

Global Strike Airman tops the list

An Air Force Global Strike Command technical sergeant was announced as one of the Air Force's 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year for 2011, here on July 13.

Tech. Sgt. Bradley Williams, a vehicle operations supervisor for 5th Logistics Readiness Squadron, will be honored by Air Force Association officials in September during the AFA National Convention in Washington.

An Air Force selection board at the Air Force Personnel Center considered 35 nominees who represented major commands, direct reporting units, field operating agencies and Headquarters Air Force. The board selected 12 Airmen based on superior leadership, job performance and personal achievements.

"These 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year truly represent the excellence that our Airmen around the world do each and every day," said Chief Master Sgt. of the Air Force James Roy. "I'm proud to serve with them and look forward to seeing the great things they will do in the future."

After facing the possibility of being medically discharged from the Air Force, Williams feels this award just

reinforces the reason why he is still in. "The award represents a lot more to me than just the win," said Williams. "I was processed under a medical evaluation board the year prior and offered separation with severance pay. I fought to stay in and was successful. The award shows me that I still have a lot to offer."

Williams has proven his ability to lead in the past. While deployed, he thwarted a small arms fire attack, rapidly executed rules of engagement and ensured that there were no casualties. He was also the on-scene commander at a major vehicle accident where he coordinated combat lifesaver care to the wounded, which ultimately saved a life. His success was lauded by Kuwait's crowned prince.

Williams was named the AFGSC NCO of the Year in March, and now, as one of the Air Force's 12 OAY, he will have the opportunity to travel and speak with peers as part of the Air Force Enlisted Council, and can then up-channel peer recommendations for possible AF policy changes.

Col. James Dawkins, 5th Bomb Wing commander, said Williams being selected as one of the 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year is evidence of the hardworking force here at Minot AFB.

"His persistence and support to his Airmen in times of hardship exempli-

fies his dedication and service before self," said the colonel. "His extensive list of accomplishments proves his excellence. His ability to step outside of his comfort zone and attempt the impossible confirms his ability to lead. These are characteristics of an outstanding Airman, and I am proud to have this NCO leader represent both Air Force Global Strike Command, as well as Team Minot."

Twitter and Facebook on the front lines of Minot flood response

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. - When areas surrounding Minot Air Force Base, N.D., began combating historic flooding recently, the Minot public affairs office turned to Twitter and Facebook to keep information flowing to Airmen and their families.

Since news broke of a possible flood in the area, interaction on Minot's Facebook page has increased by 550 percent, and the base's Twitter followers have more than doubled-and these numbers continue to grow.

These tools proved to be especially effective during a town hall meeting for affected Airmen and their families June 29, said Capt. Genieve David, 5th Bomb Wing public affairs chief.

Many Airmen who wanted to attend the town hall could not be present due to route closures, causing usual travel times to double or triple, Captain David said. But, by using social media tools, Airmen were able to virtually receive information being presented and interact with presenters, she said.

A variety of experts provided information during the town hall, including Minot Air Force Base school liaison officer, finance, safety and legal, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Information presented was, in turn, made available through live updates on Facebook and Twitter, where more than 50 direct questions and answers were facilitated virtually, Captain David said.

Airmen submitted questions to the Minot Twitter handle, and answers were sent back through the twitterverse by a public affairs representative, she said. The same process was executed through Facebook.

Staff Sgt. Christopher Swiech said he followed the town hall information through Facebook not for his own family, who was not displaced-but for a very dear friend's family, who was.

"My friend Mike works in the oil fields west of town and is married to a senior airman who is deployed," Sergeant Swiech said. "Ashley returns early next month and they have been evacuated and have likely lost their home entirely-that is quite a blow for a young family."

Swiech sought out housing options for his friends using information from the town hall, streamlining the process for them and helping them to access the services needed to relocate through base resources, despite Ashley's deployment.

"Even those who have not been evacuated have seen an interruption in service from local broadband carriers, and in the day and age of smartphones, services like Facebook and Twitter have become the most accessible sources of information," Swiech said.

Capt. Genieve David, 5th Bomb Wing public affairs chief, said Minot Public Affairs is using social media platforms as a venue for questions and a place for Airmen and family members to connect and offer support to each other.

"The success of the virtual interaction during the town

Officials hope relief will flood in for Minot families

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. - With waters still above flood levels weeks after the natural disaster began in Minot, N.D., Air Force Global Strike Command officials are telling the public how they can donate to relief and recovery efforts.

More than 1,100 Airmen and family members from nearby Minot Air Force Base were displaced from their homes when the Souris River crested June 25, sending water up to 13 feet deep into the heart of the city of Minot. Airmen who owned and rented homes in the now-flooded area are beginning to return to see firsthand what they left behind.

As conditions permit, residents are being allowed back to visit homes that are flooded, damaged and needing costly repairs and replacements.

A number of relief efforts have been launched to ease the impact, officials say. Donations will be used to help families through the disaster.

"Anything and everything helps," said Chaplain (Col.) Gerald McManus, command chaplain for Air Force Global Strike Command. "Some of our Airmen have lost everything."

Lt. Col. Jon Dawson, who serves as the inspector general at Minot Air Force Base, is among the Airmen picking up the pieces.

"My family and I evacuated June 23," Colonel Dawson said. He said his family had a chance to remove many of their possessions before the floods reached his home and his family's household goods are now "randomly scattered between neighbors."

"Flood waters completely submerged our basement and reached approximately three to four feet on the first floor," he said. "We've begun the clean-up process."

"It's a major mess."

One way Air Force people worldwide can donate to the Minot cause is at their local installation chapels and while attending chapel services. Beginning July 1, the Air Force Chaplain Corps spearheaded a service-wide "designated offering," Chaplain McManus said, "given of free will and entirely designated for Minot Airmen and their families."

A \$15,000 donation was one of the first to be presented, officials note. A check was sent from the Barksdale Air Force Sergeants Association to OPERATION WARMHEART for the Minot flood relief only days after the flooding began.

Members of the public can also donate to the relief efforts by contacting OPERATION WARMHEART directly through the Minot Airman and Family Readiness Center.

Monetary funds are "especially important" to the recovery effort, said Cindy Whitesell, chief of Airman and Family Readiness at Minot.

"Most displaced and affected Airmen had an opportunity to clear their homes of critical personal belongings before the flood," she explained, "but now are returning to homes that need a lot of work, so dollars can really improve this process for them."

OPERATION WARMHEART is a year-round program designed

to assist Airmen and their families through times of hardship.

OPERATION WARMHEART asks donors to make checks payable to "Operation WarmHeart" and to place the words "flood relief" in the memo line and mail to the following address:

Minot Airman and Family Readiness Center, 22 Peacekeeper Place, Minot, N.D. 58705.

The chapel offerings will continue to be collected through August 8 and will be transferred to OPERATION WARMHEART, McManus said.

"Taking care of our Air Force Family is our heritage," Chaplain McManus said.

"We aren't going to stand idly by while our Airmen return home and attempt to pick up the pieces of what was left behind by flood water."

Guidance on applying for USAF funded entitlements

As immediate reaction steps conclude and longer-term plans emerge for families dealing with the evacuation, the documentation links below will provide the latest guidance on how to apply for United States Air Force funded entitlements.

As processing guidance, please see the 'CPTS Limited Evac Slides' and 'LRS Evacuation HHG Storage and Movement Process Guidance'. These two will be the source for how the process will work at Minot and should be reference by unit command their staff in briefing evacuees on what to do and who to contact. If there are any questions on these two specific attachments, please contact either CPTS or LRS respectively.

Other attachments are provided for your reference.

For processing travel, lodging, and per diem requests on behalf of DEPENDENTS of Military and DoD Civilians (appropriated fund), please see:

- 'Unit CC Evacuation Certification.' is to be used as the initiating step in DEPENDENT travel/lodging/& per diem.

- '5 BW CC Flood Order - Travel & Per Diem.' is provided for reference.

For processing house-hold goods short distance moves and non-temp storage requests for active duty members and the dependents of active duty members, please see:

- 'AF 150 for 2011 Evacuees HHG storage.' is to be used for the processing of HHG storage for active duty member and the dependents of active duty members. Please note that the AF 150 is normally used by the 5 CES Housing Office. However, it has been adapted for this process and evacuees will not need to go to the 5th Civil Engineer Squadron Housing Office to get this form completed. This form will be filled out at the unit level and will be sent to 5 LRS for processing.

- '5 BW CC Flood Order - HHG' is provided for reference.

One final note, while there are some standard entitlements that are allowed for evacuees depending on their unique situations, the attached guidance is the closest thing we have to a standard process. As evacuees, the most important thing to do for this process is to get the dependent travel orders initiated and the HHG storage planned before the August 5 deadline so that you don't lose out on the opportunity. Finally home: One man's desire to serve his adoptive nation

SOUTHWEST ASIA (AFNS) - It's amazing how sometimes you get just what you need, right when you need it.

More than five months into another deployment, I was tired: Tired from the challenges faced in a new job, a new place; tired from the long hours and pressure of trying to be the best; tired of being away from my wife and kids.

With my personal battery gauge hovering in the red area just above empty, I put on my game face and traveled to another deployed location to follow up on a compelling story I'd learned about weeks earlier. While there, I figured I'd go around and see what else I could dig up to highlight the good folks providing base security for an important combined training mission.

As luck would have it, some folks I met introduced me to 2nd Lt. Konstantin Gazaryan of the 64th Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron. My initial impression was the same as it always is these days when meeting lieutenants: I felt old. He came across as professional, fit, enthusiastic - but it always hits me how long I've been in the Air Force when I meet leaders in their early 20s.

However, this man had lived more in his years than I have in mine.

His world was turned upside down in 1990, when he was just 5 years old. He was sharing a small apartment in Azerbaijan, a small Eastern European country located on the Caspian Sea, north of Iran and south of Russia, with his grandparents and other family members during a time of struggle in Baku, the city of his birth, when the Azeris began what Gazaryan and many news sources describe as genocide.

"I remember the day," Gazaryan said quietly. "I remember a loud knocking on the door. There was someone pounding his fist on the door, screaming. I remember looking at my grandpa and he was frantic, pulling pins off our apartment doors and bracing them against the front door. But it really didn't work.

"The crowd behind the door knew who we were," he said. "They hacked their way through the front door and opened a latch. Then there was a raid of people ... a bunch of people coming in, walking all over the place, walking on our beds and looting. They grabbed my grandmother's crystal and everything of value they could get their hands on. We watched my grandmother hide all our important

documents under her skirt. It was nuts."

The conflict was rooted in the history and politics in the region, but to 5-year-old Konstantin, it made no sense why angry people were raiding his home.

"Growing up, I was curious because I really didn't understand what would make someone hate somebody else so much that they would want to kill you," he said. "I was only 5 years old. I didn't understand why people would do that."

Gazaryan and his family were targeted like many other Armenians, but they lost more than their worldly possessions during the raid.

"After that incident, we were refugees," he said. "We didn't have a home. They had buses lined up outside waiting for us. They shipped us to the airport because they were trying to find a place to put us," he explained. "So we went to Moscow, but the Russians said we weren't truly Russian so they didn't want us there, either."

Eventually, the family settled in the outlying city of Rostov-na-Donu, where Gazaryan's father, Slav Gazaryan, joined them and supported the family by doing odd jobs in construction and repair. During the next several years, the family began the process of applying to immigrate to the United States.

Because they were considered refu-

gees, the process was not as long as it might have been. When Konstantin was 8 years old, the family was on a plane to Omaha, Neb. They had finally found a home.

After landing at the local airport, the Gazaryans stayed with relatives already in Omaha as they began getting settled. Slav got right to work, taking two jobs and getting the family established. Unfortunately, the hard-working father, who would bring young Konstantin with him to jobs, trying to teach him a trade, didn't get to enjoy the new life he'd built.

Slav Gazaryan died in a car accident about a year after moving to the U.S.

His father's death devastated Konstantin, but as time passed the family made it through - happy and grateful to finally have a homeland where they were welcome.

That sense of gratitude stayed with the young man as he came of age to choose his career.

"I know a lot of people have different reasons to join the service, but for me it's pretty personal," the lieutenant told me. "I don't mean to be a sap, but this country gave me a home when no one else would, so it wouldn't be right if I didn't stand up and answer the call when my country needed me most. After all, (my country) was there for me."

Based largely on their various experiences with militaries and the current danger of operations, Gazaryan's family was concerned to hear his plan to join.

"I just told them that we are here enjoying these rights; ... we were taken in by this country when everybody else hated us for no reason," he said. "So it was a no brainer for me to sign up."

Gazaryan earned a commission and was stationed at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb.

Now, halfway through his first deployment, as he tried to put into words what his deployed service meant to him, he ran out of words, but not emotion. Seeing the purity of his intent to serve, and the pride he had in paying back what he sees as a debt to his adoptive nation, well, let's just say this lieutenant and his story helped me when I needed it.

Like hooking up a pair of jumper cables to a car in need, meeting this second lieutenant, a proud member of the 64th Expeditionary Security Forces Squadron, charged my battery and allowed me to, as they say, sprint to the finish line.



How to access the North Gate - safely



The Magic City (Main) gate is scheduled to be closed from Aug. 1 - Sept. 10. While the Magic City (Main) Gate is closed personnel are asked to use County Road 6. County Road 6 is a little over two miles north of the Magic City (Main) Gate; it is the **second road on your left** as you head north from the base. The first road you come to is 198th Ave NW. This is a minimal maintenance road that is maintained by the county and not recommended for use to access the North Gate due to the fact it is a gravel minimal maintenance road and currently washed out. Drive past 198th Ave (**about a mile**) there will be a brown sign with white lettering for Lake Darling Dam (see photo); just past this sign is a green sign directing operators to the North Gate (see photo), just after that sign is the **turn for County Road 6**. Travel west on County Road 6 (**about one mile**) where you will see another North Gate sign. When you see the sign slow down and turn left towards the North Gate. This route is kept in fairly good condition and provides a much smoother ride than 198th Ave. It is because of the potential safety problem that the 5th and 91st Safety offices, as well as, the 5 SFS **do not recommend the use of 198th Ave NW** to access the North Gate.



The entire length of Missile Ave. will be repaved this summer. The work will be done in five sections. Work on the first section, from Peacekeeper to Huey Lane, including the intersection of Peacekeeper and Missile Ave., will start Monday, July 18 and be accomplished in approximately 10 days. Work on subsequent sections will be advertised prior to that work starting. Everyone should use alternate routes to avoid this area. Detouring through housing is highly discouraged.

RAF FAIRFORD, United Kingdom - Celebrating the 40th anniversary of what is billed as the world's largest military air show, RAF Fairford turned over the airfield to the Royal International Air Tattoo July 16-17.

Held at RAF Fairford 21 times since 1985, the Royal International Air Tattoo hosted more than 200 aircraft from 30 countries on static and aerial display, including 18 aircraft from the different branches of the U.S. military.

"In addition to the air displays that we have, we're also honored to host a number of international Air Chiefs who

are here representing their nations and displaying the world's best in military aviation," said Col. Brian Kelly, 501st Combat Support Wing commander.

"While this is our airfield on a day-to-day basis, we are happy and honored to turn it over to the RAF Charitable Trust for this two-week period to allow them to conduct the Air Tattoo."

This year's themes for the Air Tattoo included the 40th anniversary of RIAT, as well as the 50th anniversary of NATO's Tiger Association, but an enduring theme is the promotion of aviation.

"The crowds are great, there are wonderful displays, and there are a number of interactive venues that help

promote military aviation, which is what this is really all about," Col Kelly said.

"The venues providing education and interactive experiences to young folks truly help build a genuine interest and enthusiasm about aviation." The Air Tattoo provides several opportunities for participating nations, from highlighting various weapons systems and capabilities, to interaction with foreign aircrews and senior military leaders.

"It's the public interaction, showing our friendship and connections with the rest of NATO and other nations of the world," said Maj. Shaun Bellamy, 480th Fighter Squadron from Spangdahlem Air Base. "It's not just an air

show - it's national support."

Participating in his first Royal International Air Tattoo, Capt. Michael Stepan, an electronic warfare officer on the B-52 Stratofortress stationed at Minot Air Force Base, N.D., was happy for the opportunity to interact with the public and speak to foreign air crews.

"It's great for the Air Force, and for the bomber community, to be able to interact with other aircraft and crewmembers and talk about the capabilities of the aircraft," Stepan said.

The aerial displays included the national demonstration teams from the United Kingdom, Italy and, visiting RIAT for the first time, Saudi Arabia, as well as solo dem-

onstrations that included an Air Force A-10 from the West Coast Demonstration Team.

"The A-10 was a spectacular show," Kelly said. "Even the rehearsal flying brought big crowds - they got to see exactly what the capabilities are of our aircraft, and picture the attack role and close-air support we provide with the A-10."

The aerial displays weren't the only exciting aspect of the Air Tattoo. The static aircraft drew a lot of attention from the crowds as well.

Being able to talk about the aircraft and their capabilities is great, said Bellamy, because "you get to interact with the public and see some starry-eyed children looking toward the future."

Standing strong through adversity

Images of flooded homes and floating debris within the city of Minot were recently a common sight to see on the front page of newspapers and throughout various national media outlets across the country.

They reflected difficulties the Minot community continues to face, which includes more than 1,100 Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen affected by the recent historic flooding situation.

Among those displaced was Tech. Sgt. Lance Berentson, 741st Missile Squadron facility manager, who said the images he saw on the news only brought anxiety because he couldn't help but wonder what was happening to his home.

In anticipation to what he was sure was an imminent evacuation order, Berentson was able to sandbag around his home, pack up as many belongings as he could and move his family of six, including pets, elsewhere.

He said he was originally going to move into his in-law's mobile home, but he didn't think that would be the best living situation for his family. Luckily, one of his wife's co-workers offered assistance and arranged accommodations for them on base.

Angie Clark, wife of Tech. Sgt. Kevin Clark, 5th Operations Support Squadron aircrew flight equipment craftsman, said as soon as she knew of the troubles the Berentson family was going through, she opened her doors to them.

"I couldn't imagine leaving friends displaced in a dome or in some mass shelter area, especially if they have four children," said Clark. "Right before they got here I organized everything in the house and prepared for them to arrive. It was very panicky the first day but we worked things out."

She explained she took on the job of continuing normalcy for the Berentson family. She set up video games for the boys, TV for the girls, toys for the

little ones and had a fenced-in yard for the pets.

"I also tried to keep Jennifer busy because when she would hear news of the flood on TV, it would bring her down, but she's a strong woman and kept herself together," said Clark. "The only thing I could think of when they were here is -if they have to go through this devastation - then how can I make everything as much like home to them as possible."

When Clark's friends would ask her how they handled housing an additional six individuals at her home, she would tell them she was doing her part in helping out the community. She added she was just one of several taking in displaced friends and family members.

"I don't see what I did as anything

special, I think that everybody that could have done something did," said Clark. "Everybody who took in families is phenomenal. I cannot believe the outreach and support of the community."

Berentson said throughout the whole situation he did his best to cope with everything that was going on, and despite not knowing how his house was holding up, he tried to stay positive.

"Complaining about things and having a bad attitude about it was not going to make things better," said Berentson. "We continued to do our best to keep things for the family as close to home as possible."

He explained the kids were aware of everything that was going on and they knew what was happening and

overall were fine and could deal with it.

"They understood we had to do what was necessary," Berentson said. "It's just one of those situations where we had to make do with what we had."

When the Berentson family was allowed back into their home July 12, they found their basement flooded, the house's foundation damaged and their yard in shambles. Nonetheless, Berentson said he would work to fix his home and had no plans on moving.

The following courts-martial recently convened at Minot Air Force Base:

U.S. vs. Airman 1st Class Carrillo

On July 1, a special court-martial was convened to hear the case of United States versus Airman 1st Class David J. Carrillo, 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron. Carrillo was charged with violating Article 80, attempted larceny; Article 121, larceny; and Article 134, unlawful

entry, obtaining services by false pretenses, and taking the personal information of another. Between Aug. 27, 2010 and Nov. 8, 2010 it was alleged that Carrillo unlawfully entered the rooms of other individuals at a missile alert facility, took personal information and credit card information, made purchases with other individual's credit cards, stole property from Wal-Mart, stole property from unknown individual's vehicles, and stole property from the United States Air Force. Carrillo was found

guilty of all the offenses and was sentenced to six months confinement, reduction to E-1, and a bad conduct discharge.

U.S. vs. Airman Lori

On July 7, a special court-martial was convened to hear the case of United States versus Airman Michael R. Lori, 5th Maintenance Squadron. Lori was charged with violating Article 112a, wrongful use of marijuana and ecstasy. Between Feb. 1 and March 31, it was alleged that Lori wrongfully used marijuana in Canada and wrongfully used ecstasy on Minot Air Force

Base. Lori was found guilty of all offenses and was sentenced to five months confinement, reduction to E-1, and forfeiture of \$900.00 pay per month for five months.

Airman Williams

On July 8, a special court-martial was convened to hear the case of United States versus Airman Lucas J. Williams, 5th Maintenance Squadron. Williams was

charged with violating Article 112a, wrongful use of marijuana and ecstasy. Between Feb. 1, and March 31, it was alleged that Williams wrongfully used marijuana in Canada and wrongfully used ecstasy on Minot Air Force Base. Williams was found guilty of all offenses and was sentenced to four months confinement, reduction to E-1, and forfeiture of \$600.00 pay per month for four months.



Six tips to save your child from drowning

Three children die every day from drowning.

It's the leading cause of death from an injury for children ages 1-4 years old, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Mid-summer is prime time for water fun, but it can also be deadly, if parents aren't careful.

The Red Cross Summer Water Safety Guide states more than 90 percent of families with young children will spend time in the water this summer. And almost half of them plan to swim in places with no lifeguard.

What does this mean?

You need to take responsibility for your children's safety around water. Here are six tips from the Red Cross and the CDC to keep your children safe:

- Learn CPR. Seconds count if your child falls into the water. You could be the life-saving support until paramedics arrive. Contact your local Red Cross chapter or your local fire department to learn when CPR classes



are available.

- Supervise your children constantly around water. NEVER leave the supervision

to an older child, and avoid distractions yourself when watching your kids. This includes around bathtubs,

swimming pools and natural bodies of water—such as the ocean or a lake.

- Secure pools with proper barriers. Install a four-sided fence around your pool. It should have self-closing AND self-latching gates.

- Always wear life jackets. Even if your kids know how to swim, they should always wear life jackets around natural bodies of water, such as the ocean or lake. For younger or inexperienced swimmers, they should wear life jackets around ALL water,

even pools.

- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to swim. Have young kids? Enroll them in age-appropriate swim courses. And if you still need to learn, sign up for classes immediately.

- Have lifesaving equipment available nearby. This includes reaching or throwing equipment (such as a life-saver and rope), a cell phone, lifejackets and a first aid kit.

Ric Groves knows when cancer takes his mortal body he will be assured of two things – his U.S. Marine Corps nephew will make certain Ric spends his last hours with a fly rod in hand along his favorite lake.

He also knows he will have given his heart, soul and all the strength within to help men like himself: Men dealing with the emotional and physical pain of cancer, not in silence as is so typical of men but with friendship and outpouring of understanding found through a lake, a fish and a fly rod.

Groves, from Roy, Utah, has Stage IV prostate and bone cancer. The 51-year-old diesel engine mechanic can't work because he isn't steady enough to be on his feet for any length of time.

His cancer was in remission.

It came back at double its ferocity. Chemotherapy and radiation isn't helping.

While the cancer isn't growing, Ric isn't getting better.

A fly-fisher for 30 years, a cancer center doctor's suggestion in 2010 changed the course in how Ric would spend whatever time remains for him. "Basically, what I'm doing is living life as best I can and volunteering for Reel Recovery," he described.

Reel Recovery is a non-profit organization founded in Colorado by a group of avid fly-fishers in 2003. They saw the therapeutic effect fly-fishing had on a friend – how time spent with rod in hand, focusing on fish and the outdoors, a body of water and friendship - helped set aside cancer's pain and struggles.

Reel Recovery was born.

Men don't typically talk about themselves or their pain, emotions, fears or hopes.

Reel Recovery combines a weekend fly-fishing retreat with courageous conversations and camaraderie, an opportunity for men with cancer to share stories and

develop a kinship with others dealing with the same fate life dealt them.

It provides a healing connection with nature.

At first Ric scoffed at the thought of attending a Reel Recovery retreat. He wasn't one to talk about his problems.

He didn't want to burden others.

He was a strong, 6-foot, 5-inch guy, after all.

Plus, he already knew how to fly-fish. Yet Ric attended a Reel Recovery retreat in June 2011.

Each retreat brings 10 to 12 men together for fly-fishing highlighted by six sessions of "courageous

conversations" led by trained facilitators.

The courageous conversations allow participants to explore their emotions. "The

first ones (courageous conversation questions) weren't too hard because it's more statements of facts. What was hard for me was the question that asked, "What has cancer taken away from you?" That was the hard one for me...my answer was "it took my livelihood away," Ric matter-of-factly stated.

"Reel Recovery was the hardest and best thing I've ever done," he said. Participants are beat down physically and emotionally, he described. "Men suffer in silence...because they don't want to appear weak."

After a weekend on the water and with newfound friends, participants are renewed with strength and hope and new kinships. They may even have caught a fish or two.

Knowing firsthand how Reel Recovery helped him, Ric has dedicated himself to helping others in a similar situation. "My goal is I want to become a buddy (volunteer helper) and facilitator and I want to be able to do whatever I can to help this organization."

Special Missouri River bottom deer hunt on hold

Flooding along the Missouri River north and west of Bismarck has prompted the State Game and Fish Department to put an experimental deer herd reduction hunt on hold.

The agency was going to start issuing up to 200 special antlerless licenses on Aug. 1, but Department officials have postponed that process due to uncertainties over habitat condition and deer availability after floodwaters recede.

"This experimental season was designed to reduce deer numbers on private land in a relatively small area," Randy Kreil, Game and Fish wildlife division chief said. "We had good support from landowners who were committed to hosting hunters, but most of them are dealing with flooding issues. Our agency and the landowners feel it's better to wait a year and hope that normal conditions will return."

The experimental season was set up so Game and Fish could match interested hunt-

ers with participating landowners. Randomly selected hunters would need to secure written permission from landowners before

Game and Fish would issue a special license. The special antlerless licenses would have been valid in all open seasons with the appropriate firearm or archery equipment within the designated unit.

The experimental hunt area included land west of River Road and State Highway 1804, north and west of Bismarck, with Wilderness Cover Road near Pioneer Park as the southern boundary and 149th Ave. NW (north of Double Ditch Indian Village) as the northern boundary.

During the regular deer season, much of this area is not open to hunting with centerfire rifles.

While Game and Fish will not issue special licenses, the experimental hunt area is still open to archery and gun hunting for those with appropriate bow or firearm season licenses.

Homeland Secretary visits Minot

The U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security concluded her visit here following a helicopter tour of the damage caused by the recent Souris River flooding and a closed session meeting with key local and state officials here, July 13.

Janet Napolitano, U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security, said after putting eyes on the devastation, she now has a deeper appreciation of what residents are dealing with here.

"One reason I came out here was to see for myself," Secretary Napolitano said. "FEMA is here and will be here as long as it takes to make things happen."

Including the estimated 11,000 displaced residents of Minot and the surrounding communities, more than 1,100 Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen and their families have been displaced after forced evacuations.

The Souris River began flooding the area on June 20. The National Weather Service has measured 8-13 feet of water that has flooded into portions of the city.

A closed session meeting was held at Minot City Hall with key state and local officials, to include Col. S.L. Davis, 91st Missile Wing commander, prior to Secretary Napolitano's media availability.

Discussions included an executive summary of the current situations in Minot, Burlington, Sawyer and other surrounding communities, FEMA progress on the ground, proposals on how to cope with the infrastructure loss of four public school institutions, and ensuring the school year begins on time.

"There are two key things that need to be addressed and need to be dealt with now - ensuring the residents have access to grocery stores and schools," said the secre-

tary. "We need to ensure the schools open on time."

Minot Mayor Curt Zimbleman concurred and stated there is a working group dedicated to ensuring that education is not compromised due to the flooding aftermath.

"We are doing everything to provide the children with the same type of classroom setting," Mayor Zimbleman said.

Colonel Davis discussed Minot Air Force Base's concerns about the long-term beddown solution for Airmen currently affected and future inbound personnel housing challenges.

"We have to get housing for your Airmen," Secretary Napolitano stated adamantly.

Prior to the flooding, Minot already had a shortage of housing availability on- and off-base due to the oil industry demand.

According to Willie Nunn, FEMA Federal Coordinating Officer, their team has conducted site surveys and environmental assessments on several locations. They are looking at obtaining approximately 4,000 trailers.

They are anticipating getting those trailers at the end of August or early September. Once the trailers are in Minot, the FCO estimated it would take approximately 48 hours from the time a displaced person makes a request to the time the trailer is in place and powered up.


The secretary concluded, "The Department of Homeland Security and FEMA are here for the duration. We're all standing behind the people of Minot, behind the people of the surrounding area, and the people of North Dakota. We will make sure that everything that can be done will be done as promptly as possible."

Youth selected for parts in the production **must commit** to being a part of the program for the entire week. Play practice times will be announced on August 8th and will be held throughout the week.


Show Off Your Ride At The Show & Shine Car Show

tery. Forms and imagery of ancient figurines have been the inspiration for Olson's recent sculptural pieces.


MSU students participating in the exhibit will show sculptures produced in their spring semester ceramics classes.

Foreign high school students are scheduled to arrive soon for academic semester and year homestay programs, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families. The students are anxiously awaiting news of their new families. These young ambassadors are looking forward to fulfilling their life-long dreams.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) President, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and want to share their cultural experiences with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length

from one semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local public and private high schools. "At this critical time in our country's history, hosting an international teen is the best and purest form of public diplomacy the United States has," said Doty.

P.I.E. area representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it is a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.

Families who host for

P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a monthly charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Germany, the Former Soviet Union, Venezuela, Argentina, Brazil, Hungary, Croatia, Korea, Mexico, Slovakia, China, and many other countries. P.I.E. is also participating in a special government-funded program to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union to live in American communities.

P.I.E. is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 25,000 students from 45 countries since its founding in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Department of State and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET),

certifying that the organization complies with the standards set forth in CSIET's Standards for International Educational Travel Programs.

Doty encourages families to contact the program immediately, as it will allow the proper time for the students and hosts to get to know one another before they actually meet for the first time.



