Helping FURRY FAMILY members

Anyone who owns a pet usually feels and treats their furry one like a family member. Just as a family wouldn't leave their child behind, a family with a pet normally feels the exact same way.

So when record flooding forced families from their homes in June, many didn't know what to do with their animals. Fortunately, the Souris Valley Animal Shelter opened another facility at the North Dakota State University extension center, specifically for evacuees needing a place for their furry family members.

"We opened the extension center June 1 when we first received word that severe flooding was possible," said Susan Wagers, Souris Valley Animal Shelter director. "We didn't get very many pets until June 21 when the actual flooding started."

She said the shelter housed more than 500 pets during the peak of the flood. The pets range from dogs, cats, birds and even a rabbit. Currently, their capacity is at an average of 300. With this many animals to take care of, the shelter is in desperate need of volunteers.

"We need people to help with everything," said Wagers. "We need people to help with cleaning kennels and walking dogs. It really doesn't take very long. We need people everyday at 8 a.m. and 5 p.m."

She said they get a lot of volunteers, but most are senior citizens and retirees who are often incapable of handling some of the stronger dogs.

"I am very grateful for their help, but some of these bigger dogs are just too much to handle for our retirees," she continued. "If I could just get a group of younger Airmen, it would help so much, just because I know

they have to be physically fit."

"We also have a very small staff, which makes it a lot more difficult to keep up with everything," she continued. "This makes the volunteer process even more important."

Volunteering is part of the Air Force culture. Airmen volunteer for many reasons. But essentially, it allows them to give back to the community, feel more part of the community, and to be a better-rounded individual.

"I volunteer because it feels good knowing my actions are helping someone out," said Senior Airman Jesse Lopez, 5th Bomb Wing public affairs photographer. "Knowing how many people have been affected by the flood, myself included, volun-

teering my time is the least I can do."

"Volunteering here [animal shelter] is great, not just for the animals, but for the person as well," said Wagers. "Getting outside and getting exercise is always beneficial - but the animals get love and attention too, so everyone involved is benefited."

Wagers said all a volunteer needs to do is simply show up at the NDSU extension center and be ready to walk the animals and clean if possible. Due to liability concerns, Wagers said all volunteers handling dogs must be at least 18 years of

age. Strollers should not be taken out to the shelter. Younger children may help if an adult is present, but cannot volunteer on their own.

Tricare for flood-impacted families and other summer travelers

To ensure all Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen and their family's health care needs are met this summer, the 5th Medical Group Tricare Operations and Patient Administration flight would like to remind everyone of some key details when traveling with Tricare Prime.

First and foremost, as a Tricare beneficiary, it is important that all family information contained in the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System is current and up to date, especially if traveling outside of

the local treatment area.

If not, please visit the Military Personnel Element to ensure the most current information is updated prior to traveling.

If a beneficiary is enrolled in Tricare Prime and is leaving or has already left Minot under the six-month evacuation order, there are different options to consider concerning enrollment. Whether you remain enrolled at the 5th MDG or change to another medical treatment facility/location, depends to some degree on where the family moves.

If the family has moved to another location within the Tricare West Region, it is rec-

ommended that they change their primary care manager to the new local area if planning to be out of the area for more than 30 days.

If moving to a different Tricare region, it is recommended to disenroll from the 5th MDG and re-enroll in the new region. To see which states fall within each Tricare region, visit www.tricare.mil. If there is not an MTF in the relocation area, it is recommended the beneficiary remain enrolled at the 5th MDG, or if there is an intention to come back to the Minot area after the evacuation order.

When taking a summer vacation, remember Tricare

benefits go wherever the member goes. However, as a Tricare Prime beneficiary, there are still a few things to remember while traveling.

Most importantly, if medical attention is required for an emergency (i.e. to save life, limb, eyesight, or prevent undue suffering), call 911 or go to the nearest hospital.

For urgent care (e.g. care needed within 24 hours or that which cannot wait for you to return to your local area), first contact your PCM at the 5th MDG for a referral to avoid charges for services rendered. Please call the appointment line for approval: 723-5633. All other non-emergent/urgent care must

take place in another MTF to avoid personal charges. If an MTF is not available, contact the 5th MDG for a referral, or wait to return to the local area. If a pharmaceutical refill is needed while traveling, use any normal Tricare pharmacy option.

For more information on how to best use the pharmacy while traveling, please visit the Tricare website at www.tricare.mil/pharmacy for more information on these options. If uncertain of benefits while traveling, call 1-888-874-9378, visit the TriWest website at www.triwest.com, or contact the 5th MDG for additional information at 723-5176.

Culture of correcting standards

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (AFNS) - Do our Airmen set and correct standards on a day-to-day basis? In the Air Force, do we have the culture of correcting standards?

I think we do a great job in correcting each other with regard to our specific career field tasks. However, we don't do a very good job at correcting standards that make us good Airmen. Proper Airmanship is correcting each other about things such as "your sideburns are too long," "take your sunglasses off the top of your head," "tuck your PT shirt in," "why didn't you pay proper respect to the flag," and so on.

I expect NCOs and senior NCOs to correct these standard violations. I especially expect us to set a standard for our subordinates to correct standard violations.

These "good" Airmanship standards may seem trivial or unimportant, but nothing could be further from the truth. If we can't count on our Airmen to follow these seemingly small standards, how can we, as leaders, count on them to follow the big rules?

If we can't count on each other to make the right decision on a small "Airmanship" standard, how can

we count on each other to make the right decision when it's a big decision - when lives could be at stake? The simple answer is, we can't.

When we see a group of Airmen together and one of them is out of standard, we should correct that individual. We should also confront the most senior in the group and counsel that individual as well for not doing what is expected. This will go a long way in promoting the culture of correcting standards.

I often ask Airman leadership school and NCO academy students, "Who has more authority: an Army E-6, Marine E-6 or an Air Force E-6?" Most of the time, someone says the Army or Marine E-6 has more authority.

Why do our Air Force NCOs think NCOs from other branches of the military have more authority? It's because over time, we chose not to use the authority given us by our commanders and the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Every time we choose to walk by, ignore or push up to the next level something we should correct ourselves, we are eroding or even giving away our authority.

There is a problem when our NCOs don't think they have the authority to

correct standards. We have to fix this. It's partly our fault as senior enlisted leaders. If we have not given our expectations to our junior NCOs to correct others and use their authority, we have contributed to their lack of the culture of correcting standards.

Retired Gen. Gregory Martin, the former Air Force Materiel Command commander, said if we see a discrepancy or problem "we are obligated to fix it."

We have to tell our NCOs we expect them to correct others. We have to have their backs when they do. We have to show them how to confront and correct. We have to show them how to correct with compassion and authority, without necessarily coming off the top rope (so to speak).

The bottom line is, we have to stop giving our authority away. We must set the expectation of allowing our subordinate Airmen to correct each other and their subordinates.

When our E-4s have the mindset to take care of themselves and the enlisted Airmen below them and our E-3s have the mindset to take care of themselves and all E-2s and E-1s below them, we will be on our way to improving the culture of correcting standards.

To be stereotyped as an Airman

VANCE AIR FORCE BASE, Okla. (AFNS) - When we hear the word stereotype, we tend to attach negative connotations to it. After a conversation I had a few months ago, that word changed for me.

In late March, my wife Kelly and I attended a course at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, as part of our preparation for squadron command. The course was a week long, and on the last day, we attended a Basic Military Training graduation at Lackland AFB, Texas.

Following the graduation, we had lunch with trainees who were just one week from graduation themselves.

We ate with a female trainee from southern California. She didn't have her assignment yet, but wanted to be in either air traffic control or acquisitions. I, of course, encouraged her to become an air traffic controller and join us here at Vance AFB.

We talked about why she joined the Air Force. She didn't run through a variety of great reasons many of us have for joining: service, patriotism, opportunities, education or experience. Instead, she told us that she joined the Air Force because she wanted to be "stereotyped as an Air-

man."

She explained that in her hometown of Compton, Calif., there are stereotypes and expectations that seem to go along with whether you are male or female, your national origin, and what part of town you are from.

As she learned about the Air Force, it became apparent to her that, as an Airman, none of that "stuff" mattered. What does matter is our mission, our commitment, our professionalism, the core values by which we live, and the freedoms and ideals we defend.

This explanation by an 18-year-old Airman about to join our ranks absolutely floored my wife and me, and has had us talking about it ever since. There is a lot we can take away from what this Airman said.

First, it reinforces that our reputation as the world's most dominant and most respected air, space and cyberspace force reaches far and wide.

Second, it tells us that our reputation is based on our people who serve something greater than themselves.

Third, it should convey to all of us that the impression we make on others translates into a calling for many

to serve our country.

Her words reflect the trust and confidence that the American people have in us, and how important that trust is in defining us as Airmen and defining what we stand for.

By joining the Air Force, that young woman from southern California earned the label of "Airman" in the hopes of being stereotyped with us, her fellow Airmen, for the integrity, service and excellence for which we are known. When she goes home to Compton, wearing her uniform, she will return mostly as the girl they all knew, but she will also be the Airman she has become.

She won't fit the stereotype someone else had for her; she will have changed in their eyes. By deciding to serve and put on the uniform of her country, that Airman has become something far greater than the superficial expectation someone used to have for her.

When I think of the American dream, I think of Airmen like her who are living it. To me, being considered by others as a stereotypical Airman is a tremendous honor. That's a label we should strive to attain every day.

Innovation at its best

The Innovative Development through Employee Awareness program has continually given Air Force Global Strike Command Airmen an opportunity to provide innovative ways to ensure a more resourceful and efficient work environment.

According to Charles Hamilton, 5th Force Support Squadron IDEA program manager, monetary rewards are given, as an incentive, to individuals whose proposals are approved.

Senior Airman Peter Bailey, 17th Munitions Squadron space and missile systems electronics maintainer, is one Airman who has had five proposals approved within the past year. With a \$200 reward for each of his ideas, he has continued to find practical ways for ensuring efficiency in his career field.

"Five of my ideas have been approved and I have received a reward total of \$1,000," said Bailey. "I also recently won a Kindle and was awarded a commanders coin because of my involvement in the program."

Bailey said the ideas he submitted all focused on ensuring maintenance efficiency. He said he was proud of his submissions but the one he was most proud of helped save the Air Force thousands of dollars through electronics maintenance troubleshooting.

"There is one electronics test we run on a piece of equipment and if it fails, we end up tossing that specific equipment away," said Bailey. "However, I realized that we did not have to toss the entire equipment if we just swapped out a small specific part."

The shop put the idea into effect only one week after it was approved.

"It felt great to see it implemented right away," said Bailey. "It's always nice to see an idea come to fruition and it's great seeing the impact and change I have."

Via the Innovative Development through Employee Awareness program, Bailey submitted 5 proposals, which were approved, and were key in ensuring a more resourceful and efficient work environment.

Bailey explained there are two key factors that have helped him develop new ideas.

"The things that really come into play is my job experience and a lot of research," Bailey said. "I'm good at my job and any chance I get I'm always reading through our technical data books to learn more maintenance knowledge."

He said when they run certain electronics tests, it's a waiting game, giving him spare time to crack open a book and read up on work manuals.

"I gain a lot of the knowledge from those books, and as I read, I learn

more and more," said Bailey.

He added that the more he reads, he gains more knowledge and combines it with his work experience to come up with new ideas.

Bailey said when he learned about the IDEA program he submitted a proposal, and when it was approved, it motivated him to submit other ideas he had in mind because it was not as difficult of a process.

"The most intensive part about the paperwork is doing the actual research," said Bailey. "It's all about explaining in detail the specifics about an idea."

He explained a lot of the people in his organization shy away from paperwork.

"I don't think people here are aware of how the process for submitting an idea works and they'd rather just continue turning wrenches," said Bailey.

Currently Bailey is juggling an idea involving fabricating a specialized tool to make weapon systems maintenance more secure.

There's no telling what future innovations and ideas Bailey will come up with next.

Male military spouses cope with added challenges, expert says

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Brian Campbell knew some challenges were in store for him after he left his Navy career to follow his military wife across the country.

But what he didn't count on were the additional challenges brought on not by his status as a military spouse, but by his gender.

"I was the first (nonmilitary) male spouse in that command ever," Campbell said in a podcast posted on Military OneSource.

Seeking social connections, Campbell looked for a spouses' club at their new installation, but instead, found a wives' club.

"I didn't fit into that organization very well," he said. "In a lot of instances, when you're talking about a spouses' organization, you're going to be the only male in the room."

Campbell eventually found the social interaction he craved by reaching out to men within his wife's command. These connections are vital, he said, and can "help build that social organization that can be lacking for you as a male spouse."

As a small segment of the overall military population, it can be difficult for service members' civilian hus-

bands to figure out where they fit in, but building strong support networks can help to ward off feelings of isolation, said Scott Stanley, a research professor from the University of Denver and a military family expert. According to the 2010 Military Family Life Project, just 5 percent of active duty service members' civilian spouses are male.

"While things have changed a lot in society and changed a lot in the military, it's still more typical for people to think of the male as the warrior," Stanley said in a Military OneSource podcast. "There's a lot to work out and a lot to figure out, and it's clear that it's difficult for some couples."

Stanley cited a study he's part of that's following Army couples over time to gauge how they're doing. Evidence shows that civilian men married to a service member are twice or a little more than twice as likely to divorce, he said.

"It's really clear even in the divorce data that this is something that's even trickier than what the average military couple is going through," he noted.

Part of the difficulty, Stanley explained, is people don't understand the male role when it's the female service member who is deployed.

"A lot of these men are sort of swimming in a whole new part of the pool, if you will, without really knowing exactly where to go or what to do or what sort of supports to seek," he said. Compounding this, some men may find their spouse role clashes with their sense of who they are as a male, or their perception of who they're supposed to be. And in some cases, he said, men may be less inclined than women to seek support or to open up about their struggles.

"They may feel extra uncomfortable, at least some men might, because of the nature of this: 'Well, my wife is going off to war, and I'm here watching the kids,'" he said.

Military families have access to a vast array of support programs, Stanley noted, however, many are focused on connecting with the service members' wives.

"You have all these support systems where it's really easy for the wife of a service member to walk in the room, immediately see a lot of other people like her, and start connecting in an environment that's been created to be female friendly," he said.

While service members' husbands may feel out of place in these settings, they still can create a strong support network and social connections. Stanley suggested they develop friendships

with other couples who have the same dynamic. That way, he said, they'll gain a friend with whom they can "blow off steam," as well as someone who can relate to their complaints and concerns.

Chaplains and counselors, he added, are other avenues of emotional support. People can connect with a counselor through the TRICARE military health care system or through their installation's family support center. People who live away from an installation can call Military OneSource at 1-800-342-9647 to connect with a counselor.

Campbell advised his fellow male spouses to look into installation-sponsored trips or to find other men who share the same interests, such as bike riding or chess. The local community also can be a great source of support, he added.

"They may or may not be talking about it with other guys, but there are a lot of men out there who are going through this and feeling it," he said.

"But you are really in this," he added, "so you have to kind of figure out what's going to work for you to cope with this in the best way you can at this time, because that's going to be the best thing for your marriage, best thing for your family and the best thing for you down the line."

The statewide tundra swan hunting season is Oct. 1 - Jan. 1, 2012. A total of 2,200 licenses are available. Successful applicants will receive a tag to take one swan during the season. Since

swans are classified as waterfowl, nonresidents may hunt them only during the period their nonresident waterfowl license is valid.

North Dakota residents and nonresidents are eligible to apply.



Fall turkey lottery held, remaining licenses issued Aug. 17

The 2011 fall wild turkey lottery has been held and more than 1,800 licenses remain in 11 units. Unsuccessful applicants who applied online will have a refund issued directly to their credit card. Beginning Aug. 17, all remaining licenses will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis. Hunters are allowed a maximum of 15 licenses for the fall season.

Resident and nonresident hunters will be able to apply online, or print out an appli-

cation to mail, at the Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov. Paper applications will also be available at license vendors.

The fall turkey season runs from Oct. 8 - Jan. 8, 2012.

Licenses remain for the following units: Unit 03, Benson and Ramsey counties and a portion of Pierce County, 142 licenses; Unit 13, Dunn County, 245; Unit 19, Grant and Sioux counties and a portion of Morton County,

51; Unit 25, McHenry County and portions of Pierce and Ward counties, 499; Unit 30, a portion of Morton County, 223; Unit 31, Mountrail County, 37; Unit 45, Stark County, 101; Unit 47, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, Sheridan, Stutsman and Wells counties, 35; Unit 51, Burke County and portions of Renville, Bottineau and Ward counties, 227; Unit 98, Burleigh, Emmons and McLean counties, 135; and Unit 99, Mercer and Oliver counties, 146.

Third lottery deer application deadline August 10

Deer hunters interested in applying for a first, second, third or fourth license have to submit a third lottery application no later than Aug. 10. Successful applicants in the first lottery will receive their license in mid-August.

Hunters can apply online, or print out an application, at the North Dakota Game and Fish Department's website, gf.nd.gov.

Paper applications are also available from Game and Fish offices, county auditors and license vendors. Residents and nonresidents are eligible to apply.

After the third lottery drawing, Game and Fish will issue any remaining licenses on a first-come, first-served basis. Hunters can use additional concurrent season doe licenses during the archery season with a bow; the deer gun season with a bow, rifle, or muzzleloader; or during the muzzleloader season with a muzzleloader.

These licenses are for antlerless deer only, and hunters must stay in the unit to which the license is assigned.

In addition, youth deer license hunters ages 14 and 15 may purchase additional concurrent season doe licenses to use during the youth season.

Last year, licenses were sold out in all but three units prior to opening day of deer gun season. Hunters are encouraged to apply early if they have a specific unit in mind.

The regular deer gun season starts at noon Nov. 4 and continues through Nov. 20.

City archery hunt cancelled in Bismarck

The Bismarck Police Department will not issue trespass permits for this fall's special herd reduction deer and turkey bow seasons within the city limits, due to water still covering a large portion of the hunting zone and associated recovery efforts from this year's flood.

A special herd reduction season on antlerless deer was scheduled to run in Bismarck from Sept. 2 - Jan. 31, 2012. In addition, up to 25 hunters licensed to bow hunt deer within the city could have received a turkey license to help control a growing population of birds in residential areas.

The city bow hunt is a cooperative effort between the city of Bismarck and the North Dakota Game and Fish Department. Hunters are required to receive a trespass permit from the Bismarck Police Department before receiving a hunting license from the Game and Fish Department.

A quick scan through the N.D. Game and Fish Department weekly disposition and citation list underscores how many people either forgot or lost boat registrations for 2011.

North Dakota requires registration for all boats powered by a motor. Price varies by length, although the fee is \$12 for all motor-driven canoes regardless of their length.

The cost is a bargain, considering registration is good for a three-year period. Fees for boats 16 feet or shorter are \$12, those between 16 and 20 feet in length \$24 and boats longer than 20 feet cost \$33 for three years.

This year marks the first of a new three-year boat registration period so it may be understandable some people forgot to renew, especially when the Game and Fish Department sends renewal forms in the dead of winter.

Not only is it easy to forget to mail the form or renew online, it's also easy to lose the form or stickers if they're not immediately put on the boat.

Either way, it's August and people likely won't get off with just a warning if they haven't registered their boats this late in the season.

Still, it seems numerous folks forget the little details when it comes to registering boats. For example, during the week of July 21 through July 27, 10 of 30 Game and Fish Department citations issued involved "Failure to display or the use of unlicensed or unnumbered boat". Another citation was simply written as "Failure to display boat registration." Either way, it cost folks \$25.

It also appears people have a tendency to forget to count the number of people in their boats along with the number of life-jackets (PFD).

At the least, they should match. Depending on the length of one's boat, there should also be a certified Type IV throwable PFD aboard.

However, that same week's report included five citations for "Inadequate number of PFDs". The broad "Equipment" violation a Mandan boater received that week could be for a variety of things, such as inadequate or improper number of lights for night boating, PFDs, lack of fire extinguisher or other miscellaneous equipment violations.

Two boats pulling water-skiers received citations that week, as well. Those violations can also be for an array of miscues and vary from lack of PFD on the skier to no observer or coming too close to an anchored boat.

It also seems anglers tend to forget to carry their license with them, which could be understandable if wearing a swimsuit while fishing. However, the easy way to keep fishing licenses handy and avoid receiving a \$25 fine for "Failure to carry license on person" is to order all licenses via the Game and Fish Department website and print out multiple copies at the time of the order. Simply put a signed copy in one's boat, vehicle and billfold and they will always be handy.

That's another advantage to ordering licenses online - not only is a record available online but applicants can print multiple copies for their records in the event a license is lost.

It could save \$25 and significant amounts of frustration, just as it would by ordering boat registration renewals online and putting stickers on immediately.

Young at heart:

Mighty Eighth major sets age record at jump school

BARKSDALE AIR FORCE BASE, La. - Awe-inspiring. Exhilarating. Beyond fun. Serene. Contemplative. Exhausting. Numbing. Mindless. Stupid. Inane. These are all words one Airman from the Headquarters Eighth Air Force used to describe the feelings and emotions he had after jumping from a plane.

"I attended, and even more amazingly, graduated from the NATO Jump School in Texel, Netherlands," said Maj. John Seffern, Eighth Air Force plans, programs and requirements.

"That is the good news, the bad is that, and even though it was fun in a horrible sort of way, I don't think I would do it again."

In keeping with the traditions and heritage of former members of "The Mighty Eighth," Seffern set a goal and didn't let anything stand between him and accomplishing that goal.

"I am, apparently, the oldest person, by far, to do this (and I felt like it too)," said Seffern. "They said they didn't remember anyone in their 30s or 40s doing this, let alone me at the ripe old age of 55."

Seffern believes the Air Force's new physical training standards is what allowed him to get back into shape after retiring from the Air Force Reserves in 2003 and being recalled to active duty in September of 2010.

"I definitely have to give credit to the Air Force and the new PT standards for allowing me to almost keep up with the 19-year-old troops that were at the school," said Seffern.

"When I first joined the Air Force in 1974 all we had to do was run a mile and half, then when I went into the Reserves in 1990 we had the Ergo test. The Air Force PT program definitely helped because Jump School required lots of core and upper body strength.

"It also helped with my endurance, because we had to do three jumps in one day and they were really surprised that I could land, gather my chute, run with the Danish army and be ready to jump again almost immediately" said Seffern.

Seffern currently tries to work out two times a day. He runs two and half miles or does strength training during his lunch break and also tries to go to a Zumba class three times a week after work.

While Seffern was amazing the younger generation with his physical fitness prowess, there was one person who wasn't too impressed-Mother Nature.

"The winds, for the entire time we were there, were out of limits, but they dropped us anyway. This led to some interesting outcomes, and landing locations. One French sergeant landed so far away we thought he was in Germany, and we witnessed another troop break both her legs. I managed to come back with no injuries, except to my pride ... I flared over a creek, then my canopy and I got dragged into and under the water."

As Seffern finished his fifth and final jump to earn his Dutch jump wings, the public address announcer announced that the oldest guy to ever earn their wings at this school had just landed and was walking toward them.

"I never expected to get the applause of hundreds of strangers," said Seffern, whose career includes several other firsts.

"That was the good news, but the bad is its pretty discouraging when the only record I can get starts with, 'The oldest person ever to'"







Base Legal Office

Nonjudicial punishment, also known as an Article 15 punishment, provides commanders with an essential and prompt means of maintaining good order and discipline and promotes positive behavior changes in servicemembers without the stigma of a court-martial conviction. In July 2011, the following Minot Air Force Base servicemembers were punished under Article 15 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice:

1. A senior airman from the 5th Security Forces Squadron received a reduction in rank to airman first class, forfeiture of \$919.00 and a reprimand for violating Article 111, driving under the influence.

2. An airman first class

from the 5th Security Forces Squadron received a suspended reduction in rank to airman, forfeiture of \$250.00 and a reprimand for violating Article 92, minor in consumption.

3. An airman first class from the 5th Security Forces Squadron received a reduction in rank to airman for violating Article 92, dereliction of duty.

4. An airman from the 5th Security Forces Squadron received a reduction in rank to airman basic and a reprimand for violating Article 86, absent without leave.

5. A technical sergeant from the 17th Munitions Squadron received a reduction in rank to staff sergeant and a reprimand for violating Article 92, dereliction of duty

and Article 107, signed a false official record.

6. A senior airman from the 17th Munitions Squadron received a suspended reduction in rank to airman first class, forfeiture of \$376.00 pay per month for 2 months and a reprimand for two violations of Article 86, failure to go, Article 107, false official statement and Article 134, wrongful solicitation.

7. A senior airman from the 91st Missile Security Forces Squadron received a reduction in rank to airman first class, suspended forfeiture of \$441.00 of pay, suspended restriction to Minot Air Force Base, N.D. for 14 days, 14 days extra duty and a reprimand for violating Article 111, driving under the influence.





WHAT'S FOR DINNER



Chicken Muffuletta with Spicy Olive Relish Mayonnaise

- Roasted red peppers (from a jar), drained
- 1/2 or 1 jalapeño chile, chopped (depending on how spicy you like)
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup Real Mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons sherry vinegar
- 3/4 cup prepared olive relish
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh flat leaf parsley
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 16 1/4-inch slices provolone cheese
- 1 large round loaf of bread, sliced in half crosswise
- Aluminum foil
- 2 bricks or a cast iron pan and a few heavy cans

Combine red peppers, jalapeño, garlic, mayonnaise and vinegar in a food processor and process until smooth. Scrape the mixture into a medium bowl and fold in the olive relish and parsley. Set aside.

Heat the grill to high or the grill pan over high heat.

Brush chicken breasts with oil on both sides and sprinkle with salt and pepper, if desired. Grill for 4 to 5 minutes per side until golden brown and just cooked through. Remove from the grill, let rest 5 minutes then slice into 1/4-inch slices on the bias.

Spread some of mayonnaise mixture on the bottom half of the bread, add half of the cheese, half of the chicken and repeat with the remaining ingredients (mayonnaise mixture, cheese and chicken in that order).

Spread the cut-side of the top of the loaf with more mayonnaise mixture and place, mayonnaise-side down, on chicken. Wrap tightly in foil, place on baking sheet and place bricks or a heavy cast iron pan on top. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour (to allow the flavors to meld) or overnight.



Individuals and business owners who sustained damages are encouraged to register with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) by calling the teleregistration number at (800) 621-FEMA (3362) or (800) 462-7585 (TTY) for the hearing and speech impaired. "Don't miss out on any assistance you may be entitled to by not registering for help,"

he added.

According to Stai, SBA customer service representatives continue to be available at seven locations to issue loan applications, answer questions about SBA's disaster loan program, explain the application process and help each individual complete their application.

Businesses of any size and private, nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory, and other business assets.

The SBA can also lend additional funds to help homeowners and business owners with the cost of making improvements that protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future.

For small businesses and most private, nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDL) to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. EIDL assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.


