Minot Airmen earn Omaha trophies

The deputy commander of U.S. Strategic Command, Vice Admiral Cecil D. Haney, presented the 5th Bomb Wing and the 91st Missile Wing two of the four coveted Omaha Trophies here, June 15. The 5th BW earned the Strategic Aircraft Operations Omaha Trophy and the 91st MW earned the Intercontinental Ballistic Missile Omaha Trophy.

The admiral recognized the importance of Minot Air Force Base's mission, and said it was no coincidence that both wings received this prestigious award. "This moment and this trophy represent Team Minot's expertise and unwavering dedication," said Admiral Haney. "This is a testimony

of flexibility and resiliency, which appropriately characterizes Team Minot and all of the Minot community."

Mark Theisen, the U.S. STRATCOM consultation committee member, was also proud to recognize both wings for their achievement.

"The Omaha trophy gives clear evidence that these two wings got it right," said Mr. Theisen. "This is the Super Bowl trophy in your mission area of national defense. You should be very proud."


Selections for the trophy are based on formal evaluations, meritorious achievement, safety, and other factors such as community involvement and humanitarian actions. Each year, Omaha's Strategic Command Consultation Committee recognizes four

outstanding units.



MAFB earns top energy conservation award

Air Force Global Strike Command's Minot AFB was recently recognized for earning the Air Force's top energy and water conservation award here May 31. The 2011 Reducing Energy Appreciation Program award distinguished Minot for surpassing federally mandated energy and water conservation goals.

This Air Force level award is designed to recognize top installations

whose energy and water management efforts clearly reflect conservation objectives required by federal order. Among the requirements is a call for installations' reduction of energy intensity by three percent each year and two percent in water intensity through 2015.

Currently the Air Force has prioritized three goals in an effort to rein in on energy consumption, which include reducing demand, increasing supply and raising overall energy awareness. Specifically, the analyzing of electronics management, building

performance, pollution prevention, water conservation, and renewable power among others, are key components which are measured annually.

The 5th Civil Engineer Squadron energy management office has consistently aimed towards implementing economically viable facility projects that have proven to save the Air Force money, while making energy usage more efficient and effective.

Among one of the projects that has had a significant impact on the base's energy conservation efforts has been the revamping of its primary heating systems. According to the AFGSC capability assessment, in 2009, the base replaced its primary heating plant for high efficiency pulse boilers in select facilities which led to a savings of \$2.6 million in energy and water costs, a 19 percent reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, and more than \$48,000 in annual maintenance savings.

Additionally, since 2007, water consumption was reduced by 20 percent, which far exceeds requirements. The base's energy savings has also gone above its target with a savings of 31 percent since 2003.

Jason Webster, 5th CES energy manager, said years of hard work by the entire base population were needed to achieve the goals reached.

"It is important to keep energy conservation at the forefront because wherever energy is saved, funds are conserved as well," said Mr. Webster.

He added whether it's educating the base on energy conservation during squadron right start briefings or answering questions at facility manager's training, the energy management office continues to spread the

word about energy conservation.

"Everybody wants to save money," said Mr. Webster. "We only have so many energy resources available and we try to make the most efficient use of them."

Tim Thompson, 5th CES resource efficiency manager, explained when new facility projects are underway, they evaluate the technology used in them and make recommendations on what can be used to meet the goals and needs of energy conservation requirements.

"One of our main jobs is to develop cost effective projects that meet designated criteria," said Mr. Thompson. "We also follow up with energy measurements and verification, after we do a project. We ensure we are actually saving money with what was spent on these projects."

He explained finding new projects is always difficult because Minot already has relatively inexpensive energy and water utility expenses.

"We have to make projects economically viable, and if we don't have the proper savings to investment ratio, projects will not get funding," said Mr. Thompson. "We have to save a significant amount of energy to actually make a project pay off."

Nonetheless, the energy team proved that with their dedication, they've exceeded goals which have placed Minot AFB at the top of the charts when it comes to energy conservation.

"Seeing the results of our work and watching energy consumption decrease is great," said Mr. Webster. "The less energy we use, the less money we spend and that's ultimately the goal."

Improving fitness starts with improving recovery, nutrition

OSAN AIR BASE, South Korea (AFNS) - "If you want to be more effective, improve your fitness," said Sir Richard Branson, who was knighted in 1999 and is currently worth more than \$4 billion.

While he is not a member of the military, I think his undeniable success justifies observing his methods. I will be clear and state that I am not advocating for everyone to adopt part-time residency status at the gym.

On the contrary, increasing the amount you exercise is not as critical to improving overall fitness as is proper recovery or nutrition. I think all three are important to overall health, but too often we don't effectively prioritize these key components.

The first step in improving your fitness is improving your recovery. I do not limit this to recovery from working out. The daily grind itself requires a certain amount of recovery, which is where many individuals fall short.

They do not recover enough to support a couch-potato lifestyle, let alone an active lifestyle. Thus, beginning an exercise program without first establishing solid recovery habits will reduce the gains made from exercise.

There is no way around the physiological need for sleep. The standard recommendation is eight hours per night and applies to virtually everyone. Achieving this does not have to occur in one night but can be a gradual change by going to bed just

10 minutes earlier than the previous night and continuing this trend until a more optimal sleep pattern is established.

One caveat is that your day-to-day energy levels and alertness will lag behind your sleep habits by about seven to 10 days. So you will have to achieve seven to 10 consecutive days of adequate sleep before you can expect to see the difference.

Following sleep, the next step in improving fitness is nutrition. Most of us will consume sustenance two to four times per day, but will not have a strong recollection of what we ate, let alone the exact caloric and macronutrient content of what we ate.

This is fine if your meal choices are vegetables and lean sources of

protein 75 percent of the time. However, if this isn't you, then you may need to evaluate your "tracking system." This isn't just for weight loss, because it's possible to be "thin" but be as unhealthy as any obese or overweight individual.

Back to what Sir Branson said, there is no better confidence booster than mastering your own body. On top of the physical changes that occur with fitness improvement, the desire to continue to improve usually persists.

So, while taking care of ourselves is something that can be difficult to prioritize above our other endeavors, it's often that self care that can enable us to achieve more in the long run.

Turn the switch on

MCCONNELL AIR FORCE BASE, Kan. - Each of us plays multiple leadership roles throughout our military careers and, no matter the level of leadership, we always want to make a difference.

Whether that difference is made on the battlefield, for a squadron or for an individual Airman, we all want to know our efforts serve a greater purpose. Each of us can make a difference as a leader mentoring our young Airmen.

All Airmen join the Air Force for different reasons. Whether they see the military as a calling, a paycheck or an adventure, the military draws them to raise their hands, recite an oath and volunteer to serve this great nation. I recited an oath as an enlisted Airman when I joined the Ohio Air National Guard to pay for college. I then transitioned to the active-duty Air Force because I needed a job and I was intrigued by the prospects of becoming an aviator.

As we all know, no one joins the military to get rich, but it is a steady paycheck with numerous opportunities to excel and travel. With all these positive advantages, I took the plunge and raised my hand a second time, only this time it was to attend Officer Training School instead of Basic Military Training.

After being "re-blued" at OTS, I was ready to take on the rigors of flight training. At that time, I had the strategic vision of almost six months and had no real plans beyond my

initial commitment. I wanted to keep my options open and I was all about how cool it was to be an aviator and where my next temporary duty would take me.

I excelled as an aviator and became very comfortable with where I was at the time. I used the time to sit back, be the best at my job and stay out of the "line of sight" tasking beam of the director of operations or squadron commander.

Like many of you, my commanders and the "old" guys in the squadron routinely gave me advice at commander's calls about getting my advanced education and professional military education done early, and also the importance of volunteering for the right jobs to set me up for the future.

To me, it was like my parents talking to me about being better at school. I knew I was supposed to do these things, but I still wasn't convinced I was going to make the Air Force a career, so why would I do more work for an uncertain future? I was happy to fly under the radar and do my job as an aviator. Life was good. Why worry about all the things I needed to do to make major and beyond? I felt I had many years to complete these painful requirements.

So how did I get from being a short-sighted, young officer "flying under the radar," to a squadron commander and now deputy group commander?

What made the difference for me

was a senior navigator taking the time to sit me down and ask me the tough questions about where I was in my Air Force career. He asked how I was doing with my advanced degree and professional military education; what were my goals in my career; and how I was going to reach my goals. Needless to say, I found a mentor. Actually, he found me, but remember back then it was all about me.

I really didn't have good answers to his questions, and, for once, he would not let me answer, "I don't know," "It will happen," or "I'm really busy or TDY to much."

These are some of the same excuses I hear today when I pull an Airman or young officer aside and ask about their goals and aspirations. My mentor made me come up with a plan to not only get to the next rank and job, but beyond. His efforts and persistence slowly turned my "idea switch" to the "on" position, and the light bulb was suddenly illuminated. I finally understood that I needed to be about something bigger than myself. He changed my attitude toward the Air Force from being just a job and a paycheck, to a true calling to serve our nation.

With the help of my mentor, I started making strides to complete all the requirements to become more competitive and take on the right jobs. My mentor helped me get those right jobs, and my career began to snowball from there. It's amazing that when you start taking an inter-

est in your own career and know what it takes to reach your goals, you actually do what is necessary. If it wasn't for my mentor and the time he spent helping me with my goals, who knows where I might be now.

What does all this mean to you?

Each of you is in one of two categories: either you are someone in need of a mentor or you are someone who should serve as a mentor. Either way, we need to ensure our Airmen have a mentor. This means taking a personal interest in an Airman's future and taking the time to ask those tough questions.

For those in a position to be a mentor, share your knowledge and experience to motivate our Airmen. Have the best information and give them an occasional kick in the pants to motivate them to be about something bigger and better than themselves. Your investment in their future will pay huge dividends for the Air Force, because it builds our next generation of mentors.

If you are unsure of what you want out of the Air Force, and you can't answer any of the questions about your future, I urge you to seek out a mentor you trust and respect. Ask this person what they think you can do better and then find out what direction you should take to accomplish your goals. That person will most likely be flattered that you chose them as a mentor and will work harder to give you the best advice they can provide.

Senior NCOs help a lieutenant during deployment

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. (AFNS) - When I was first assigned to security forces, I knew I would deploy, but I thought I had plenty of time.

Things did not go as I expected. With less than a year of active-duty experience and two weeks after graduating technical school, I found myself leading a deployment team to Southwest Asia. Upon arrival, my commander pulled me aside to tell me the officer I was replacing was relieved of duty, and I was instructed not to contact him. I was already nervous, but now I was starting to worry.

Regardless of my concerns, I focused on my job as a night-shift flight commander of a 150-person flight conducting base defense and law enforcement operations. It was a lot to take in as a fresh lieutenant, being responsible for so many people

and resources in an overseas location with no other lieutenants to guide me. I decided to continue to move forward and set some goals for my new flight in hopes of leaving my flight better than I found it.

Goal number one was to ensure that the flight was able to carry out the mission to the best of its ability. The second was to improve morale and ensure everyone got home safely. The last goal: Don't get fired! I was able to accomplish all of these goals, as well as many others, with the help of some highly experienced fellow defenders.

The silver lining and highlight of my deployment experience were the senior NCOs who worked for me. During the next six months, different master sergeants came and went, but each taught me how to be a better leader. By working with them, I took

each of their positive qualities and made them my own. I learned to be firm and uphold standards, as well as the importance of clear communication and rewarding deserving Airmen for a job well done.


Together with my senior NCOs, we watched the flight grow through the passing months. By upholding clear standards, conducting fair practices and showing a genuine care for the well-being of our Airmen, the flight improved and my nervousness and worry turned into confidence.

I soon found myself teaching my flight what I had learned by talking to small groups and individual Airmen during my post checks. During these talks, I would not only check on how they were doing, but I also focused on the discussion on being optimistic, on leadership styles, on having a plan for the future and on respecting

others.

Our flight encountered numerous difficult situations. We responded to a vehicle explosion, a building collapse, possible explosive devices, vehicle accidents, DUIs, accidental injuries, assaults and emotionally unstable individuals. It took its toll at times, but as a whole, the flight carried on and continued to thrive. When my deployment was over, I was proud of all of my Airmen and NCOs for the improvements they made.

My first deployment experience showed me that a good leader will never stop learning new things. I am extremely grateful for the master sergeants who helped me become a more confident and knowledgeable officer. I encourage all young leaders (officer and enlisted) to learn from the experiences of our senior NCOs. I know I will never forget what they taught me.

The baby pool will be open every day from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. once the pool is in full operation.

The outdoor pool offers an annual season pool pass for singles and families. Cost for singles is \$30, cost per double is \$50, and \$5 per additional family member. Daily admission fee without an annual season pass is \$3 per day. Qualified participants in the PLAYpass deployment support program may utilize the Recreate block on their





Game and Fish urges courtesy at boat ramps

Because of high water across the state, access to some of North Dakota's fisheries is difficult, forcing more anglers and pleasure boaters to converge on those ramps and workers offering easier access. With that in mind, boaters are reminded to plan ahead for crowded ramp conditions and exercise patience once there.

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department receives a number of complaints every year about overly aggressive behavior at boat ramps. A few simple reminders will help ensure a fluent transition when launching and loading a boat.

Launching

- Don't pull onto ramp until your boat is ready to launch.

- Prepare for launching in the parking area. Remove covers, load equipment, remove tie downs, attach lines and put in drain plug, before backing onto the ramp.

- When ready, pull into line to launch. Wait your turn. Be courteous.

- It takes at least two people to efficiently and courteously launch a boat: one to handle the boat and one to take care of the tow vehicle.

Loading

- Don't block the loading area with your boat until your tow vehicle is ready to load. Wait until you are clear of the launch area to unload gear.

- As soon as your trailer is in the water, load and secure your boat to the trailer.

- Get clear of the ramp.

Pull into the parking area to finish securing your boat and unload gear.

- All water must be drained from watercraft prior to leaving a water body, including livewells. This means fish, including bait, cannot be transported in a livewell containing water.

- No aquatic vegetation, or parts thereof, shall be in or on watercraft, motors, trailers and recreational equipment when out of water. Time out of the water needed to remove aquatic vegetation at the immediate water access area (boat ramp) is allowed.

- All built-in structures to boats, including livewells and bait compartments, and containers (bait buckets) used to transport legal live bait, must also be free of aquatic vegetation.

If anyone needed confirmation the last three winters weren't exactly mild, a formula classifying winter severity based on ambient temperatures and snow depth says it's been well beyond severe in the Steele area.

That area is near the site of a white-tailed deer study conducted by South Dakota State University (SDSU) graduate student Brian Schaffer.

Using the formula, a winter severity index of 50 or less is considered a mild winter, explained N. D. Game and Fish Department big game biologist Bill Jensen. If the rating is 100 or more, it's considered a severe winter.

With the formula, Jensen said he calculated a 2009 winter severity index of 194, 166 in 2010, and 215 in 2011 for Steele. "So they've (deer in the study area) had three hard winters," he described. In fact, Jensen considers that to be extremely severe.

The formula allows biologists to correlate weather with mortality.

Based on the winter's severity, Jensen is surprised that up until January 2011 the only mortality among any of the radio-collared and ear-tagged does, bucks and fawns was human-caused, either hunting or vehicle collisions.

Non-human mortality - starvation, predation or disease - didn't start showing up until the 2011 winter really hammered the region. Jensen theorizes at that point, non-human factors started occurring because deer lost their fat reserves and had no energy left to fend off coyotes, pneumonia or other diseases, let alone survive any injuries.

The genesis for the study came after big game biologists flew the study area in January 2009 as part of their annual winter aerial deer surveys. They flew again in March 2009 because it was the state's first severe winter in several years and they wanted to gauge potential changes in the region's deer numbers.

They noted significant declines in deer numbers over the two-month time span, Jensen said. It's possible generations of deer didn't know what winter was and lacked the wherewithal to survive. Those that did were simply hardier and could better handle the following 2010 winter.

Some of the study information gleaned so far focuses on general deer movement and reproductive performance.

Deer moved an average of less than four miles from summer to winter habitat. Seventeen miles was the farthest any of the collared or tagged deer moved.

Of 36 radio-collared does, 26 had one fawn and 10 had two fawns last year. That fawn-to-doe ratio is possibly slightly lower than the long-term average, Jensen said, but he admits it is difficult to observe fawns.

Using a technique developed by SDSU researchers and already used in South Dakota and Minnesota deer research, Schaffer will try to collar up to 20 fawns this spring. He must observe does and their fawns, attempt to locate the fawn when it is alone, walk up and collar it.

Jensen said the Game and Fish Department hopes to duplicate the study Schaffer is conducting elsewhere in North Dakota in the future. They have yet to determine the next study area. Using the same collaring techniques allows for comparisons with other states, Jensen said. "Now you can start answering some questions," he said.

The study continues through December 2011, with Schaffer's final report in 2012. So far, Schaffer collared and tagged 48 deer in 2010 and another 14 were collared in the winter of 2010-2011.

Fall turkey season set, online applications available

North Dakota's fall turkey season is set with 4,630 licenses available to hunters, according to Stan Kohn, upland game management supervisor for the state Game and Fish Department. This year's figure is down 20 percent from last year. However, 1,300 additional licenses may be used early this fall in specific hunting units if turkey reproduction is exceptionally good this spring.

Harvest and population data from hunting units in the southwest and in two units in the central part of the state indicate turkey numbers have decreased substantially due to poor production and chick recruitment from 2008-2010.

"However, above-average snowfall the last three winters and normal rainfall this spring has greatly improved habitat conditions in much of the state," Kohn said. "Turkeys will benefit from this improved nesting and brooding habitat. If weather isn't a detriment, the improved habitat conditions could result in better production in many parts of the state this summer."

An experimental hunting season will continue for the USDA-ARS Northern Great Plains Research Lab in Mandan. A maximum of 30 licenses will be available. These licenses will be available at the Game and Fish Department once a person first obtains a permit from USDA-ARS.

An experimental turkey bow hunting season will

continue within the city of Bismarck to help control a growing population of birds in residential areas. A maximum of 25 licenses will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis to individuals who are licensed to bow hunt deer within the city. These licenses will be available at the Game and Fish Department in Bismarck once a person has a valid city archery permit.

Hunting units 21 (Hettinger and Adams counties) and 53 (Divide and Williams counties) will remain closed to fall turkey hunting in 2011 because of low turkey numbers.

The fall wild turkey season extends from Oct. 8 through Jan. 8, 2012. Prospective hunters, including gratis applicants, can apply online at gf.nd.gov, or print out an application to mail, at the state Game and Fish Department's website, gf.nd.gov. Paper applications will be available in mid-June from Game and Fish Department offices, county auditors and license vendors.

Applications are also accepted at the department's toll-free licensing line, (800) 406-6409. A service fee is added for license applications made over the phone.

Applications for the fall season must be postmarked no later than July 6. Only North Dakota residents are eligible to apply in the first lottery. Nonresidents can apply for fall turkey licenses that are still available following the first lottery.

MacLean shooting range closed

The MacLean shooting range located near the MacLean boat ramp south of Bismarck is closed until further notice due to overland flooding.

Two alternate public ranges that are open are Schmidt Bottoms and Wilton Mine Wildlife Management Area.

Schmidt Bottoms is located 13.4 miles south of Mandan on ND Highway 1806. Wilton Mine Wildlife Management Area is approximately two miles east of Wilton.

MSU and MAFB celebrate 50 years of teamwork

Minot State University celebrated its 50th anniversary of serving military members and their families at MAFB on Monday, June 6, 2011. Education officials, students and their families enjoyed cake and ice cream served by MSU's education staff at MAFB's Education Center.

In the fall of 1961, the North Dakota Board of Higher Education named J. Bernard Busse, a faculty member of Minot State Teachers College, director of the Extension Service. Continued campus growth and extended field-service operation created the need for a full-time extension service director. Adult education was becoming increasingly important in the 1960s, and

MSTC was in a position to contribute to local and regional needs.

Under the new program, Busse was empowered to utilize all available staff, professionally trained faculty and qualified citizens to teach in the program. This broadened MSTC's reach to the surrounding region and Minot Air Force Base. The program later absorbed qualified airmen to teach as well.

By the spring 1962, airmen of the 906th Refueling Squadron were taking MSTC classes at MAFB. The sessions were eight weeks and available to on-duty and off-duty airmen and dependents. The campus also offered high school courses and evaluations for credit and implemented the newly created Air Force Bootstrap Program.

Bootstrap allowed airmen to attend college full-time to finish degree requirements for programs they had not previously completed.

William Foster, base education advisor, and Capt. Terrance O'Brien, Strategic Air Command education project officer, designed a schedule of 10 classes at MSTC. These classes included courses in communications, mathematics, humanities, geography, political science, sociology, education and U.S. history.

On-duty classes operated out of the base aircrew Alert Facility. B-52 alert aircrews from the 525th Bomb Squadron, Strategic Air Command, used the same space for classrooms and plotting their "Peace Persuader" missions around the globe.

Today, Minot State University offers 40 to 50 classes per semester and bachelors' degrees in more than 60 majors. MSU continues to be the only educational provider offering a "full university" within a 10-minute drive, with a fulltime advisor on MAFB.

Growth has not tampered the solid relationship between MAFB and MSU. Fifty years and thousands of students later, the team remains strong.

"MSU currently serves over 300 airmen and women in flexible course offerings," Kris Warmoth, dean of The Center for Extended Learning said. "We have continued the tradition by bringing the classroom to the squadron and beyond."




