

IN MEMORY OF AIRMAN JAMES AUSTIN

Senior Airman James Austin, a response force member of the 5th Security Forces Squadron, was involved in a fatal motorcycle accident in Stonington, Conn. May 22. Airman Austin was on leave in the Connecticut area.

The Airman's leadership expressed their condolences to the family members and friends that were affected by the tragedy.

"This was a tragic occurrence and we're all experiencing this sorrow together," said Lt. Col. Travis Harsha, 5th SFS commander. "We extend our deepest sympathy to all the family and friends whose

lives Senior Airman James Austin touched. He honorably served his country and he will not be forgotten."

Airman Austin entered active duty in October 2007 and had been currently studying police science at the Community College of the Air Force.

A memorial service is scheduled to be held in honor of Airman Austin, at the Northern Lights Chapel here June 2.

Remember our heroes and their families this Memorial Day

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. (AFNS) - In 2008, I went to a military funeral at Arlington National Cemetery for an American hero. The hero I saw laid to rest that day was surrounded by many, many more heroes - his family.

That funeral was held on April 9, 2008, for Maj. Robert F. Woods, an Airman who was missing in action and buried at Arlington nearly 40 years after he went missing in Vietnam June 26, 1968. Attending the funeral were dozens of members of the Woods family from all over the U.S.

What I remember the most of that funeral was the way the family talked about Major Woods like they had just seen him even though four decades had passed since he left their lives. "How amazing," I thought that they remembered him so fondly after such a long time and how appropriate it was that Major Woods received full military honors for paying the ultimate sacrifice.

It's because of people like Major Woods, and his family, that we have Memorial Day. According to www.usmemorialday.org, Memorial Day was "officially proclaimed" May 5, 1868, and first observed May 30, 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate Soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery.

"Memorial Day is not about division - it is about reconciliation," the website states. "It is about coming together to honor those who gave their all."

I couldn't agree more.

In looking back at American history, there are millions of Americans who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in service to their nation. They are all heroes and should be remembered as such forever.

Every one of those heroes, like Major Woods, also had families who paid a high cost in sacrifice and support. While their loved one is off doing their part as a military member, they manage the homefront and do whatever they can to support their war-fighting family member. To me, those family members are heroes as well.

That day I spent at Arlington with the Woods family, I watched as the folded flag was presented to the family by the Air Force Honor Guard. I watched the tears fall and saw as granddaughters and great-granddaughters touched the casket of a man they had never met until that day.

Later, in talks with Major Woods' daughter, Lana Taylor, I learned

about a man who loved his family deeply and "always went when his country called."

Major Woods had served more than 20 years when he went missing. He began his career as an enlisted Airman who served in the Berlin Airlift in the late 1940s, and was a Korean War veteran who flew KC-97 Stratotankers during the conflict, earning an Air Medal.

Major Woods' granddaughter, Courtney Woods, recalled of how fondly her grandmother, Mary Woods, talked about a man she'd never met and how that shaped her image of Major Woods as "more than a war hero."

"One thing my Nana wanted my brother Mac and me to know was what a wonderful man my grandfather was," she said. "He would write to her every single day; he never missed a single day. His letters go right up until the day he went missing. She would let us read them, and by reading his words, we were able to see the meaning and thoughtfulness that went into each and every letter."

Also at Major Woods' funeral was Lt. Col. Phil Heseltine. He's not a family member but might as well have been. Colonel Heseltine presented a POW/MIA bracelet he wore for

18 years that had Major Woods' name chiseled into it.

"I purchased the bracelet in 1990 during a POW/MIA event at my Air Force ROTC detachment," Colonel Heseltine said.

Colonel Heseltine brought along his wife Jenny and daughters Alexa and Livie. It was a gesture that Mrs. Taylor later said "just overwhelmed" her. When asked about his family meeting the Woods family, Colonel Heseltine said, "I'll admit I was nervous. But once they arrived and I met them I saw what wonderful people they all were."

Some of those same "wonderful" people will be visiting with Colonel Heseltine again in June 2011 in North Carolina. The 911th Air Refueling Squadron - where Colonel Heseltine is the commander - will be dedicating the Robert F. Woods Memorial Auditorium at Seymour-Johnson Air Force Base June 26.

The auditorium dedication is another way of remembering Major Woods and his family of heroes. It also serves as a reminder to all of us that our fallen heroes like Major Woods, and their families, are the people who we should remember this Memorial Day.

At times there were long work-days with multiple projects, events and operations going on. Yet the captain said he was always ready for what was next.

"There is always constant change in my work there, since different things were going on all the time," said Captain McAfee.

The captain said one aspect of the job he found surprising during his time in the field, was his involvement in a wide range of work tasks and duties.

"There are a lot more behind the scenes duties I was involved in," said Capt. McAfee. "There has been a broad scope of tasks I have been involved in, which I wasn't really expecting when I first began this career field."

Nonetheless, he expressed the job has given him a chance to interact with people all the time and establish great relationships with co-workers.

Idea reemphasizes secure launch facilities

An Air Force Global Strike Command Airman received the maximum payout of \$10,000 for his submission to the Innovative Development through Employee Awareness, otherwise known as IDEA, program.

Mark H. Kauer, 5th Force Support Squadron manpower management analyst, said the IDEA program is an incentive based program which promotes process improvement and resource savings.

"It encourages Airmen and Air Force employees to look for ways of doing the Air Force business faster, better and cheaper, through program awareness," he added.

It was through this program that Master Sgt. Joseph Saldan, 91st Missile Maintenance Squadron NCO in charge of the Electro-Mechanical Team section, submitted a change to repair procedures - a change that saved the Air Force thousands of dollars and hundreds of manpower hours.

"The final monetary savings is \$296,878.41 annually," he said. "The hours saved was calculated at 648 annually."

You're watching the phone, waiting to hear if you got that job. You're sitting in the audience as your daughter starts her first piano recital. You're waiting for the daily email from your deployed spouse.

You're walking through the mall, still trying to get used to crowds after deployment.

These can all be stressful situations. Stress is a part of everyday life for Service members, veterans and families dealing with multiple deployments, homecomings and all the other demands of a military life.

Take a deep breath....

When you are stressed, do you ever focus on your breathing?

Most of the time, it's an automatic process. Slowing down and concentrating on your breathing can help you react in stressful situations. During stress and times of anger, the body's first reaction is to inhale and hold your breath. Breathing out slowly helps take the body out of the "fight or flight" mode.

The Defense Centers of Excellence for Psychological Health and Traumatic Brain Injury (DcoE, www.dcoe.health.mil) work to promote

the resilience and recovery of military members and their families. Their research shows that breathing exercises can help decrease the body's "fight or flight" response to stress. Certain types of breathing exercises can also help control anger and anxiety.

There's an app for that

Your smartphone can help you learn these exercises and improve control over your body's reactions to stress. The National Center for Telehealth and Technology is a part of the DCoE that develops technology. They've created tools to help you to manage your breathing (along with handy phone apps to track your mood and teach you about post-traumatic stress). myPay goes mobile

CLEVELAND (AFNS) - Users of myPay now can check pay statements on the go using a smartphone or other mobile device that has a web browser.

This update for myPay, the online pay account management system for service members, military retirees and many federal civilian employees, is based on customer feedback received through phone calls, Facebook and email, according to Defense Finance and Accounting Services officials.

To begin using myPay on a mobile device, authorized myPay customers must go to mypay.dfas.mil on their smartphone or other mobile device's web browser. Once there, customers can log in to myPay using the same login identification and password they use on their computer.

Automatically myPay will detect that the customer is using a mobile device and load a mobile version of the site. The myPay home page, login, leave and earning statements, and retiree account statements have been optimized for smartphones, and key account information is presented in an easy-to-read format.

"The login procedure and account statements have been designed to appear in a mobile-friendly format when users access myPay on their smart phones," said Jan Wit-

try, a DFAS public affairs specialist. "Users should be able to make changes to their accounts by selecting 'Main' in the upper right corner of the screen, but they may have to scroll from right to left or up and down, because other portions of the site were not designed for mobile devices."

According to DFAS officials, myPay Mobile meets the same internationally recognized security standards that protect myPay. Security features include 128-bit encryption to protect sensitive information, firewall and intrusion detection software to block outsiders, and end-to-end encryption to protect all data sent to and from myPay.

myPay does not operate or control any wireless networks, and thus cannot guarantee the security used to access the mobile site, according to DFAS officials. Authorized customers should check with their wireless service provider for information about their privacy and security practices. Customers should also reference their mobile phone's user manual to learn more about using the web browser.

For assistance with myPay, customers can call the customer care center weekdays from 7 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. EST at 888-332-7411.





Five boat ramps ready on Devils Lake

Five boating access sites are now usable on Devils Lake, and three more are expected to be ready by early summer.

North Dakota Game and Fish Department personnel completed installing a slide-in metal ramp at Pelican Lake on the north side of Highway 19, about one mile east of the junction of old Highway 281.

Crews extended both Six Mile Bay (Schwab) ramps to elevation 1,458 feet above mean sea level, and installed a high-water ramp immediately north of the existing Creel Bay (Lakewood) ramp site. Spirit Lake Casino ramp remains open. Grahams Island State Park ramp is currently usable, but recreationists should call ahead (701-766-4015) to check for updates.

In addition, work is progressing on raising the East Bay parking area and boat ramps to elevation 1,461 msl, six feet higher than its 2010 elevation.

A new boating access site on Round Lake should be completed in early June, which will provide access to the western part of the lake and replace the Minnewaukan area ramps that were inundated earlier this spring.

Benson County officials are working with the Federal Highway Administration for approval to breach the old Highway 281 roadbed, helping facilitate access to the main lake.

Construction of the new access area along ND Highway 20 on the south end of Black Tiger Bay is scheduled to begin in June, with completion scheduled around July 4. The site will include a gravel access road and turnaround area, a 32-foot-wide poured cement ramp, courtesy docks and large parking area.

Anglers and boaters can access the Game and Fish Department's website, gf.nd.gov, throughout the summer to find the current status of Devils Lake boat ramps.



PRAIRIE ADVENTURES

A secret lurks in the waters of the lakes within the Garrison Diversion Unit system – smallmouth bass.

"There's not a ton of (smallmouth bass) use by anglers but the anglers targeting smallmouth bass are doing really well," described N.D. Game and Fish Department North-central Division fisheries biologist Jason Lee.

The series of lakes – Heckers, East Park, West Park, and New Johns - are part of the Garrison Diversion Unit (GDU) and are just some of the lakes Lee and other fisheries biologists manage.

While it's early yet this summer, in recent years bass have provided opportunities for young and old alike. Granted, you'll need a boat to fish the canal portion of the GDU system, Lee said, but if anglers work any of the rock structure of the lakes or canal itself they could find themselves getting into some bass action.

Don't forget to work the cattails in the lakes, too.

Smallmouth bass throughout the GDU system are an under-utilized species, Lee described. Given their fighting prowess, the fact there's not extensive fishing pressure for them, and there are good numbers, Lee suggested smallmouth bass fishing within the canal system as a good opportunity to introduce children to fishing.

Another nice aspect to GDU lakes is they typically don't experience extensive winter fish kill losses. Dissolved oxygen levels in GDU lakes tends to remain at good levels, in large part because water constantly flows through the canal system from Lake Audubon.

While smallies are faring well throughout the GDU lakes and McClusky Canal, walleye are a little more elusive.

GDU lakes were stocked annually with walleye for several years. However, the Game and Fish Department now stocks the GDU lakes on alternate years in an effort to increase the forage base. "Hopefully we can increase the forage. I really think that's

what limiting our walleye," Lee said. East Park, West Park, Heckers, and New Johns lakes were stocked in 2010 with a total of 178,000 walleye, so they won't be stocked this year.

Anglers could also expect to see more small perch in the system, a result of a nice year of reproduction.

Even though walleye won't be stocked in 2011, Lee said the Game and Fish Department plans to stock 1,750 muskie into New Johns Lake. They won't be any of those tiny fingerlings.

Instead these muskie will measure out to about 8 to 10 inches each. The reason for stocking larger muskie is an effort to reduce predation and give the fish a better chance of survival, Lee explained.

New Johns Lake was also stocked with tiger muskie in 2009 and pure muskie in 2008.

Some GDU lake facts:

- East Park Lake is slightly more than 137 surface acres and almost 24 feet deep at its maximum.
- Heckers Lake is 229.6 surface acres with a maximum depth of almost 27 feet.
- New Johns Lake is 676.4 surface acres with a maximum depth of 31.4 feet.
- West Park Lake is nearly 276 surface acres and about 25.6 feet deep at its maximum.
- East Park Lake has a boat ramp and fishing pier while New Johns Lake has a ramp.

Contour maps and stocking records for GDU lakes, as well as many other North Dakota fishable waters, are available on the Game and Fish Department website, (gf.nd.gov), clicking "Fishing". Contour maps are available in either standard or high quality resolution.

Anglers reminded of ANS regulations

North Dakota anglers are reminded of regulations intended to reduce the risk of aquatic nuisance species transfer between water bodies.

Current law states all water must be drained from watercraft prior to leaving a water body, including livewells. This means fish, including bait, cannot be transported in a livewell containing water. However, bait buckets and/or any container of five gallons or less in volume can be used to transport legal live baitfish and other bait in water. All other fish species, including game fish, may not be held in water and/or transported in bait buckets/containers when away from a water body.

Transportation of fish in or on ice is allowed.

In addition, no aquatic vegetation, or parts thereof, shall be in or on watercraft, motors, trailers and recreational equipment when out of water. Time out of the water needed to remove aquatic vegetation at the immediate water access area (boat ramp) is allowed.

All built-in structures to boats, including livewells and bait compartments, and containers (bait buckets) used to transport legal live bait, must also be free of aquatic vegetation.

Exceptional service earns detective award

Solving crimes and mysteries is something most people pretended to do when they were younger. Many adults can look back and remember watching Inspector Gadget solve mysteries with his trusted sidekick Penny. Those adults continue to watch other detectives work their magic. Detectives like Ace Ventura and Sherlock Holmes make solving mysteries look exciting and fun, and while that may be true for some, not all cases are funny or enjoyable to watch.

The fact of the matter is, real-life detectives are charged with great responsibility. They are trusted to get the job done; not just by their subordinates, but by those who are personally affected by the case. Real detectives are real-world heroes. And while they may not get the recognition they deserve on a daily basis, times do arise

when they are rewarded for their extraordinary work and devotion.

Such a time occurred during a ceremony held in downtown Minot on May 18. On this day, Air Force Global Strike Command's very own Detective Michael T. Berglund, 5th Security Forces Squadron lead detective, received the award for the Optimist Club's Outstanding Law Officer of the Year.

Mr. Berglund has served the base for more than 25 years now, previously as an active duty Airman, now as a civilian officer. He is currently assigned as the lead detective for the security forces investigation section here. Capt. Michael Gallucci, 5th SFS operations and training officer, said the detective is truly one of their finest police officers.

"His day-to-day duties speak for themselves through his tenacious efforts to professionalize all aspects of law enforcement activities on the base and in his community, as he is a proven servant in

both the military and Minot communities," said the captain. "He is a complete law enforcement officer and person. His efforts as a military investigator are unmatched, as he has proven time and again that mediocrity will not be tolerated in the areas he serves. He is a key contributor to our team unity within security forces."

Some of Detective Berglund's duties include managing a four-person investigation section, assigning cases and duty schedules, providing commanders with immediate feedback, investigating crimes involving military personnel and collecting and processing evidence, just to name a few. Although Detective Berglund's peers said he demonstrates excellent work ethic, there are times when more credit is due.

"In one situation, Detective Berglund responded to a report of domestic violence," said Captain Gallucci. "Upon arrival, he discovered an unconscious victim who had been severely beaten and was

bleeding profusely from the face. Detective Berglund instantly secured the residence and initiated care to stabilize the victim until emergency medical personnel arrived. Once the victim was cared for, he organized a systematic search for the perpetrator, who was taken into custody within a matter of minutes."

Captain Gallucci said the detective's actions were singled out as spot on, and credited for the recovery of the victim. Aside from all of his detective duties, Mr. Berglund also makes sure to spend time giving back to the community.

"I'm active in the local area church and volunteer weekly with AWANA's Children's club," said the detective. "I also manage a benevolence account to assist the needy, and am a member of the Northern Plain Children's Advocacy Center."

Giving back is in Mr. Berglund's nature, both in the community, as well as within the 5th SFS.

"The best part of my job

is working with other law enforcement agencies, as well as getting the opportunity to work with and mentor young Airmen daily," said the detective. This enthusiasm to help others within the job doesn't go unnoticed. His co-worker, Paul Sullivan, 5th SFS plans and programs branch chief, said Mr. Berglund's passion for his job and community both on and off the installation is the biggest factor in him receiving this award.

Mr. Sullivan said it seems as though everyone in 5th SFS is thankful for Mr. Berglund's presence in the section, as many respect him and look to him for help.

"I want to thank the men and women of the Minot Police Department and Ward County Sheriff's Department for a great working relationship," said Mr. Berglund. "I also thank all the men and women of the 5th SFS operations flight, because I don't do this job alone. Each one has their responsibilities in order for us to complete the mission."

"The energy storage system stores created energy used to raise or lower the seven-ton secondary door, which ultimately prevents unauthorized individuals from entering the launch facility," said the sergeant.

Sergeant Saldan said the energy storage system contains a flywheel power system, which provides more than 600 volts DC to the Electro-Mechanical Actuator. The EMA is what raises and locks the secondary door in less than 30 seconds.

"The flywheel, which is responsible for powering the EMA, is magnetically suspended inside of a vacuum chamber," he continued. "If this vacuum fails, the ESS shuts down."

Sergeant Saldan said that if the ESS vacuum pressure falls to the extent that the ESS shuts down, then

the technician is unable to perform the ESS pump-down procedures to try and fix the malfunction. If this happens, repair procedures direct that the entire system be replaced.

Sergeant Saldan's idea sought to improve the way in which these complex security systems are maintained in the event of a system failure.

"During the course of the new system being installed in the field, we ran across a situation where the ESS vacuum would fail," he said. "We tried to repair the ESS when it had a vacuum fault by pumping it down, but if the vacuum failed to the extent of the system needing to be shut-down, we were prohibited to pump it down. We then had to perform a shutdown."

Sergeant Saldan said he saw no reason to not try and pump the vacuum down and verify the readings at the

end to ensure it worked. He said he submitted a waiver to Quality Assurance and submitted a change.

"The change incorporated reading our indications after the pump-down was accomplished and verifying the final drag reading was within tolerance, rather than replacing the entire system," he said.

This is the first time the

sergeant has submitted an improvement to the IDEA program. He said it took about two months to work out the format and get additional information, but he pursued the improvement as he thought it would be worth the maximum payout of \$10,000.





Beef Steak Soft Tacos

Marinade:

2/3 cup prepared Italian dressing
2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
1 tablespoon chili powder

Beef Tacos:

2 boneless beef chuck shoulder steaks, cut 3/4 inch thick (about 1.5 pounds)
12 small flour tortillas, warmed

Toppings:

Thinly sliced lettuce, chopped tomato, dairy sour cream, guacamole (optional)

Combine marinade ingredients in small bowl. Place beef steaks and marinade in food-safe plastic bag; turn to coat. Close bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 6 hours or as long as overnight, turning occasionally.

Remove steaks; discard marinade. Place steaks on grid over medium, ash-covered coals. Grill, uncovered, 14 to 17 minutes for medium rare (145°F) to medium (160°F) doneness, turning occasionally. Carve into thin slices; season with salt. Serve in tortillas with toppings.

Mandala Art at NWAC

Bismarck artist Linda Schade-wald will exhibit "Mandala: Reinventing the Wheel" at the Northwest Art Center's Gordon B. Olson Library Gallery at Minot State University, June 8 through July 12, 2011.

Schadewald works in a variety of media including stained glass, oils, acrylics and colored pencil.

"The term 'mandala' comes from the ancient Sanskrit language and means 'circle with a center point,'" explains Schadewald. "Mandalas are circular motifs that are found in every culture, and throughout history." Schadewald says she was attracted to the circle as a design element, and over time the mandala became part of her style.

"We humans incorporate the circle in the labyrinths we create; in medicine wheels; in church stained glass windows; in advent wreathes; in Navajo sand paintings, and Tibetan sand mandalas," said Schadewald.

"For some the mandala represents an individual's quest for wholeness,

or is used as a tool for meditation."

"I hope that after seeing this display the viewer will take time to find the mandalas that surround them in their own environments," said Schadewald.






