations with an orange decal expired Dec. 31, 2010.

The new registration cycle runs through Dec. 31, 2013. New blue and white boat validation stickers have the expiration year of 13 prominently readable in the middle of the sticker. For information on how to attach the number and validation sticker to a boat, refer to page 10 of the 2011-13 North Dakota Boat and Water Safety Guide at gf.nd.gov/regulations/boat/boat-and-water-2011.html.

Renewal notices for the current three-year period were mailed in December. Boat owners who have not received a renewal notice, or have misplaced it, should contact the department by email at ndgf@nd.gov, or call (701) 328-6335.

Boat registrations can be renewed online at the department's website, gf.nd.gov, by accessing the online services link, and "watercraft registration and renewals" under the watercraft heading. Also, anyone buying a new or used watercraft can register online and generate a 10-day temporary permit that is valid until the registration is processed.

Lake Sakakawea navigation beacons scheduled for removal

About a dozen navigation light structures in place along Lake Sakakawea's shoreline for decades are scheduled for removal over the next 12-18 months as they become inoperable.

Designed to serve as navigational aids, these beacons no longer serve their original purpose. Wave and ice action have greatly eroded many of the foundations of the light beacons, and proper operation and maintenance is difficult to justify, given the electronic aids that most boaters have in cellular phones and global positioning systems.

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department, local U.S. Army Corp of Engineers officials and the U.S. Coast Guard agree the time has come for their eventual removal.

Over the next two summers Game and Fish staff will remove the lights and their bolted concrete bases at Mallard Island, Fort Stevenson State Park, Sakakawea Bay, Beulah Bay, Nishu Bay, Red Butte Bay, Little Missouri, Independence Point, Bear Den Bay, Little Knife Bay, Tobacco Garden Bay and Lewis and Clark State Park.

PRAIRIE ADVENTURES

Back and forth, twists and turns: That's about the only way to describe the path taken by a couple of N.D. Game and Fish Department-related bills passed by the 2011 North Dakota legislature.

In the end, the agency budget looks similar to what was requested – about \$65.6 million for the 2011-2013 biennium.

Along the way, the House bumped up the \$800,000 originally requested for land acquisition to \$1.5 million.

That didn't set well with the Senate and proved to be a sticking point until House and Senate conference committees dropped it back to its original amount, described Game and Fish Department deputy director Roger Rostvet.

The legislature also decided to use \$400,000 of the Game and Fish Department budget to fund road improvements to Grahams Island State Park on Devils Lake, which wasn't in the original budget proposal.

However, legislators ramped up the Game and Fish Department weed control budget by \$50,000 to \$600,000 and provided another \$200,000 for Missouri River law enforcement. Legislators also saved the agency \$200,000 by no longer using Game and Fish Department dollars to finance part of the North Dakota State Veterinarian's budget. Instead, that money now comes from the general fund.

They also added \$1.9 million into the Private Lands program. Much of the increase goes towards addressing depredation issues, especially relating to winter deer problems, through House Bill 2227.

The new legislation, which passed as an emergency measure, authorizes the Game and Fish Department to pay cost-share on labor involved in constructing deer-proof hay yards. In the past, they provided materials but no funding for labor expenses.

While details are still being finalized, Rostvet said the agency is considering either a flat payment fee for labor or a 50-50

cost-share.

The bill also establishes a Dec. 1 through Jan. 15 special antlerless deer depredation season if authorized by the Game and Fish Department director.

One of the provisions in Section 3 of the legislation authorizes the Game and Fish Department to make \$100,000 available for each biennium for food plots. It doesn't require landowners to make their land available for public hunting access. Food plots have been a longstanding Private Lands program option, but in the past they were always open to hunting, Rostvet described.

Food plots, while providing a vital food source for stressed animals, tend to congregate animals - especially in severe winters. Section 3 also created an avenue for landowners to address any depredation disputes through a mediation process. The initial plan is to work with the N.D. Department of Agriculture's Ag Mediation Services, Rostvet said.

Another provision establishes a revolving deer depredation fund that can build to \$2 million. "It ensures producers we're going to have adequate funding available," Rostvet said. When the \$1 million allocated funds aren't used, it can build to a maximum of \$2 million to be available when necessary.

Another section, Section 5 of HB 2227 takes a new direction for deer management stating, "The director may authorize targeted deer reduction programs to alleviate deer depredation."

"The law doesn't detail any specifics," Rostvet said. The key is the director, he added, and that the bill's intent wasn't to allow landowners carte blanche on taking deer in their yard.

Paddlefish snagging season closed to additional harvest

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department announced today that the state's 2011 paddlefish snagging harvest season has been closed to protect the paddlefish population level.

The 2010-12 fishing proclamation allows for the Game and Fish Department director to close the snagging season early if it appears more than 1,000 paddlefish will be harvested. If the season had remained open through the intended closing date of May 31, the harvest cap of 1,000 fish would have been exceeded substantially, putting additional pressure on the existing population.

An additional snag-and-release season will run for a seven-day period from Wednesday, May 18 through Tuesday, May 24. Effective Wednesday, May 18 snag-and-release is legal only in that area of the Missouri River starting on the north shore from the Confluence boat ramp then east (downstream) one-half mile, and that area of the Missouri River starting on the south shore from the Confluence with the Yellowstone River then east (downstream) one-half mile. Both areas have boundary signs.

Paddlefish snaggers with an unused paddlefish tag can continue snagging, but must release all fish immediately. Snaggers who already used their tag on a harvested paddlefish are not allowed to participate in the additional snag-and-release period. For potential new snaggers, existing paddlefish tag vendors still have tags available for sale during this additional snag-and-release season.

Paddlefish snagging is allowed only from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. (CDT) during each day of the additional seven-day season. No gaffs may be used.

Dispose of rough fish properly

Early May is an excellent time to pursue bowfishing for carp and other nongame fish, but participants need to make plans for proper fish disposal.

Since the bowfishing season opened May 1, the State Game and Fish Department has received several reports of fish left to rot along shorelines in several areas of the state.

"You can take the fish home and eat them, put them in your garbage, or bury them someplace where you have permission," says Chief Game Warden

Robert Timian, "but it's not legal to put dead fish back in the water or leave them on shore." Game wardens and other law enforcement officers have the authority to issue citations for littering to those who do not dispose of their fish properly, Timian said. The minimum fine for littering is \$100.





Rough Rider Golf Course Swings Into Tournament Action






Tickets For Upcoming Daddy & Daughter Dance Are On Sale Now



Grilled Buffalo Chicken Sandwiches with Blue Cheese Coleslaw

- 8 boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- 1 bottle KC Masterpiece Buffalo Marinade

Blue Cheese Coleslaw

- 1 bag pre-shredded coleslaw with carrots
- 1 cup crumbled blue cheese
- 1 16-ounce bottle of ranch dressing

8 sub rolls

Trim all fat from chicken thighs. Then, lightly pound thighs with a meat mallet until they are an even thickness, approximately 1/4 of an inch. Place thighs into a re-sealable food storage bag and pour in marinade until it coats thighs. Marinate in refrigerator for a minimum of 1.5 hours.

While chicken is marinating, prepare blue cheese coleslaw. Start by combining one cup of blue cheese with a bottle of ranch dressing.

Then, add mixture to prepared coleslaw mix until dressing coats vegetables. Set aside and chill until needed. Build a charcoal fire for indirect grilling, by situating coals on only one side of grill, leaving the other side void. Add a small aluminum pan to the void side of the grill and fill it halfway with water.

When charcoal grill reaches between 450 and 500°F, take chicken thighs and grill directly over coals for 30 to 45 seconds on each side to sear. Once both sides are seared, move thighs to the void side of the grill. Place lid on grill and cook thighs indirectly for 10 minutes, or until thighs reach an internal temperature of 160°F. Then remove from grill.

Assemble sandwiches on sub rolls, topping grilled chicken with blue cheese coleslaw.

Airmen build paper airplanes, relationships

KANDAHAR AIRFIELD, Afghanistan (AFNS) - Afghan children ran across a rocky playground here April 30, laughing at a game of tag similar to any playground in the U.S. There were, however, no females on this playground except for a few Airmen who had volunteered from the 451st Air Expeditionary Wing to help with a craft project that morning.

The boys were the children of merchants working at the bazaar at Kandahar Airfield.

Every Saturday, as their fathers sell rugs and scarves to the many visitors stationed at the airfield, the boys attend school. Groups can volunteer to host a crafts activity in the morning, and later there is a standing soccer tournament.

The morning's activity was folding and flying paper airplanes. Airman 1st Class Garrett Lee, one of the day's volunteers, sat with a few Afghan boys at a wooden picnic table in the school's yard and showed them how to fold the paper.

He said he was struck by the comparison between them

and his American cousins. The Afghans asked about American disco and where they could get an iPhone, but when an aircraft rumbled overhead the boys didn't even glance up or seem to care.

"One asked if I was a pilot," laughed Airman Lee, who works in the 451st AEW command post.

The boys wore flowing robes and sandals, a few happily kicked off their shoes to run over the gravel and dirt. The playground was bleached by the sun into shades of beige and gray, which highlighted the colorful graffiti

flowers and Pashto letters scrawled onto barricades surrounding the yard.

While the boys chased their airplanes, they seemed oblivious to the Afghan men in uniform who stood above, on a concrete wall, silently watching them from under the Afghan flag. An American Soldier stood in a guard tower, and similarly watched from his side of the compound.

"Those kids are the future," Airman Lee said. "That's our chance to make a good impression, let them know Americans are alright.

Before he left, one boy gave Airman Lee a friendship bracelet.

The younger boys enthusiastically mimed words and stories to Staff Sgt. Kimberly Luna, from the 451st AEW finance office. She organized the volunteer day and said the biggest challenge during the event was the language barrier. Most children, however, spoke remarkably good English.

Some of the boys were as young as eight years old, and one described himself as 15 or 16. He didn't know his exact birthday.

"The older ones seemed to like to talk," Sergeant Luna said of the teenage boys, who sat in the shade and casually spoke to volunteers.

"They're really smart, inquisitive," Airman Lee said.

A small group sat on wooden benches and tables in the yard outside the small schoolhouse.

"What English word has all the vowels?" a boy quizzed.

Airman Lee paused and thought for a moment.

"Education!" the Afghan exclaimed.

He snatched a sheet of paper and wrote the word out. The other boys took the sheet and passed it around. Some stared, fascinated.

One boy took the sheet and carefully copied the letters a few times for himself.

Later, they played soccer. The Afghans know it as "football," but the cheering and clapping could have been in any language.

\$10,000 grant gives MAFB a "Bright Spot" reading room

In recognition of National Library Week (April 10-16) and Support Teen Literature Day (April 14), Boys & Girls Clubs of America announces the expansion of its reading initiative that promotes both educational and leisure reading for tweens and teens through a \$1.15 million grant from the Walmart Foundation.

The Bright Spot for Reading initiative will be added to 100 Boys & Girls Clubs across the U.S. to create a dedicated reading center for members.

According to the 2009 Reading Report Card, only 33 percent of fourth graders are reading proficiently and 17 percent of low-income fourth-grade students are reading well. By the eighth grade, the reading proficiency rate drops to 32 percent for all students and 16 percent for low-income eighth-grade students.

The Walmart Foundation previously funded BGCA with \$1.4 million for Bright Spot for Reading initiatives at 100 Clubs in the U.S. Since that time, it's estimated that more than 6,000 young people are actively reading in Bright Spots and 40 percent of Clubs have seen an increase in teen participation. The new \$1.15 million grant will expand the Walmart Foundation's Bright Spot for Reading initiative to include an additional 100 Bright Spots at Clubs across the U.S.

"The Walmart Foundation's Bright Spot for Reading initiative is essential in motivating our youth to read and preparing them for academic success," continued Ronda

Knutson, Director, Boys & Girls Clubs of Minot Air Force Base, "We are grateful to the Walmart Foundation for the opportunity to create an environment that will encourage and allow our youth to enjoy and develop a lifelong love of reading."

Beginning June 2011, the Bright Spot Reading Centers will feature books and targeting young people ages 11 to 15; including programs to encourage Boys & Girls Club of Minot Air Force Base members to read more and develop a positive attitude toward reading. The centers will offer activities in drama, art and technology; field trips and service learning projects to integrate reading opportunities into every area of the Club.


